Optimistically this will all be behind us. We will be cautiously living normal lives, seeing friends and family, having fun, whilst being aware that viruses never truly go away. But surely the most important thing is what we have learnt through all this. As in the war years we have learnt to be helpful, we have curbed our tongues, been kind, paid attention to our gardens, looked at old photographs and letters and thought about climate change (and here I urge you to read David Attenborough's 'A Life on our planet') because we have had time and because the things which were important 'in real life' suddenly were not there any more and we couldn't hide. But Jesus said 'Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid'. We can try to manage that and when life returns to normal we can also try to maintain the quiet contemplation of time spent enjoying simple things and we can take the extra time to love.

I hope you can have a Happy Christmas.

Messy Christingle



Despite the obvious pandemic restrictions this year we are determined that Christmas will happen as much as possible – even if in a slightly different way!

We are still planning towards holding a socially distanced Messy Christingle Service on Friday, 13 December at 3.30pm, providing regulations allow it. This will require you to pre-book a family table for a maximum of six people (including at least one adult), as numbers will be limited.

However, in case we still cannot meet in church during December, we are also planning to prepare some 'Create-a-Christingle' at home packs which will include everything you need to make your own Christingles as a family, along with some other crafts. Even if we go ahead with the service on Friday, 13 December, there may well be those who cannot attend due to the number restrictions, so these packs will enable you to participate at home at the same time.

We are suggesting that the candles are all lit and then blown out at a pre-determined time, and then the candles can be displayed on windowsills until Christmas for children to 'spot' around the village.

News from Lansallos from John Feesey, Lansallos PCC

One of the main features of Christmas at Lansallos Church has always been the traditional service of Carols and Lessons, which usually draws the biggest congregation of the year (this year, sadly, is likely to be very different because of Coronavirus – we'll have to wait and see). But did you know that some of the lovely verses that we all sing may originally have had hidden meanings with political, satirical or propaganda purposes when they were written?

Research by Ian Bradley, emeritus professor of spiritual history at St Andrews university, has revealed that at least one favourite carol was probably published in support of the Jacobite cause, another to keep elements of the Roman Catholic faith alive after it had been suppressed after the Reformation, while more have been adapted in more modern times to parody political events.

O Come All Ye Faithful was written in its Latin form, Adeste Fideles, by John Frances Wade who was a fervent supporter of the 1745 Jacobite cause and "the faithful" referred to supporters of Bonnie Prince Charles. The carol was initially sung only in Roman Catholic places of worship and early manuscripts were decorated with Scottish thistles and the Stuart cypher, while the "king of the angels" was widely taken to mean Charles Stuart as the true king of Britain.

The Twelve Days of Christmas may contain a similarly coded message to teach elements of the Catholic faith when it was suppressed after the Reformation. For instance, "five gold rings", which is emphasised with a slowing of the melody, is believed by some to represent the five wounds of Christ and also the five



obligatory Roman Catholic sacrements.

The author of Angels from the Realms of Glory, James Montgomery, was twice imprisoned for his support of the French Revolution and riots in Britain with similar aims. The original carol's last verse, which described Justice repealing the sentences of those convicted of rioting and Mercy releasing prisoners, was considered too subversive and doesn't appear in our hymn books.

The tradition of adapting carols to political events also has a long pedigree in Britain. During the abdication crisis of 1937 a version of another favourite carol began "Hark! The herald angels sing, Mrs Simpson's pinched our king!"

We're hoping to have our traditional Service of Lessons and Carols at St Ildierna at 6.30pm on Sunday, 20 December – but with carols being said, not sung, and without mince pies and mulled wine – but it all depends on events post-lockdown, so do keep an eye out for updates.

Marion Facey, editor of Lanreath Lifestyle, decided to board the no 77 bus outside the Punch Bowl Inn to discover the route to Liskeard. This is an account of her travels

"The bus arrived on time, was very clean and comfortable with mood lighting, and, as usual, I was the only passenger! The driver told me that I was his first passenger of the day and this was the afternoon service! We drove along the B3359 until Conon Tip where shortly after, we turned left and travelled up to the A390 to West Taphouse. We continued along the A390 through East Taphouse and thence to Dobwalls where we turned left at the roundabout and drove down the A38 to Trago Mills. From Trago Mills we continued down the A38 to The Halfway House where we turned right and headed for the beautiful village of St Neot. It was a delightful drive across Bodmin Moor. The next stop was Carnglaze Caverns after which we turned right and headed back up the hill to Doubleblois and thence down the by-pass to Liskeard arriving at 2.20. I alighted on The Parade, the bus then travelled onto the hospital and Morrisons".

It is really sad that this service is so underused and one wonders at its viability?

Thinking of leaving a legacy to your favourite charity?

Many of us leave a small bequest to our favourite Charities in our wills. Significantly most Testators do not think to ask the individual Charity (or Charities) for a Gift Aid Form. If the Testator is a taxpayer, then a Will with an accompanying completed and signed Gift Aid Form, will allow the Charity to claim an additional 25% tax back from HMRC. And positively, the bequest will be discounted from any Inheritance Tax calculations.

A legacy of £100 becomes £125, one of £1,000 becomes £1,250. So please, if you do want to include a bequest in your Will for your favourite Charity, ask them for a Gift Aid Form, complete it and leave it with your Will.

Our Christmas Tree

Today, from early December onwards we see beautifully decorated Christmas trees in the windows of houses, in the stores and clubs and even on tops of houses. When I was young and also my children, our eagerly awaited tree was put up on Christmas Eve and was looked at and admired for the twelve days of Christmas, being taken down on the 6th January (in the New Year), which we knew as 'old Christmas Eve'.

My father and later my husband would pull up the river just before Christmas Eve and get a nicely shaped holly bush – berries on it were a bonus – and also some extra branches to put behind the pictures. Our tree was always hung near the ceiling in a corner of the room. This was usually the kitchen as that was the warmest and most used room. What excitement it was dressing the tree!

Handing up the fairy or angel to go on the very top. Carefully handling the little delicate shiny balls which would break if knocked or dropped. (I still have a few of these precious little balls).

There were little Father Christmas figures and bells and animals all made from chocolate. We children always had our eyes on them for when the tree was taken down. There would be little silver strands of tinsel ever so many decorations that children loved to make. An orange of two and apples, which took quite a bit of juggling to get them to stay on the tree and pretty little tin clip on candle sticks complete with tiny candles. These candles were only lit when a grown up was there and only for a short time to see them glowing because of the fire risk.


But it was more than enough to see them there, lit or not.

All the twelve days our tree was greatly admired and was proudly shown to friends and relations. There would be sighs when the tree was taken down and all the little decorations lovingly packed up to come out again another year. Not the chocolate ones, of course, they would be shared out among the children.

Letter from Nigeria

I think reports have been reaching you of protests in Nigeria. I would like you to know that we are OK and hope you will join us in praying that our Government will do the right thing. The protests, started by a youth movement (half the population of Nigeria is under 19) began peacefully and were in response to police brutality, in particular directed at SARS (Special Anti-Robbery Squad) which was formed in the 1980s to deal with violent crime. Unfortunately, this squad has become exactly the type of criminal syndicate it was set up to stop. Its officers are not held to account and the Government have failed to address the problem. The Government's handling of the recent unrest, leading to deaths and curfews, has further angered the youth movement already fed up with inequality, corruption and the politician's mishandling of Covid-19. What will happen in the future only God knows.

Last week Daniel had a colonoscopy and thankfully all appears to be ok. Then, following a strange reaction to drugs recently, the doctor recommended I had a CT scan but that too proved to be ok. God has been so gracious to us and we know He will keep us until the job He gives us to do is finished.

Kumi has settled well with my brother and sister in law, but Wrexham is under lockdown so he can't visit Grace. We ask that you continue to pray for Grace and family. Jason seems a bit better and so we thank you for praying for him.

The rains seem to have stopped and everyone is busy harvesting the corn on the cob, beans and sweet potatoes.

Thanks for your prayers and concern. We pray for you too and of course we know that the Lord is praying for us all. It is so encouraging to know this and it joins us all together as a big family.

Thank you for your kindness Angie, we are pleased that Polruan has given you so many happy memories.




Letter from Australia

I hope everyone in England is well.

The last couple of months have been quite hard for us as a family. On 11 September, our grandson, Gerard, lost his wife, Jodie, to cancer. She tried everything to fight it but it got her in the end and she left her husband of 18 years and their four children, Samatha, 17, Sophie, 15, Brook, 13 and Charlie-Anna, 10. It was Sophie's birthday on the day after her mother died. They live in Queensland and no one is allowed to go there, so we are unable to get to them to help and Gerard is having do everything on his own. I went to Jodie's memorial service, it was relayed from Brisbane. It was very sad, all you could



see was the coffin, with 5 chairs in front for the family and a lot of white tissues. Jim wasn't able to make it.

I have now had the operations on my legs to remove the cancerous growths, I am in plaster for 3 weeks and the nurse comes every second day to check and change the dressings. Jim too has had similar operations on his legs. Cancer is not treating this family well.

Jim and I can do even less now. The boys and Liz are doing ok. They still do our shopping every Friday which is a real help and check in by phone.

The weather is getting warmer here now – it's up to about 20 degrees and we had some showers over night which should keep the farmers happy.

It's our 65th wedding anniversary tomorrow, we're not doing a lot but managed to see most of the family at some point. Numbers were restricted but we managed ok.

I'm trying to get some spring cleaning done but it's taking a while what with looking after Jim and not being able to about myself too well.

There's a lot of very old programmes on the TV at the moment – things like Dad's Army. Still it's something to look at.

Sending all the best to our friends and relations in England and hoping you have a Happy Christmas.

Cannis — 1 July 2007 to 17 October 2020

Cannis first came to Polruan in the Autumn of 2007 and quickly became known by the dog walking fraternity of the village.

Cannis was a big broad headed good looking black Labrador but with a very gentle nature. He loved small children and they adored him. He never fought with other dogs even when

they were aggressive to him and he never barked!

Cannis loved his walks in Polruan, particularly on the cliffs and on The Hall Walk and swimming at Carne Beach.
Once on The Hall Walk he presented us with one of Robert's hens. Fortunately, he dropped it on command and the hen ran off unharmed. Another time, he went missing and was subsequently found swimming by himself on Carne Beach.

Although Cannis was too big to come sailing with us on Zircon (he would never have fitted in the cockpit), he loved getting into Dunlin, our motor boat, and we would take him for walks at Golant or in the fields above Penmarlem where we stopped at the café and

he was given a bowl of ice cubes, which he loved, and some treats.

Cannis was a natural but rather over enthusiastic gun dog. When taken shooting, at the first whistle at the start of a drive, he would immediately sit at heel, tail wagging and on the alert for the first pheasant to drop.

He would then rush in to pick it up and, as other pheasants dropped he would try to pick them up as well. On one occasion when shooting at Carneggan, Cannis went missing at lunch time and was found in the game larder with all the pheasants, fortunately out of his reach.

The day before he died we took him for his favourite walk along the cliffs in fabulous weather and

he was on great form, so it was a shock that he decided he had enough of life on the Saturday. Cannis adored and was adored by our whole family and will leave a large hole in our lives but at least he chose to end his life in the place he loved best, Polruan.

Dear Gillian

Thank you for your letter dated 29th October and received on 2rd November 2020 regarding Flu Vaccination clinics being held at Polruan.

In regards to the patients who do not have access to the internet, there is a telephone number that they could call to book their appointment at the call centre, or they could telephone the surgery who would have been able to book the appointment for them.

For any patients that were unable to attend the Eden Project when they have contacted the surgery they have been put onto a waiting list so that once the flu clinics have been completed at our Covid Safe site at Eden we would know the amount of patients that were unable to attend and make appropriate arrangements for a Covid Safe Flu clinic in Polruan. Those that did attend Eden have given us excellent feedback on the service.

The housebound patients have indeed been accommodated and the majority if not all have now been

As you rightly say it is very important for patients that are eligible for a flu vaccination to receive one, which we are accommodating, as and when the vaccines arrive.

I would like to assure you that patients in Polruan will be receiving their flu vaccinations in the next few weeks, as further flu deliveries arrive from the government.

Unfortunately we do not have anyone available to attend you meeting on the 24th.



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
News from Nigeria

Sadly terrorists are still active in Nigeria. In early October some people were killed by Fulani Herdsmen at a place 15 mins from Vom which is where Kathleen and Daniel are living. Later in October Rev'd Polycarp Zongo was kidnapped by ISWAP (Islamic State West Africa Province which is a breakaway group from Boko Haram) and despite rumours of his release he is still in captivity. As a result of all three of these terrorist groups actions the roads are very unsafe these days and even a bridal party on the way to a wedding was recently kidnapped and held.

As well as the problems caused by the terrorists the rainy season has seen unusually heavy rains leading to floods, there has been rioting in major cities including Jos (see Kathleen's letter) and Covid-19 is still very active.

Recently I have attended two Zoom 'Former Missionaries Fellowship' meetings which have been very interesting and informative although generally the information has, sadly, not been cheerful! Some quotes that I noted down: "Nigeria is irredeemably corrupt"; "Nigeria's biggest problem is socio-political injustice"; "The political leaders keep the masses in poverty while they get rich"; "It is impossible to

"When you go home, tell them of us and say

For your tomorrow we gave our today"

In these strange times it was reassuring to be with other members of our community united in a simple act of remembrance, appreciated by us all.

Remembering

from Kathryn Hill

I have been doing a lot of remembering recently. I clearly remember the first time I was aware of Remembrance Sunday - I was a new Brownie in the Fowey Brownie Pack and got my uniform just in time for the Remembrance Sunday Parade! I can remember how proud I felt to be marching with my fellow Brownies and all the other organisations that were on parade that day. When I was older and a Guide it was in the Polruan Company and we, of course, paraded at our war memorial in Lanteglos Churchyard. There were Sea Scouts as well and both companies laid a wreath at the war memorial and Guides and Scouts took turns to place the Poppy Posy on the Unknown Man's Grave. I still remember the pride I felt on the occasions when I was chosen to lay the Guides' Wreath or the Poppy Posy or to be in the 'Colour Party' for the event carrying or escorting our flag.

The Easter I turned 11 we had our first family holiday and went to London and I can still remember how awed I was to visit the tomb of the Unknown Warrior in Westminster Abbey.

Our family didn't lose anyone in either World War but my Grandfather, Captain John Hill, was a Merchant Navy Captain in the First World War and my Uncle, David Fyfe captained merchant ships in the Second World War and both had lucky escapes from peril at sea during wartime.

In the early part of the First World War the German submarines would surface and fire a

shot across the bows of an enemy ship giving the crew a chance to abandon ship and only sinking it once the crew were safely away; however the German High Command gave notice that from 1 March 1 1916 they would attack without warning. Because of this Grandpa's ship, the SS Turbo, had been fitted with a single 12-pounder gun in Port Said in January 1916 and while on passage from there to London they were attacked at dawn on 1 March but fortunately the torpedo missed. Grandpa manoeuvred the ship so it was stern to the submarine to present a smaller target and ordered that fire be returned. Grandpa's Log Book notes are extremely brief:

"05.45am. Attacked by enemy Submarine. 06.30am. Resumed Course."

Grandpa was sent a certificate from the Admiralty, mentioned in the London Gazette and awarded an inscribed gold watch by his company in recognition of saving ship, cargo and crew.

Uncle David's ship spent most of the war in convoys on the North Atlantic where there was an enormous loss of shipping. On one occasion his ship sprung a leak so they had to drop out of the convoy. Fortunately they were able to repair the leak and, in Uncle David's own words,

"we ran hell-for-leather for Liverpool" - where they arrived before the convoy!

Each year at the War Memorial on Remembrance Sunday I do think of all those who died in war but I also give thanks that Grandpa and Uncle David survived when they were in grave peril on the wartime sea.


Anne Lamb (1926-2020)

Sarah, Stephen and Caroline would like to thank everyone who assisted with her funeral, especially John Halkes, who took the service beautifully, Peter Ripley for his considerate support, and also the wider village for the many kindnesses extended to them over this sad time.

Covid-19

The strange times continue and, having eased out of lockdown, we went into it again at the beginning of the month, which means once again we should not be seeing anyone other than our own bubbles in our own homes. This has been hard for some of us, when we consider what is happening elsewhere in England. Wales has come out of its 'firebreaker' and it will be interesting to see what the results of this are. We have to remember to stay responsible and alert; not so easy to do now that the weather is behaving in its usual seasonal way. In Cornwall we always did act in a responsible manner which shows in the official figures. There are still a lot of visitors here and the coastal path and villages are busy. Children are back at school but boats are now coming out of the water. I understand that the harbour is closed to all except commercial shipping.

I mentioned in the last edition how grateful we all were to the Polly Pals and others who have been of immense strength in Polruan with all manner of things such as collecting shopping, collecting prescriptions and post, collecting newspapers and generally being true friends. This has also been acknowledged by Colonel Sir Edward Bolitho KCB, CB, Lord Lieutenant of Cornwall, with further thanks to you from all of us. There are many vulnerable people in the Parish and this kind of support has been invaluable to them

Council Meetings

As you will be aware during the Lockdown we have not been able to meet in face-to-face meetings, but have held "virtual meetings". Details of all meetings, agendas and minutes can be found on our website, but not for the time being on all the notice boards. Members of the public will also be able to join a meeting on-line. Several people have already done so. For the foreseeable future the strong recommendation and advice is to continue to hold Meetings virtually, unless we cannot conduct Council business in any other way.

Council Contracts

The contracts for Maintaining the Public Rights of Way and Cleaning of the Public Toilets have now been awarded respectively to AI Services and Mrs Kathy Kelly. We are pleased to welcome them to these essential parts of maintaining the parish.

Polruan Civil Parking Enforcement Review

I have met on line with Ms Zoe Hall and Mr Androw Hawke to review the civil parking enforcement provision in Polruan during 2020. The following points were covered

1. Cornwall Council (CC) provide a Core Enforcement service and local Councils can

- request additional visits through a Service Level Agreement. Unfortunately this summer CC couldn't provide a Service Level Agreement due to the late request however we did enhance the Core service by increasing patrol times and provided some extra visits when we were able to operationally. In July/August the SLA was not able to put in place the twice weekly visits but Mr Andrew Hawke, CC Senior Civil Enforcement Officer did spend a lot of time in Polruan. Parking Enforcement Officers from Liskeard also visited over the summer period.
- 2. There were problems, particularly issues to do with the bus turning in East Street/Fore Street. Andrew has engaged with bus users and drivers. To the community the bus is a lifeline. He is trying to keep that area clear.
- 3. He has engaged with bus drivers, delivery drivers and a taxi. Advice has been given to drivers. There has been some congestion but with advice, that has been cleared in a few minutes. The café and pub were very helpful to a lady who had been stung by a wasp.
- 4. Traffic tends to come down in waves and he would be keen to know if we manage to arrange a meeting with the bus company. There were issues with one that was not on the timetable.
- 5. East Street continues to be a problem and illegal parking has been enforced again. One evening there was a street party going on, blocking access, but the driver, when asked, moved his car.
- 6. The Clearway into Polruan is not always adhered to and Penalty Charge Notices (PCNs) have been issued.
- 7. Androw has come on patrols twice a week during the Summer period and has visited Fore Street 51 times, East Street 31 times, the Quay 28 times. Has also been quite often to Townsend. There has been good community support. He has issued PCNs to builders' vehicles on yellow lines at Townsend and no-one is parking there now.
- 8. He will continue to make two visits per week but vary the times between 6.30am and 9pm. He will increase if possible. All this makes a good impact in the village.
- 9. Ms Zoe Hall, CC Community & Civil Parking Enforcement Manager appreciates the difficulties of coming out of lockdown. Ms Tracey French, CC had provided the technical support and provided the statistics. The Parish Council welcomes progress made and agreed we would like very much to go on working together. Residents are appreciative of efforts being made.

Fowey River Practice (see page 12)

We have been in contact with the Practice, concerning provision of flu vaccinations and a letter from them is re-printed on *Page 12*.

Repairs to the drains in Fore Street, Polruan

We are advised by Mr Dave Owens that SW Water has carried out repairs to replace the damaged drain in Fore Street, upstream from the manhole at Chapel Lane and relined the rest of the pipe from the end of their excavation to the downstream manhole at the bottom of the hill. The repairs to the SW Water network are now complete and also the temporary works area in the Vevery Car Park has been reinstated by Glanvilles. The final element of this work is the resurfacing which has also been completed.

Chapel Lane Flat (see also page 17)

This has unexpectedly been made available to let again and Councillors are keen that it is let to a local resident. Please see the separate notice elsewhere in the magazine and on notices posted around the Parish. To be able to apply it is essential you are registered with Cornwall HomeChoice.

Lanteglos Neighbourhood Plan:

We have yet to hear from Cornwall Council's Neighbourhood Planning Team that the

Designated Portfolio Holder has signed off our plan but once it has, it will all be published on

East Cornwall residents urged to stick to Covid-19 rules amid rise in cases

People in East Cornwall are being urged to follow the government's 'hands, face and space' public health guidance to keep Covid-19 at bay as cases continue to rise in the area.

Cornwall Council's public health team is asking residents in East Cornwall to stick to the rules and be especially mindful of how easily the virus can spread.

Data analysis by Cornwall Council's public health specialists shows cases in the east of the county are higher on average than in other areas.

Cllr Sally Hawken, Cornwall Council's Portfolio Holder for Children, Wellbeing and Public Health, who represents Liskeard East, said

"We're seeing cases continue to rise in East Cornwall and it's vital that we put the brakes on this. These are cases that are being transmitted within groups of families and friends, allowing the virus to easily move from household to household. In the past the virus has been linked to workplace outbreaks which are easier for us to contain, but this change in the pattern of spread shows us that we all really need to be careful. Even though we're currently in lockdown, people need to remember the basic guidance — wash your hands regularly, use a face covering when social distancing is not possible and try to keep your distance from those not in your household. Following these simple steps could make a significant difference in reducing the transmission of Covid-19 and help protect you and your friends, colleagues and family from the virus."

Rachel Wigglesworth, Director of Public Health for Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly, said

"While cases remain relatively low in Cornwall compared to the rest of the country and the announcement of a possible vaccine is great news, we can't afford to be complacent. Cases continue to climb across Cornwall - especially in East Cornwall along the border - where we urge people more than ever to follow the rules and be mindful of how easily the virus can be spread."

If you have any of the three main Covid-19 symptoms

- A new continuous cough
- A high temperature
- Or a loss of taste or smell

You must self-isolate and your household must continue to self-isolate while waiting for a test. You also must continue to isolate until you get your test results.

Anyone who tests positive must self-isolate, along with all members of their household, whether they have symptoms or not.

I don't know what the official gift for a thirty first wedding anniversary is but I'm sure it isn't three turkeys! Lorna was very surprised by Simon's gift of Fred, Wilma and Betty. Three very large white birds. We have had the odd turkey in the past given to us by friends who are moving house etc. Each one developed a personality and became very friendly. I hope the new arrivals settle in well and enjoy their new life.

A turkey is a big bird but not as big as the one that arrived in the field when Ben was drilling corn. He was working in a field in Trenewan when a white stork flew into the field and started following the drill. Ben had never seen one before, he took a photo of it and sent it to

his friends. Lots of amusing comments came back on his phone including warnings about what storks are supposed to deliver! Ben then came home and began to drill a field near Lanteglos church. Suddenly the stork flew in to join him again. We think the whine the drill makes attracted it. Some storks have been introduced to England in Sussex and a few were released to fly to Africa for the Winter. The strong winds we had in October must have blown he bird off course. It was last seen following a tractor in St Veep parish!

The cattle have all been housed for the Winter, the fields were so wet and muddy. Their backs were shaved along the spine to prevent them getting too hot. Hot muggy weather can cause them to get pneumonia which would quickly spread through the herd. Although it sounds dangerous to shave their backs they rather like it and stand quite still. The cows didn't seem to mind too much but the calves were very noisy for a couple of days.

Frank, the South Devon bull is going to be sold. His daughters are ready to breed now and we don't want any mishaps. We will all be sad to see him go, he has been so quiet and he has given us lots of beautiful offspring. I hope he will be happy with his new wives. We will still have

Fergus and hope to replace Frank in the spring. The cows were scanned to see how many were pregnant and approximately when their calves are due and thankfully all but one was expecting a baby in the Spring.

When I was checking a water tank last month I saw what I thought were some very tiny fish swimming around. They were a brownish silver colour and about half an inch long. We had no idea how they could have got there. We took a fishing net and a jam jar and tried to catch some. It only took a minute to catch about twelve. Looking at them through a magnifying glass we were delighted to see they were very tiny newts. We could just see the beginning of little legs. They were so sweet. We have put them into a pond now and hope they grow big and strong.

It has been a quiet autumn for Fowey Lifeboat Station. Pleasure craft activity was, of course, greatly reduced all summer by the Covid-19 pandemic. The delayed start of the season led to some boat owners leaving their craft ashore, while others lifted early, especially in the face of bad weather, with big seas and high winds through the autumn.

Early September was still mild, however, and the first week led to two 'shouts.' The first was in response to a 6am call from a small fishing boat with engine failure in St. Austell Bay. Fortunately, the conditions were calm and the craft was in no immediate danger. The inshore D-Class lifeboat responded, located the vessel near Charlestown and assisted it into Par Harbour.

Later the same week, the All-weather lifeboat responded to an emergency call regarding a RIB with engine failure off Gwineas Rock, south of Mevagissey. The casualty was located, with four people on board, none of whom was injured or unwell. The RIB was taken under tow to Pentewan, where it had been launched. The lifeboat approached as close as possible to the shore, then cast off the



RIB, which was paddled to the shore and recovered.

There were, fortunately, no further shouts to major incidents through September and October. Nevertheless, these past few months have been hard work for our volunteer lifeboat crews. All crew have continued to train under new Covid-19 protocols, and Fowey Lifeboat has remained on service at all times. Priority has been given to the development of trainee crew. This has been greatly assisted by a new casualty dummy, generously donated by St Austell Bay Boat Club, to train crew in the recovery of casualties from the water.

Looking ahead and with the blustery conditions continuing, walking along our cliff paths should be undertaken with care when near the cliff edge. And remember, always carry a means of calling for help and, when possible, inform someone of your plans before setting off.

Meetings

Polruan WI Hall has been used for meetings over the past few months. As November brings us another "lock down", this meeting has not taken place. An online Zoom meeting towards the end of November will replace this as a quick means for Trustees to discuss ongoing issues. We should be in a position to meet again at the beginning of December.

Trustee Vacancy

There were four applications for the vacant position. Mr C Mylward was the successful applicant.

Vevery Car Park

As previously reported, the Trust had been issued with a back dated business rates demand. Trustees are still looking into how this will effect the future operation of this car park.

Following the essential repairs to Fore Street, the contractor for SW Water has left a mess in their makeshift site compound. We are in discussions to get this rectified.

Go-Cars

This was mentioned in the last issue. If residents are interested in this car sharing scheme, please contact the Trust. If there is local interest, then the viability of this scheme will be considered.

Website

The Trust is looking into setting up its own website. The Clerk has been in contact with

Slipway Joint

As previously reported, this is in hand and hopefully will be completed before the new year.

South West Water/The Quay Lease

This has been a very long process! There are still a few issues to resolve, but these are minor. It is hoped by the next issue of this publication, the Trust can finally report that everything has been resolved.



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A memorable Christmas

In the early part of World War 2 Ken and I lived on the quay with our little daughter Janice in a three-storied house and with certain winds there was quite a strong down-draught. It was Christmas Day and our Christmas dinner of a precious roast chicken and pudding etc almost ready. The tree was glistening prettily and Janice was in her play pen having a real good time with her new toys (mostly hand-knitted animals and a doll made out of a black stocking and so on). The pudding and the vegetables were bubbling away in their covered saucepans and I had just taken the dinner out of the coal heated oven when there was a sudden fierce gust of wind and down the chimney came a big fall of soot. Some landed on our chicken and potatoes, some covered our table, some reached the tree, quite a bit made Janice resemble a black-bird and Ken and myself were almost blackened as well. I'm not given to crying but when I looked around I'm afraid that was just what I did. Ken got a bowl of warm water and cleaned up Janice and also my face, put clean clothes on Janice and got a clean blouse and coat for myself, got the pram from the outhouse and strapped Janice in it and then said quietly "Go out with Janice for a walk. Don't go to the families and spoil their Christmas Day. Come back when you've had a good walk." So off I went with the pram and I reached Lanteglos Church and back quietly crying in and out and we never met a soul. All were in their homes of course

When we got back home Ken had cleared away all traces of the soot, cleaned himself and had all fresh cloths etc on the table. The pudding and veg hadn't been hurt because of the saucepan lids. So Ken had washed the chicken and potatoes and made fresh gravy and even had some holly in a vase in the middle of the table. There was no TV or anything like that to cheer us up, but he sat us down and served up a piping hot Christmas dinner and pudding and I thought then I would remember it for the rest of my life and so I have.

Ken was called up a month after and Janice and myself moved up to my Mother's when he went overseas and stayed with her until he came home again which, God willing, he did. I wonder how many men would have cleaned up the chicken like he did and made good gravy to go with it!

He told me after the war that many a soldier overseas with him had to smile when he described to them what was a most memorable Christmas Day and how he turned what looked like a tragedy into a happy, heartfelt occasion.

Polruan Coastguard from Des Libby, Station Officer

As we start the second lockdown the village population has dropped down with the restricted travel policy brought back and the holiday cottages becoming empty again for a while. With fewer people about and the harbour looking empty hopefully the number of call outs with people getting into difficulty will drop off as well.

Training has started again which is good news for everybody even if we have to bring in special Covid-19 mitigation measures. It may be a new way of doing things with masks being worn, distances being kept, equipment being wiped down before and after use and much more but at least we can get our hands on the gear and get some practical sessions going again.

From the Station Log

8 September 2020, 1344: Team called to assist South West Ambulance Services (SWAS) with a casualty the on coast path near Great Lizzen. FM team stabilised casualty with broken ankle and extracted by stretcher to waiting Ambulance



27 September 2020, 14.32: Team called to assist SWAS with casualty extraction near St Winnow Church, working with Fowey

Inshore Lifeboat (ILB), casualty was transferred to the ILB and taken up river to slipway and waiting Ambulance

6 October 2020, 13.31: Team mobilised to assist Looe Coastguard Rescue Team (CRT) with casualty extraction near Hore Stone Point, Stood down on arrival

14 October 2020, 15.29: Crew tasked to back up Looe CRT

with two persons cut off by tide. Team assisted with full technical rescue bringing both casualties back to safety up the cliff.

25 October 2020, 16.02: Crew called to support Looe CRT with casualty extraction at Hannafore. Team assisted with difficult carry out along for shore to waiting Ambulance

Remember if you see anybody in difficulty along the coast line call 999 and ask for the Coastguard





Polruan NCI from Brian Cook

We undertake a visual and aural watch from 55 stations around the coast. We are looking out for boating or walking incidents and report these to HM Coastguard at Falmouth. We may then work with Coastguard and Search and Rescue services such as the lifeboat or SAR helicopter if we are required to assist.

The summer was very busy in the Lookout . . . lots of boating and walking activity once the original lockdown ended. We have been single manning to ensure social distancing and haven't been welcoming casual visitors to the lookout.

During the first lockdown we closed and didn't man the lookout. But for the latest lockdown we are open as we are now deemed to be an essential service. Apparently the Coastguard missed our input first time round. We are currently manning two winter shifts each day covering the period between 9am and 4pm.
