Until recently we have only seen glimpses of her, but the documentary The Queen at 90' narrated by Prince Charles, showing private home movies, gave us a privileged insight into the woman who is not only our Monarch, but also a mother, grandmother and great grandmother.

So what is it that gives her the strength, the ability to engage with people of all ages, of all faiths and none, from across the globe?

The answer can be found in her Christmas Day messages, summed up in this one from 2002 – "I know just how much I rely on my faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a new beginning. I know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings, and to put my trust in God...I draw strength from the message of hope in the Christian gospel".

Just as Prince Charles gave us opportunity to see what our Queen is really like, so Jesus gives us opportunity to see what God is really like - the Queen's Christmas message in 2012 reminded us that "God sent his only son 'to serve, not to be served'. He restored love and service to the centre of our lives in the person of Jesus Christ".

If everyone strived to do the same, what a different world we would live in!

Honorary Treasurer



Those of you who may be regular followers of this column (if indeed there are any!) will know that in the last few issues we've been learning about the story of the Church of St Ildierna and its Celtic and Norman predecessors over the centuries. Well, you may be relieved to know that you're getting a break from history this month, with more instalments in future issues.

Instead, I'd like to highlight the success of our amazing Lansallos Bellringers over the last year, winning the East Cornwall winter league, held in towers throughout East and Mid Cornwall, from Saltash to St Columb. The final was held at Menheniot when Lansallos won the first set. Last year Lansallos came second in the round ringing and third in the change ringing at the East Cornwall Ringing Association Festival, held in Lanreath. There's new blood coming on too, with three new ringers under training of whom the youngest is teenager Edward Talling. Regular bell practices were held over the winter months and will start again in September, so if you'd like to join do contact our tower captain, Roger Talling.

I'd also like to salute the generosity of the late Mr John Bagley, who was interred two years ago at Lansallos and who kindly left a bequest to help defray the cost of churchyard maintenance. It serves as a reminder to us all that leaving a gift to your church in your will is one of the simplest and best ways that you can help – and it won't cost you anything!

Sadly, our good work is sometimes still undone by vandalism, the latest being the wrenching of the donations organ pipe in the porch from its fixings and theft of its contents. As it was low season and the pipe had just been emptied, it's unlikely that the thief gained very much but it shows how important it is to keep our eyes open. Rural churches like ours are always vulnerable and we certainly don't want to keep them closed, so vigilance is our best defence.

The Story of St. SAVIOUR AT POLRUAN by Frances Eileen Burdett



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
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Polruan School News



From The Electoral Commission

On 23 June 2016 there will be a referendum on the United Kingdom's membership of the European Union.

If you're not already on the electoral roll, you need to register to vote by midnight on 7 June 2016 to vote in the EU Referendum.

What is the referendum about?

A referendum asks you to vote on a question.. For this referendum the question is:

Should the United Kingdom remain a member of the European Union or leave the European Union?

Can I vote?

You can vote in this referendum if you are registered to vote in the UK, are 18 or over on 23 June 2016 and are: a British or Irish citizen living in the UK, or a Commonwealth citizen living in the UK who has leave to remain in the UK or who does not require leave to remain in the UK, or

a British citizen living overseas who has been registered to vote in the UK in the last 15 years.

You can register online at <u>www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.</u> If you don't have access to the internet, call 0800 3 280 280 for a registration form to be sent to you.

You will need to complete the form and post it to your local electoral registration office to arrive by midnight on 7 June 2016.

If you are already registered to vote you will receive a poll card by 25 May 2016.



I received a recent e-mail from Kathleen and Daniel in which they wrote:

Greetings from Nigeria. Life is very busy and we praise God for His help and your concern and prayers. Both of us have been down with various infections but praise God for feeling a lot better. The Block industry is picking up[see below]. The rains have started so pray folks will get a good harvest. There are still attacks from Boko Haram and Fulani Herdsmen. They are attacking all over Nigeria so things still are not settled but it is a lot better than it was. The petrol shortage has caused many problems. It has been very expensive. We hope this will soon be rectified.

Kathleen included a history of how she went to Nigeria as a missionary, met and married Daniel and their life together including fleeing their home in Ngoshe Glavda because of Boko Haram attacks. It is too long to include here but I can make print copies or forward the e-mail if anyone is interested; However here is the end of the letter which has up-to-date news:

Recently we have set up a building block Industry in Vom – making cement blocks to sell – and providing work for the displaced refugees. Some want to stay in Vom, and thanks again to many of you who sent gifts specifically for this, we are helping them to buy land.

Security: The soldiers are trying hard to clear the Gwoza and Ngoshe Glavda area of Boko Haram as well as other parts of NE Nigeria. They need our prayers as Boko Haram are still quite strong is some areas. Being pushed out of many areas in the NE, Boko Haram have moved further South - to the Plateau. We are thankful to God that the mastermind of the plans to disrupt the Plateau area was caught recently.

We thank you for your love and concern and prayers. God is so good to us, and we praise Him for strength to cope and finances to help.

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Times Past

from Isabel Pickering

1895 Jul 18 The large and powerful new pleasure steamer "Plymouth Belle" made her first trip to Fowey on Thurs last, and took passengers to Falmouth for a few hours. There have been so many steamer excursions lately that the "Belle" was not quite as well patronised as she should have been. Still, a fair number of people took advantage of the trip, and spoke most highly of the "Belle's" seagoing qualities, and of the little motion that was felt, even when meeting a head wind.

1898 Jun 1 Fowey at present suffers somewhat from lack of adequate facilities for bathing. Not that bathing cannot be had there are numerous creeks within 10 minutes walk or so of the town, but there is little chance of getting a dip nearer. Recently there has been some talk of providing good swimming accommodation at the foot of some cliffs in the town. Excellent fishing, however, is to be had with hook and line, or the seine, a peculiar net used for catching pollock, grey and red mullet, dabs, soles and such like fish. On the Polruan side of the harbour salmon may be fished with considerable success. A less expensive, and to many a more attractive sport, is the fishing to be had up the river.

1903 Jun 4 - Fowey - The Great Western Railway stevadores' regatta was on Monday. The Committee; Messers W. Symons, Honourable Treasurer, J. Snell, Honourable Secretary, J. Clemens, Starter, R. Truscott, Umpire, J Lewarne, Clerk of the course, John Clift, Timekeeper, H.S Fisher, C.L. Toyne, J.H. Hannam, W.J. Rundle, H. Coombes, C. Swiggs, J.P. Carter, J Coombes. Single Paddling race for pleasure boats, rowed by men over 40 and employed on GWR wharf - 1 "Spray", C Lewarne, 2 "Ethel", B Puckey, 3 "Willing Boy", W Cook. Two oared boars open - 1 "Kite", C Butson. Four oared bona-fide ships boats open - 1 "Martha Edams", E Butson. Mosquito Race for sailing boats not exceeding 15 ft.- 1- "Mon Ami", W. Watty, 2- "Mona", A Watty, 3- "Fairy", C Johns. Ran-a-dan for boys, Shovel race open- 1-"Mary", W Couch. Double paddling race for men employed at GWR wharf - 2 "Swift" G Ede. Single paddling race for boys open -1 "Spray" Butson, 2-"Mosquito", R Robins, 3-"May", A Swiggs. Single paddling race open -1"Spray", J Butson, 2-"Bluebell", C Butson, 3-"May", J Tabb. The band of the 3rd co. 1st C. Artillery Volunteers rendered selections during the regatta.CRG

1903 - 25 Jun – Cyclists Lighting-Up Time. It having been established that lighting up time is one hour after local sunset, which in Cornwall happens to be later than Greenwich, Cornish cyclists are entitled to an extension of time corresponding to the latitude and longitude in which things happen to be. June 25 - 9:31.

1903 – Jul 2 – The living at Lanteglos by Fowey has been offered and accepted by Rev. Charles Francis Trusted, MA of Hertford College, Oxford. Mr Trusted was Vicar of St Sampson, Golant and previous curate at St Petrock Minor and at St Mellion.

1903 – Jul 16 – Fowey Harbour Order 1893 – Notice is hereby given that a meeting of

the owners of property rateable to the relief of the poor and of Persons rated to the relief of the poor for the parish of Lanteglos by Fowey will be held at the Institute, situated in West St. Polruan, Monday 10th Aug, 1903, at 6:00 in the evening for the purpose of electing one person to act as a Fowey Harbour Commissioner from the 20th of September 1903 till the Saturday preceding the third Monday in September 1906.

1906 Jun 14 – Died at Blundell's School, Tiverton, Jun 15, Charles Cyril, son of Rev Charles Francis Trusted, vicar of Lanteglos by Fowey, aged 15

1907 Jul 4 – A terrible accident occurred at the Fowey GWR jetties on Friday Several workmen were engaged in loading the Steamer Roanoke with casks of china clay, when the hatchways gave way. George Tippett, aged 64, was crushed between the casks and killed instantly, the body being battered out of all recognition. Andrew Osbrink sustained several cuts, and other men saved themselves by clinging to whatever they could lay hold of. Tippett leaves a widow and several married daughters behind.

1907 Jul 4 – All the candidates presented from Fowey Grammar School for the Preliminary Certificate Examinations at Christmas were successful. They have all again passed the second portion of the examination. The candidates were Misses Leta Humphries (distinction in English), Muriel Slade and Hetty Pester and Messrs JH Buley, C Widlake (distinctition in History), and MJ Canning.

1909 Jun 19 - If it has been quiet this week in the immediate district, it has been the reverse at Polruan. Here the fisherfolk are in a state of excitement over the general sanitary condition. They do not want the present condition of things altered, and Mr. Moses Dunn has the homage of a ling paid him, so devoted are Polruan people towards the man who has not spared himself in their interest.

1913 Jul 10 RCG - Liskeard County Court. Monday James Burn, ferryman of Fore St. Polruan summoned for £2.2.6, quarters rent of house by James F. Pearn of Plymouth. Plaintiff let house to defendant about 3 years ago at £8.10.0. June last year gave defendant notice to quit. Defendant sent quarters rent to Midsummer with no communication with it. Nov 11 received key of house by post but no communication. Later heard from Mr. Dingle who acted for him at Polruan that house was left empty. Defendant admitted he took house from half quarter. Judge gave for plaintiff, fined £1.1.3 and costs.

1913 Jul 18 – Scion of the political family, Mr Isaac Foot had a narrow escape when returning from a meeting in Polruan on the Tuesday, when the car he was travelling in was involved in a collision with a cow at East Taphouse. The driver did his best to avoid a collision in a very narrow road, but was unable to do so. The car struck the animal and the occupants were thrown into the road. Fortunately they escaped with nothing worse than a severe shaking.

My Village ~ Polruan.

Busy, bustling streets, with shop doors open wide the smell of fresh baked bread enticing you inside.

Local produce to buy as fresh as fresh can be lettuce, spring onions, radishes. Plenty for you and me.

People who knew each other all their families too. Enquiring about new-born babes all the rest of the family too.

Worried when friends and relations were ill, delighted when all was well. Having a good laugh at the yarns that were told, each one rang a bell.

Many a time it was told with their tongue in cheek not afraid to speak out and be bold not always docile and meek.

Beautiful chapel-singing, especially carols as Christmas drew near. That's the Polruan I remember.



French Strawberry Tart

A beautiful strawberry tart recipe made with a shortcrust pastry case with creme patissiere and glazed strawberries. Perfect for a summer afternoon tea in the garden. The pastry case and the creme patissiere can be made the day before and the tart assembled a few hours before serving. 375g pack shortcrust pastry 500g small strawberries, hulled and halved 4 tbs redcurrant jelly


For the creme patissiere: 350ml whole milk 1 vanilla pod, split lengthways 4 large free-range egg yolks 100g golden caster sugar 25g plain flour, plus extra for dusting Finely grated zest of 1 lemon Roll the pastry out on a lightly floured surface to the thickness of a pound coin. Use to line a deep, 23cm fluted, loosebottomed tart tin. Trim the excess and prick the base all over with a fork. Chill for 30 mins.

Meanwhile, make the creme patissiere. Put the milk and vanilla pod in a large pan, bring to the boil, then turn off the heat. In a large bowl, whisk the yolks and sugar for 10 minutes until voluminous, then beat in the flour and lemon zest. Strain the warm milk slowly into the egg mixture, whisking continuously. Clean the pan, then pour the mixture back in and gently bring to the boil, stirring constantly until it has thickened. Take the pan off the heat, cover the surface of the creme patissiere with baking paper and leave to cool.

Preheat the oven to 180_C/fan160_C/gas 4. Line the pastry case with baking paper and fill with baking beans or rice. Place on a baking sheet and blind-bake for 15 minutes. Remove the beans/rice and paper, then cook for a further 10-15 minutes until golden. If the edges look too dark, cover with foil. Leave for 5 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

Spoon the creme patissiere into the tart, then level the surface with the back of a spoon. Place a strawberry half in the centre of the tart, then arrange concentric rings of fruit around it until all of the creme patissiere is covered.

Gently warm the jelly with 2 tbsp water until melted, brush over the strawberries and leave for 2 minutes to set. Serve.

Lanteglos-by-Fowey Neighbourhood Plan

Update

At the April Parish Council meeting Cllr Moore reported that an application for grant aid towards developing the Parish Neighbourhood Plan had been made to My Community Rights - Locality (UK), a company and registered charity set up by Government. A parish of our size is eligible to apply for up to £9000.00 to support costs associated with developing the Neighbourhood Plan, including developing a website, help with putting together a project plan, help with developing the evidence base and analysing it to identify issues and aims for our plan, undertaking a housing needs survey, support with undertaking the six week pre-submission consultation, venue hire, publicity materials, printing and costs associated with planning and undertaking public engagement and consulting on the plan. Our application has been assessed and approved and an initial grant of $\pounds 2500.00$ has been approved and will be made to us in the next week or ten days by Groundwork, another Government organisation.

As you will be aware the Parish Council had already drawn up and consulted on a questionnaire that was delivered to all households in the Parish. The initial analysis was carried out by Cllrs Fisher and Moore, and the results published in the Parish Magazine and on the Council website. The costs for this were paid from the Parish precept. The grant will be spent on setting up a dedicated Lanteglos-by-Fowey Neighbourhood Plan website, having a detailed analysis and report of the questionnaires prepared by Cornwall Rural Communities Charity, having a housing needs survey prepared by the Neighbourhood Plan team at Cornwall Council, meeting room costs, printing costs, development of communications and engagement strategies, printing and distribution costs and postage and distribution costs associated with setting up a Steering Group. We are able to recover any VAT levied and do not need to set up a separate bank account.

Cllr Moore has met twice with David Read of Cornwall Council's Neighbourhood Planning Team, together with Cllr Hannaford and Zoe Bernard John, Senior Planning Officer, and their advice has been invaluable. They are also able to offer support in training and getting the Steering Group and specific issue working groups started and informed.

The Parish Council must take full responsibility for leading the Neighbourhood Plan but we can set up a working group to take that work forward. There is too much work for Councillors to undertake in a relatively short space of time, say two years at the most, and it is vital if we are to engage with the community as widely as possible that we set up a Steering Group. When people completed the questionnaires they were able to provide us with their contact details if they wished to be kept informed of developments. The Parish Council agreed at the April meeting that Cllr Moore write to all those who did inviting them to consider becoming a member of the group. A total of thirty seven email and written letters to individuals and families have been sent and responses are already coming in. We should be in a position to set up a preliminary meeting of all those who are interested and wish to know more, together with Councillors and David Read. This should take place after the Parish Council Meeting on May 23rd.

At the May 23rd meeting a draft of the Terms of Reference for the Steering Group will be presented to the Council for examination and ratification. That is when the work starts and it is proposed that Steering Group meetings will be held monthly, in weeks when there isn't a PC meeting. The report and detailed analysis of the survey questionnaires should identify priority issues to be investigated further. An outline project plan will also need to be put in place. Whatever goes into our plan has to be permissive and have broad community support. It will be about land use planning and be produced by our community. It will enable development but give us the ability to influence that development. Our plan cannot conflict with local or national policy nor propose less growth than is contained in Cornwall Council's strategic plan. We can say where we think new houses, businesses and shops should go, and what they should look like. The whole community has the right to vote on whether to accept our Neighbourhood Plan at a referendum. If accepted the plan will be adopted and will have to be referred to before planning decisions are made.

Several of our neighbours have already started on their plans and it may be a positive move to link up with (not join) Polperro and Looe. Cornwall Council will act to us as a critical friend. We hardly need reminding that we have a large Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, Heritage Coast, Site of Special Scientific Interest and two Conservation Areas in Bodinnick and Polruan. Cllr Moore has been invited to attend Looe's Steering Group meetings.

Further afield we are all aware of the front page reporting of what is happening in St Ives. Other communities which are much further along the Neighbourhood Development Plan path include Quethiock, Roseland, Rame, St Minver and St Cleer. St Cleer had this to say: "In essence, a Neighbourhood Plan is a twenty-year plan that defines the broad planning aims of the Neighbourhood. It might identify which areas are to be considered for future building, and which are to be protected from future development; it could give guidance on renewable energy, housing, industry, heritage-site protection, and so on. It should be selfinspired, i.e., produced from within the Neighbourhood, not imposed from above."

There is much to be done but also a lot of support and encouragement in doing it. Our aim should be to produce a plan, derived and developed by the whole community that sets out how we wish Lanteglos-by-Fowey¹6 develop by 2030.

Every morning and evening there are at least a dozen rabbits leaping and playing on the lawns. Do they eat the dandelions that pop up daily? No they don't, the lower leaves of the shrubs are much more tasty.

There is a big dog fox that patrols the field under the house .I think he would like to come in and eat the rabbits but he is too cautious. This may be why Limpy the pheasant has moved in with us too. He must have had a fight with another cock bird. His tail feathers are all tatty and damaged. When I try to shoo him off the flowers he turns and argues with me.

Last year Ben made a wren nesting box for our porch. They have totally ignored it preferring to adapt a swallows nest, the swallow however is very busy building a mud nest on top of the wren box. It has taken hundreds of trips to the bog to scoop up mud, this mud is very carefully placed and the nest is looking very neat. Now we are looking forward to some eggs being laid.



The farmyard is very quiet. The cattle have at last gone into the fields for the Summer. They were very excited to be set free, they raced around jumping and skipping.


We do however have a few animals in the sheds. Twenty seven young calves arrived in a cattle lorry. British Blues. They are very pretty, they range from grey to blue to black in colour. Jess has been in charge of feeding them all. They are in pens of three so she can feed them their milk each morning, three litres each. They are really sweet .They will gradually be weaned off the milk on to special rations of crushed grain and rearing nuts.

Last year I wrote about a bull getting into a field full of heifers. It is now nine months later and so far we have three little unplanned calves and at least one more to come. Luckily they were all born without any help.

One young mum was not interested in her calf, so we made sure the baby drank from her several times a day to get the colostrum that is so vital for her future health. This involved the poor little thing being kicked several times at each feed. We decided to put Annabel (the calf's name) with

the British Blues. One little jet black calf amongst all the others. She is very sweet and quite a character. Her mother was put back with her herd and she never called for her baby once. Obviously she wasn't the maternal type.





Fowey Harbour News Summer 2016

Finally summer is upon us! This winter has seemed a long one with an almost endless procession of Atlantic depressions bringing rain and near gale force winds without respite. Let's hope that we can be rewarded with some settled weather to enjoy over this important season for us all. Last year was challenging for us with reduced numbers of both commercial and leisure vessels visiting our port. The impact of this is simple; fewer vessels means reduced income for the Port. As a consequence our ability to raise money to reinvest in port improvements is reduced significantly. It goes without saying that if revenues continue to reduce then the current level of service we provide will come under threat. Now, we are not there yet, and the Board are working hard to find innovative ways for us to generate some more revenue. The new facility at our Penmarlam site, 'Mixtow Marine' has been a great success and continues to grow. We have almost been overwhelmed by customer demand for the services offered and we are looking to expand the work force and facilities to improve the services we provide.

We have recently opened our new fuel facility at the former pilot's pontoon. This will provide a dedicated 24 hour fuel berth available to all boat users, something that has been requested by customers and, we hope will start to encourage the return of more visiting motor boats to the Harbour.

One trend that we have noticed is that visiting leisure craft are not staying long in Fowey. Often we are seen as just an 'overnight stop'. In an effort to start to change that perception the Commissioners have produced a new 'Fowey Guide'. Rather than a publication focused on the Port with lots of do's and don'ts , it showcases different things to do, places to eat, places to stay and places to visit. The aim is to fire the imagination of visitors to hopefully stay longer and explore or come back again soon!

Some other opportunities have arisen over the winter which the Board have seized. Firstly the purchase of a second Pilot boat. now named Gallant. This vessel is the sister of our current vessel Gribbin, she became available at an affordable price and was too good an offer to refuse! She will provide redundancy to our cutter fleet to ensure an un-interrupted service in Fowey and will be made available to charter to our neighbouring ports to provide cover there. It is hoped we will very quickly recoup our outlay for the purchase. As a consequence our smaller reserve pilot boat, Penleath will be put up for sale. Secondly we have acquired a new barge for the unglamorous but important role of housing our rubbish skips afloat. Suitable barges are very hard to come by so we were very pleased to acquire one in relatively good condition which will serve us well over future years.

Keen harbour watchers will have noticed our dredger Lantic Bay has been on our



slipway at Brazen Island for almost 6 months undertaking repairs. The vessel suffered some rapid thinning of her hull plating due to an electrical fault and large areas of the hull and internal tanks have had to be replaced. To achieve this repair at a commercial yard would have been beyond our means but, we are blessed with a wonderful vard and team at Brazen Island and they have been able to complete the repairs in house. This has been a mammoth undertaking with the lion's share of the work being completed by our welder/fabricator Dougie Nicholson assisted by our engineers who have done some remarkable work to restore Lantic Bay to service. We expect to see her back at work in the Harbour later this summer.

Wishing you a safe and enjoyable 2016 boating season.

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IN THE GARDEN

SEASIDE PLANTS

Natural denizens of seashores are the plants most likely to succeed. Strangely, many of these come from New Zealand, among them the wind-resistant, sun-loving olearias and the longflowering hebes. Most Mediterranean shrubs, like lavender, cistus, rosemary and cotton lavender (santolina) also do well.

Olearia x haastii is the best known of the daisy bushes, probably because it is the hardiest and grows inland as well as near the coast. It attains a height of 4.5 ft(1.2-1.5 m), with small, evergreen, oval grey-green leaves, which like those of most olearias are white and woolly underneath, and clusters of small white daisies in July and August. O. macrodonta, 4-6 ft (1.2-1.8 m) high, usually known as New Zealand holly, has toothed leaves and larger flower trusses in June. O. ilicifolia, one of the best, has grey-green, toothed leaves and fragrant white flowers in June: the Tasmanian O. stellulata 'Splendens' has blue, pink and lavender-flowered forms

Hebes persist in flower for weeks and are much more dependable near the coast than inland. They are medium-sized, evergreen shrubs with long racemes of variously coloured flowers. `Autumn Glory' is a particularly freeflowering, violet variety; `Midsummer Beauty' is lavender; `Lindsayi', pink; `Blue Gem', bright blue; and `White Star', white.

High gloss on the foliage enables plants to throw off sand and salt spray, and the green-flowered, evergreen *Bupleurum fruticosum* and most euonymus and pittosporums thrive. Gorse, genista, brooms and the green-stemmed, almost kafless *Spartium junceum*, with long sprays of yellow, fragrant, pea-shaped flowers all summer, are others to plant.

Silver-foliaged plants also do well, such as Santolina pinnata and S. chamaecyparissus, pinks and border carnations, aubrietas, and Senecio 'Sunshine' and S. bicolor 'Silver Dust' and 'White Diamond'. Sea pinks (armerias), sea lavenders (limoniums), dimorphothecas (the beautiful daisy plants from South Africa), ice plants (mesembryanthemums and dorotheanthus), echinops, sea hollies (eryngiums) and red-hot pokers (kniphofias) are alleasy and natural plants for coastal gardens. As the protected garden develops, bulbs, roses and herbaceous perennials will also give a good account of themselves.

Escallonia

Many of the species and varieties make very attractive evergreen hedges with masses of red, pink or white flowers in summer or autumn, varying from variety to variety. Two of the hardiest and best for hedging are E. *langleyensis* with bright cherry pink flowers, and 'Crimson Spire' with bright crimson flowers. They are not fussy regarding soil type, and are excellent for use by the seaside where they will withstand salt spray.

Weather for Gardeners

'An English summer; three fine days and a thunderstorm' is an unkind, but not entirely untrue, summary of many a July. Thunderstorms are most common over southern and eastern England, especially after a light southerly wind has brought a short spell of sunny, warm weather.

The average rainfall in July is quite high over most of Britain, due chiefly to the prevalence of unsettled weather, sometimes called the `summer monsoon' The Dog Days, 3 July to 11 August, seem to enjoy their own conditions. `When the sun enters Leo in July, the greatest need will arise', `As the Dog Days commence, so they end'.

St Swithin (15 July) is the most famous weather prophet in July, but there are several other saints who have been recruited into the ranks of meteorologists and who are thought to bring us indicator days foretelling thirty or forty day spells of wet or dry weather at this time of the year.

Occasional rain or showers are more welcome in the garden than prolonged dry spells, but warm moist conditions can be favourable for the spread of many fungus diseases; in drier weather, pests are the greater problem.



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Fowey RNLI were sent to a broken down inflatable with 3 persons on board a mile out to sea being towed by a kayak! At 8.10pm on 5 May 2016 the pagers went off, the inshore lifeboat was launched in 7 minutes and on scene a mile off Porthpean within another 12 minutes. Within that time reports arrived of the inflatable having been safely taken to the beach but the three volunteer crewmembers continued to Porthpean to check everyone was safe. Jimmy Hoddinott, Jamie Gitsham and Callum Pritchard took the ILB class Olive Two at a top speed of 20+ knots across St Austell Bay.

They found the 3 metre inflatable on the beach surrounded by the group of kayaks who had found them, towed and escorted them home. They were given safety advice for their future safe boating, including the advisability of wearing lifejackets, carrying some form of communication and not travelling too far from the land. Luckily a friend on shore had realised they had problems and had called for the RNLI to rescue them.

Jamie said, " Even on a beautiful, calm summer's evening the sea can be a very dangerous place and, without experience and the proper equipment, a happy day's fishing can quickly have a frightening end."

The inshore lifeboat was returned to Fowey lifeboat station & ready for service by 9.15pm.
