Lansallos Parish News

MMF – what ever is that, you may say? It's something that can keep PCC treasurers awake at night, wondering how it's going to be paid each year. It stands for Mission & Ministry Fund and it's a charge by the Diocese on every parish, which primarily contributes to the cost of providing the ministry - priests' pay, pensions, training, housing etc - as well as in very small part towards funding administrative functions such as those that Diocesan House provides. (It <u>doesn't</u> go towards paying for our bishops and the cathedral, as some people may think, as these are separately funded).

The MMF is easily the biggest cost that each PCC faces. For Lansallos it's £8,077 this year, or £673 a month. With an average weekly congregation of just 10 people it's clear that collections alone will not cover this bill and we rely on fund raising such as the annual fete (see below), donations, fees from weddings and funerals, gift aid tax refunds and the occasional bequest to help us make up the difference. When the costs of electricity (about £1,000 per annum), insurance (£2,703), water, priests' expenses, churchyard and building maintenance, minor repairs and a host of other things are taken into account as well, it's easy to see how difficult it can be for parishes to pay their MMF to the Diocese.

The answer isn't, as some have suggested, to not pay it! Without our MMF contributions we would have many fewer priests – or even no priests. So it's vital that we try to maintain our contributions to the Diocese. If the bill for Lansallos seems large we should be grateful we don't have to pay as much as some parishes; ours is only a fraction of the sum some bigger churches have to find each year.

One of the fund-raising schemes we have at Lansallos is the sale of items such as books, tea towels, post cards and church correspondence cards. We've reason to be very grateful to Mrs Judy Dyke, an occasional church visitor, who has just donated a large quantity of shoulder tote bags printed with an engraving from the church pulpit. These are now on sale for just £4 each, to go to church funds. Thank you Judy, for your kind and practical help.

Another way we raise funds to pay our MMF is the Annual Fete. This year it's on Saturday, 29th July at 2.30pm in the Old Rectory Garden (next to the church), and will be opened by our Assistant Curate, the Reverend Gary Eve. It's a traditional fete with lots of stalls, games and an excellent cream tea, so don't miss it!

Where Brazen Island is now was formerly the site of a pilchard - packing factory, in use long before I was born.

Many a time I recall my father talking about the huge shoals of pilchards caught off the Cornish coast and the 'glut' of fish. Local women welcomed the news of such shoals and would be ready with the bowls and buckets to buy as many as they could.

What wasn't cooked for immediate use would be salted away for future meals - and very tasty these were with buttered potatoes - a nourishing, enjoyable meal always at hand.

I can remember Cornelius Pill standing at the corner shouting "Pilchards, Pilchards". Sadly, no pilchards are caught around here now and today's children will never hear that once familiar cry or savour the taste of a freshly caught pilchard.

Bodden or Bawden?

If your surname is Bodden or Bawden then it might be time to dig out the family tree as you could be in line for a free holiday. The Caymans Islands has launched an appeal to trace the descendants of its Cornish founding fathers, with the aim of flying them to the beach paradise meet their distant relatives. The search has revealed the two locations share everything from pasty recipes to a pirating past.

Eric Bush, the Cayman' Islands' representative to the UK, wants to be in touch with anyone who thinks they may be the descendants of a man named either Bodden or Bawden who left Cornwall in 1684 as part of Oliver Cromwell's army to fight in the Anglo-Spanish war.

He was one of 3,000 marines who sailed from Portsmouth heading for the Caribbean to invade Jamaica. He never returned to the UK but instead became the first recorded settler of the previously uninhabited Cayman Islands in 1658. Forty-two years later, in 1700, his grandson Isaac Bodden was listed as its first official inhabitant. Records suggest that about 100 people in the UK have the name Bodden while the alternative spelling is more common. The two spellings are thought to have arisen because the first settler could not write his name.

The Caymans are one of the largest British Overseas Territories, with almost 60,000 inhabitants, and many people named Bodden still live there.

Mr Bush has discovered Cayman patties are based ten a recipe similar to that of the Cornish pasty, and both areas hold regular pirate festivals to celebrate their smuggling past.

He said "As native Caymanians, we are very aware of our British nationality and heritage from a young age. Wherever you go there are pictures of the Queen, and the islands' ultimate authority is still the UK Government, represented by the governor."

"However, very few of us in Cayman were aware that our original British links are in fact from Cornwall which happens to be the part of the UK closest to us."

"As we have been looking at the connection, what has been extraordinary is how similar our native cultures have been over the past 400 years from aspects of both our language and dialect to boat-building, to fishing, to salvage, to inventive cooking - Caymanians have been carrying on like Cornishmen, but in the middle of the Caribbean"

Mr Bush said if they find descendants then they would want to take them out to Cayman and reconnect them with their family there.

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Pelynt and Polruan Academy News

From all at Polruan Academy

The year 2 and year 6 pupils were busy up until the middle of May making their final preparations for their SATs exams. They all gave their very best and we are very proud of how they worked on the tests. All of the year 2 and year 6 pupils are pleased to have completed their tests- they can now get on with enjoying the rest of the summer term.

Tregeagle class have been working on a topic based on the book called 'Wilderness War' where a group of children fight to save their small wilderness area on the edge of the city from a housing development being built on it. The class have thought lots about how they can care for their local environment and in geography have created mini campaigns to improve the local area. They have also designed and made their own bird boxes to attract birds to the schools' garden area.

We have also thought about how important it is to be inspired and passionate about the environment to do a good job at looking after it. As a result, we did some environmental art inspired by the artist Andy Goldsworthy. We also thought about how important organisations like the National Trust are to preserving and improving our areas of natural beauty. Canute had a busy half term with the topic 'Experience India'. We started off with a visit from Claire Louise, from Tesco Farm To Plate. We enjoyed sampling all the different Indian foods she brought to school for us. We learnt about Indian culture, geography (especially the wildlife and habitats), the Hindu religion and we

tried to make some Indian art work, for example the mehndi patterns that are used to decorate hands and the rangoli patterns that are a symbol of welcome. The highlight of our topic was visiting Pelynt Academy infants to meet Daya, an Indian lady. She told us about the Indian culture and some Hindu stories. It is only since I started the complaints procedure that anything has been done and despite getting the site working again no one has taken the time to explain what the problem was.

The station will be looking for a new hosting partner in the near future.

On a different tack, we have a very small team of less that 45 including trainees and we are finding it very difficult to cover three watches a day at present, which means that we could miss someone in difficulty. We would welcome additional volunteers who could keep three or four watches a month, no maritime experience is required and full training is given. 

I know that you will join me in reaching out to the survivors who have lost everything and having them in our thoughts as they mourn loved ones.

We have met once as a Council since the local elections and at that meeting it was resolved to elect me as your Chairman and Cllr Fisher as Vice Chairman for 2017/18. We have met twice since the local elections, and in the May meeting the following appointments were made to outside bodies for 2017/18:

Polruan Village Hall Committee – Cllr Kelly Fowey Harbour Port Users Group – Cllrs Adams and Carter

War Memorial Committee – this Committee had achieved its purpose and was no longer needed. Our thanks are due to Cllr Adams for the work he had put into this project

Whitecross Village Hall Committee – Cllr M. Shakerley The Churchyard Guild – Cllr Adams Age Concern – Cllr Bunt

Council Meetings: The Council meets on the last Tuesday of each month at Whitecross Village Hall with the exception of August. The Annual Parish meeting and any additional meetings will be at the Polruan WI Hall. We are pleased to see so many members of the public at these meetings. All matters are discussed in full Council meetings where decisions are made by the whole Council. We value your comments and questions so please keep attending, and make any point that concerns you during the time allowed for public participation. The Neighbourhood Plan meetings are also held at Whitecross Village Hall on the second Tuesday of each month.

Toilets: The Council has made consistent and strenuous efforts to ensure these facilities remain open. There is a cost element involved in this which is reflected in our precept. In this regard we wish to extend our thanks to the Town Trust for their generous offer of a grant towards the costs of taking over the running of Polruan Quay facilities in 2016.

Over the past four years the Council has successfully maintained, cleaned and kept in good condition the three toilet blocks and our thanks go to our contractors, Fran and Michelle. Ongoing projects are the purchase of the St Saviours Toilet Block and refurbishment of Frogmore Toilet Block.

Highways (Drains, Footpaths and Potholes, etc.): Owing to funding arrangements, the maintenance and frequency of repair of potholes and drain cleaning are the responsibility of Cornwall Council, and your Parish Council faces an uphill battle with the Authorities, to deal with what appear to be simple problems. We have resolved to institute a Lengsman's (Roadman) whose task it is to repair these simple problems using such basic tools as a sickle, shovel and iron bar plus that extremely old fashioned term 'Elbow Grease'. We are wary of being saddled with bureaucracy and expensive hydraulic equipment.

Traffic Enforcement: At present the old Restricted Parking Zone signage has been replaced and Parking Enforcement Officers are now carrying out their allotted tasks. A majority of residents wished this to be reinstated and we reaslise that this has made for difficulties for a very few residents. The Council is exploring ways of mitigating these difficulties.

Lanteglos Neighbourhood Plan: We have commissioned a Local Landscape Character Assessment Survey from Cornwall Council. This will be led by Ms CMLI, Landscape Architect. By the time you read this she will have led a training session for volunteers on developing the Survey. This then becomes part of the evidence for the Neighbourhood Plan and it will carry considerable weight when it comes to examination and referendum. Once the plan is written it then has to be agreed through a local referendum. If the vote is in favour the Neighbourhood Plan is 'made' and cannot be ignored when planning applications are decided.

We also have a draft of the more detailed survey that will go out to all residents. Questions in this have been based on what you have already told us but explore issues that are important to you in more depth. We intend to issue this after the development of the LICA.

Finally I wish to extend our thanks to Mrs Thompson who acted as Locum Clerk and has now been appointed as our permanent clerk and is proving invaluable.

Finally again thank you everybody for all of your assistance during the past four years and to more years of working together for the good of all our residents.

Planning Applications

PA17/03611, Headland, 3 Battery Lane, Polruan – demolition of existing dwelling and associated outbuildings to allow construction of replacement dwelling with associated works and refurbishment of existing garage. Members were happy with the design, but expressed concern about the disruption caused during construction. Mr Hancock said it was the intention to take as little waste as possible from the site.

SUPPORTED unanimously.

PA17/03981, Tinkers Green, 14 Hockens Lane, Polruan – second floor extension, new garage and associated works. Cllr. M. Shakerley left the meeting when this application was discussed. Cllr. Fisher said he thought there was a slight improvement. Cllr. Adams disagreed and said the overlooking issues are still present. The height was also of concern.

Members did not feel the previous comments had been addressed and, therefore, maintain their previous **OBJECTION** on the grounds it would be totally out-of-keeping with neighbouring properties and would have a detrimental impact on their privacy. It would be over development of the site. Cllr. Fisher voted against as he would prefer to see conditions to cover issues such as the overlooking.

PA17/04168, Sails, St Saviours Hill, Polruan – construction of garage / boat store with solar panels mounted on roof, to include new vehicular access. SUPPORTED unanimously.

PA17/01077/PREAPP, Land and Agricultural Buildings SW of Pont Cottage, Lanteglos – pre-application advice for conversion

and extension of agricultural barn to a dwelling. Members made **NO COMMENT** as they felt it preferable to wait for a full planning application.

<u>Planning Applications Withdrawn</u> – information only.

PA17/02174, Coombeland, Highway – change of use of agricultural land to form an extension to an area of domestic amenity space


EN17/00177, 4 Bones Meadow, Greenbank, Polruan – alleged construction of gabion basket design wall not being built in accordance with approved plans PA15/09540; namely safety concerns associated with the wall which is leaning out over the public footway and also the path which has not been surfaced. Ms Felicity Copplestone, case officer reported that following the meeting with Cllrs. Adams and Hannaford, a Planning Contravention Notice had been served on the owners of the land to seek appropriate information to progress the investigation.

EN17/00499, Lower Vevrey Meadow, Polruan – alleged untidy site and breach of condition 4 (hours of use) and 5 (not outside storage) of E2/05/00450/FUL.

Ms Felicity Copplestone, case officer reported that a site visit had been carried out and a possible breach of planning control found. Further investigation is taking place in respect of this matter.

EN17/00530, Pieds Dans L'Eau, New Road, Bodinnick – breach of condition 5 (CTMP) of PA15/11192; namely excessive mud on the road caused by construction vehicles resulting in unsafe vehicle access arrangements. Ms Felicity Copplestone, case officer reported the agent had spoken to the contractors to address the problems. This had resulted in a marked improvement.

EN17/00533, Land Off Meadow Walk, Greenbank, Polruan – breach of Section 106 agreement dated 31.07.2013 clause 2 of the Second Schedule Affordable Housing Contribution of £132,875 payment by the owner before the occupation of the third dwelling. Ms Eleanor Farnes, CC reported the matter had been passed to CC's Legal Services department who she understands are in communication with the owners to ensure the payment is secured.





Peter Rollings

Peter was born on the 26th September 1948. The 8th child of Garthfield and Muriel Rollings. The family home was the blacksmiths shop at Pont where Peter's father was the blacksmith. It was the family home for 53 years. Peter was educated at Fowey School. On leaving school he became an apprentice plumber to Tony Davis and when he had finished his apprenticeship he went to work for Ralph Butson until Ralph's retirement. Peter then became a self-employed plumber. He could turn his hand to most things including building and electrics and was one of the few people locally who could lead weld, a skill he has passed on to his son-in-law Kevin.

Most people knew that if they had a plumbing emergency they could call on Peter and he would be there to help day or night. Peter's son Paul worked with his Dad for 26 years. Peter would watch Paul struggle with something at work and eventually ask him if he was done, with a wink to anyone who was around at the time.

Peter was always busy with work and would often tell customers 'I'll be with you next week' and more often than not it would be several weeks later that he would turn up. Some customers were happy to wait and some just had to wait. Peter Ripley remembers a big job they had to do in Polruan, All the trades were on site in the October apart from the plumber. He turned up the following January!

Peter's van was recognisable by the unique filing system on the dash. "His mobile desk!"

Peter met his wife June when June's sister Roz and Keith Charman took Peter along with them to watch a motorcycle display and asked June to go along to watch as well - the rest is history. They were married for 48 years with 2 children Amanda and Paul, 4 grandsons Jack, Harry, Thomas and Zack. Son-in-law Kevin and Pauls girlfriend Sian.

Over the years Peter enjoyed many hobbies in his spare time. A favourite was competing in tug of war. He would load the family up in the van, Amanda and Paul in the back sitting on the pipe bender and blow torch like you did in the 1970's. Peter also enjoyed competing in sailing and fishing from his boat 'Driftwood 2' and helping out on his friends farm.

Peter enjoyed a pint and most evenings would pop to his local,' The Ferry Inn' or latterly 'The Crumplehorn'.

Peter had been battling lung cancer for the last 3 years with a quiet dignity, protecting and loving his family throughout. He passed away at home surrounded by his family.



After leaving the Cape Verde islands in April, Colin and Ana have sailed Ithaka to Lorient in Brittany. We were all planning a celebratory return here with friends and family gathered in Fowey to welcome them back to the UK this week but it hasn't turned out as planned. Here are some excerpts from their reports along the way.

YIT Update: Ithaka - May 13, 2017 Location: 20 45.442n 026 39.007w On passage, Cabo Verde towards Europe. We are settling into the ocean routine again. Watch follows watch. Day follows day. Our activities ordered by the sun and it's passage across our 6 mile circle of ocean. The wind has been steady. True trade winds blowing consistently between 15 and 18 knots and varying but a few degrees as the cumulus clouds pass over us. As ever we are rigged conservatively. It is hard for us to remove the first reef from the main and we vary the headsail area to keep the boat ploughing along, steadily, consistently, between 5 and 6 knots. Every afternoon an hour or so before sunset I take a trip around the deck. It is wet and I need lifeline and waterproofs but I like to take a good look at the rig before the sun goes down. Today I found a loose shackle, the pin half undone. It had been seized with a plastic tie-wrap which had broken. I replaced it with monel seizing wire.

YIT Update: Ithaka - May 14, 2017 Location: 23 05.141n 027 20.862w On passage, Cabo Verde towards Europe. Another sunny, trade wind day. Fluffy white cumulus, sparkling sea, Ithaka dancing through the waves with the occasional thump and bang but nothing too bad. We spendour time catching upon sleep, reading, writing and talking.


We left the tropics today, finally saying



goodbye to the sun which will reach our present latitude next month and then head south again. Tonight I looked ahead and found that we were pointing at the pole star, and last night the southern cross was only just above the horizon. There is little else to tell of our progress north. We are used to the ocean desert now - no birds no whales, no dolphins, nothing living sighted since we left Cape Verde. The two flying fish were both dead in the scuppers!

YIT Update: Ithaka - May 28, 2017 Location: 45 50.200n 011 26.370w On slow passage, Cabo Verde towards France.

YIT Update: Ithaka - June 14, 2017 Location: 47 30.022n 002 43.454w Anchored off Suscinio We have spent nearly two weeks languishing in Kernevel Marina just south of Lorient. Brittany is a wonderful place with warm summer sun, fresh air and a wonderfully energetic sailing population. It reminds us of Auckland. Everyone is on the water. Meanwhile, we have stayed off the water enjoying bike rides along the coast (bikes courtesy of the Marina at no cost) and into the local villages where we have bought



Today we had planned to start our passage north to Cornwall where we had hoped to meet up with our family and friends and celebrate the completion of our 5 year adventure.

Sadly, Ana's Dad had a bad fall last Sunday, and has broken a vertebra in his neck. He is 96 and the bone will not heal so he is likely to be in a collar for the rest of his life and will need 24 hour care. So yesterday the plans changed and Ana is now booked with Qantas for the 35 hour flight to Canberra next Tuesday. I considered sailing to Cornwall myself but Ana and I have come too far together and I know it would not be the same without her. So we are sailing to the Vilaine River and a small village called La Roche-Bernard. We will arrive there tomorrow and haul Ithaka onto the hard There I will "put her to bed" and leave her.....FOR SALE.



News from Frogmore Farm

Where have the last two months gone? Time seems to be flying by so fast. The men have been working very hard to harvest the silage crop. They had to wait for a good weather forecast and then all systems go. Tractors flying everywhere. Cutting the grass first, then it is spread evenly over the field to wilt. Two days later it is rolled into huge rolls ready for the baler to make the big round bales. These bales are collected and brought to the storage area where the machine that wraps them in plastic awaits. That is really fascinating to watch it turns and rolls the heavy bales this way and that until the silage is completely covered and airtight. The bales are then stacked with great care not to tear the covering. The silage will heat up and ferment to make up the bulk of the winter food for the animals. It's always a relief to know you have enough. The work goes on from early morning to very late at night. One day after finishing at ten thirty they were on the road again at five thirty am. All this can't be done without the help of our neighbours. Each morning the phones are red hot as the days are planned. This year it has all gone quite smoothly thank goodness.

We have been weighing lambs for marketing. Forty two kilos is the bench mark we aim for. Of course they have to have a good conformation of meat and a little covering of fat for the flavour.



Rosie the pet cow had her calf a couple of weeks ago. As we predicted she wasn't prepared to put any effort into the birth. Rosie stood outside the house early one morning. She kept calling until Simon went out to her. She then marched to the gate leading to the cow's house and waited to be let through. Once in the house she waited for fresh straw to be spread. Ben spread the straw over half the house. Unfortunately it wasn't where she wanted it. So we had to move it to the corner where she had chosen. We checked the calf to see if it was presenting well. It was all in place for a straight forward birth. We decided to leave her for ninety minutes, hoping Rosie would get on with the job.



The young farmers clubs welcome anyone, farmers or not. They make thousands of pounds for charities while having fun at the same time.

Heronry Census at Penpoll

Heronries are the places where Grey Herons and Little Egrets gather to nest. Nesting often persists for many decades at the same location and becomes very well known to birdwatchers. Grey Herons in particular are monitored efficiently and accurately by counting 'apparently occupied nests' in their heronries.

The Friends of the Fowey Estuary took part in their first Heronries Census in 2013 counting the known heronry at Penpoll Creek. Now in our 5th year, we are very familiar with the nest site which has to be viewed from the opposite bank of the creek at Haye Farm. In 2015, we also noticed nesting activity at Hay Point which is now recorded as a sub-colony in the census

We make several visits to view the heronry starting in January or February when nesting activity starts and we usually make our highest count by April, the earlier visits allow us to 'get our eye in' and look for new nesting areas. We submit the Year's Best Estimate to the BTO which is the highest number of occupied nests during that year.

The 2017 census got off to a good start in early February with 12 occupied nests seen at the Penpoll Creek site, the highest number we've counted there so early in the year. Our final visit to Penpoll in April gave a count of 14 occupied nests with 18 herons seen, including juveniles. There were also 3 nests recorded at the Haye Point site.

There continues to be debate about the co-habitation of Herons and Little Egrets; whether the Little Egrets move into the Heron nests after they are vacated or build their nests within the same colony. We have counted numbers of Little Egrets at the sites during our surveys and this data will also be submitted to the BTO.

Our thanks to Alix and Nigel Vincent at Haye Farm for access to their land for this survey and to all the volunteers who have taken part this year.

For almost 30 years the flying display by the RAF Red Arrows display team has been a highlight of the Fowey Royal Regatta. Thousands of people flock to Fowey to watch the amazing display, it brings together all the people of our disparate community to watch and creates childhood memories to treasure. Sadly in 2014 the display was discontinued due to new safety regulations and the impact on the Regatta week was massive. Its loss was felt throughout the area. In 2016 the Harbour Commissioners stepped up and offered the services of the Harbour Master and his small team to work to bring back the display. This has succeeded and a new style display which conforms to the safety rules is planned for 2017.

The display will take place on **Thursday** 17th August at 6pm with the Red Arrows thrilling us with their close manoeuvres just outside the harbour, this is in accordance with requirements to ensure a safe distance between the display and the viewing public.

The best vantage points for the display will be from Polruan and the nearby coast path and in Fowey from Readymoney, St. Catherine's Castle, Alldays Field, Coombe and the coast path towards Polridmouth. All these areas have limited road access and traffic management will be put in place to ensure the safe and most efficient access to these vantage points.

Viewing the display from small boats will also be popular, the movement of boats through the harbour will be managed and spectator vessels will be required to stay behind a buoyed line which will be marshalled using safety boats.

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IN THE GARDEN

General Tasks

There are weeds everywhere, but the ground can be hard and dry, making watering imperative, and much of the early colour will have disappeared. To maintain a tidy appearance and continuity of flowering with plants like sweet peas, roses, violas and pansies (except the F1 hybrids which are usually sterile), calendulas and nasturtiums, it is essential to stop them from setting seed. A few minutes spent removing dead blooms pays dividends, and if petunias and white alyssums have become tired looking and lanky, cut them back by two-thirds to encourage new growth and further flowers. Apart from annuals and tender bedding plants like pelargoniums (geraniums), heliotropes, gazanias and fuchsias - all of which should be at their brightest and best this month -one of the most reliable stand-bys for mixed and perennial flower borders is the herbaceous phlox. They are, however, one of the first plants to show the effects of drought: leaves flag, and growth is stunted so that only poor heads of bloom are produced. Dryness at the roots, which are very near the surface, also encourages mildew.

Apart from watering when necessary (we find that our well-drained soil needs the equivalent of 1 in. (2.5 cm) of rain (42 gallons per square yard or 20 litres per square metre) every week or ten days in August, either naturally from rain or by watering with a hose), it is a good plan to keep the ground cool and damp with compost mulch.



Weather for Gardeners

Although August weather often follows the pattern set by July, there is always the hope that a dry spell of warm sunshine will set in.


In Germany they pin their faith on the 10th: 'If on St Lawrence's Day, the weather be fine, A fair autumn and good wine may be hoped for', but an the other hand 'Thunderstorms at the beginning of August, will generally be followed by showers throughout the month.'

August is a wise time to launch a major onslaught an garden weeds to prevent the threat of 'one year's seeding, seven years' weeding'.

The rule is: 'Cut thistles in June, they ll come again soon; Cut in July, then they may die; Cut then in August, die they must.'

With the nights rapidly growing longer, surface cooling in calm clear conditions can lead to heavy dewfalls, for example on 24th August: 'St Bartholomew, comes the cold dew'.

24th August may also give some useful indication of subsequent weather: 'As St Bartholomew's Day, so the whole autumn'. and a cold misty start to this day is said to presage a hard winter.



Plant of the month


Cistus are small evergreen shrubs native to the Mediterranean region, where the white, pink or purplish-red flowers, which bear some resemblance to wild roses, are much visited by pollen-gathering insects. Commonly called sun roses, they are closely related to helianthemums, the rock roses of gardens.

In Britain, cistus need frequent renewal, for although young plants normally survive, older specimens can be killed off in a bad winter. However, since cuttings root readily this is not too difficult. Although the flowers open very early in the day, they only last a few hours before shedding their petals, littering the ground like confetti. The following day hundreds of new flowers appear, and this goes an for five or six weeks.

Bulbs

We need to start thinking about next spring in August.

Daffodils and other spring flowering bulbs which were lifted and stored earlier can be replanted towards the latter half of the month.

New bulbs should be ordered for containers, for beds and for forcing.

If you are near the coast flower height is an issue. Broken flower stems in spring gales is always a dissapointment-try some of the minature varieties like Minnow, Tete a tete, Jetfire, Canaliculatus, Hawera.

I cannot always remember where my bulbs were planted in previous years so I plant up new bulbs in large plastic pots and then in the spring when the old bulbs come through it is easy to see where the gaps are waiting to be filled.

Propagation

August is a good time for propagating bedding plants of all kinds by cuttings. At this season, while there is still plenty of sunshine and natural warmth, cuttings root readily in a cold frame, greenhouse or under cloches. Bedding plants - geraniums, calceolarias, penstemons and heliotropes - should show plenty of sturdy young shoots in August.

Gardeners frequently delay taking cuttings until frosty nights are imminent; then they fail to root properly, or rot off during the winter months. The earlier cuttings are taken, the sooner they will root, and the best cuttings come from non-flowering shoots.

Geranium Cuttings

For these use fat sturdy stems with three or four joints. The lower leaves are removed, together with any buds or flowers, and a straight cut is made with a razor blade or sharp knife immediately below the bottom joint.

Opinions differ as to whether the cuttings should be inserted immediately or left an a shady bench for a couple of hours for the wound to dry. Some say drying assists callusing at the cut, others that partial drying can cause cracks in the callus, allowing disease spores easy entry. It is advantageous to root geraniums in small pots of light, friable compost (because they are intolerant of heavy, badly drained soil) where they can remain throughout the winter.

Root Cuttings

Although plants propagated from root cuttings are usually dealt with in winter, herbaceous phloxes give better results when root cuttings are taken in summer. The plant is lifted, the roots washed and cut into 2-in. (3-cm) pieces. It is I mportant to keep them the same way up, so that the tops can be recognized when it comes to planting.

Gather the cuttings together in small bundles of ten or a dozen, tie them loosely together with wool and plant the bundles (right way up) in 5-in. (12.5-cm) pots of sandy soil. Stand the pots in a cold frame, shaded from sun, and keep them watered. Directly signs of growth appear, lift the bundles carefully, separate and pot up each cutting - if this operation is delayed too long the roots become hopelessly entangled.



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
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NEWS FROM THE TOWN TRUST

RNLI Polruan

Some observant harbour users will have noticed that our regular All-weather lifeboat *Maurice and Joyce Hardy* has been away from the harbour for some time, for a refit. She has been replaced by the Trent class lifeboat *Corrinne Whitely*, which our own Fowey station crew fetched from Courtmacsherry in southern Ireland, as a temporary replacement.

The new craft did not have long to wait for action: on the morning of 29^{th} April, she was called out in response to a $pan\ pan$ call from a dive boat. [A $pan\ pan$ call is an international radio distress signal, of less urgency than a $may\ day$ signal.]

The 33ft Woodpecker, with 11 people on board, had suffered engine failure and the problem was beyond the ability of those on board to repair. At the time she was drifting close to Cannis Rock. The new lifeboat, with seven volunteer crewmembers responded within seven minutes of their alarm pagers sounding. The stricken craft was reached quickly and towed safely into Fowey harbour.

Before this event, there had been a steady stream of 'shouts' for our local crews through the spring months. Firstly, our own All-weather lifeboat *Maurice and Joyce Hardy* was launched in response to a report of a paddle-boarder in distress. This turned out to be a false alarm, where a board had been washed out to sea from Port Mellon. The battered board was recovered and disposed of. Nevertheless, the callout was valid and the person reporting

was praised for taking quick action.

The following week, the All-weather lifeboat was called out again, this time to find and recover a broken-down dive RIB with complete electrical failure. The lifeboat located the vessel in distress, which had six people on board, about a mile off Dodman Point. The RIB was taken in tow and returned to its departure point at Gorran Haven, before the lifeboat returned to base.

Next, an exhausted kayaker was rescued by the inshore lifeboat after his kayak had capsized and he was unable to climb back aboard. He was drifting towards rocks off Spit Beach. His sister, in another kayak, had been unable to help him, so had paddled ashore and was signalling his position to rescuers. The inshore lifeboat crew quickly picked up the casualty and wrapped him in survival bags. He was then taken to Par Docks and transferred to an ambulance, suffering from severe exposure.

Polmear Island off Charlestown Harbour is well-known to local rescue personnel. This year's first incident there occurred on 16 April, when a group of nine walkers had crossed to the island at low tide and been cut off. St Austell Coastguard managed to lead six to safety, but the rising tide stopped further action. The Fowey inshore lifeboat was scrambled, rescued the remaining three and landed them at Charlestown Harbour.

These last two incidents show two common areas of risk, especially to visitors not used to local conditions. Firstly, the sea is colder than the air and suitable warm or thermal clothing is nearly always required when in or on the sea. Secondly, local tides are big —

on a spring tde the water can rise over five metres in a few hours, leading to shore ramblers and beachgoers being cut off.

Looking ahead, we in Polruan have two community events planned:

Lifeboat Day Saturday 29th July
This fun outing for all the family will be
held on the Polruan Coal Wharf and Quay.
The Fowey All-weather Lifeboat will be
moored on the pontoon, when all are
welcome to climb aboard and see the
capabilities of this fantastic craft. There
will be a range of goodies on sale, from
RNLI items, to cakes and produce. We
hope to have a Tombola stall, as well as a
sausage barbeque for all to enjoy.
