

Rev's Ramblings

One of my most frightening experiences in life was while playing rugby for my university. I was quite literally 10 meters from the try line. I picked up a loose ball and lumbered towards the line in characteristic fashion, only to be pole-axed by two opposition forwards who tackled me from the left and right. Winded on impact I landed in a deep puddle of muddy water completely submerged with a pile of players pinning me to the bottom of this murky pond. Mud and water filling my choking mouth. Quite literally I thought I'd be the first rugby player to drown whilst playing! I can still see now Dai Hughes, that rugged Welshman, pulling my mop of black curly hair above the water line so air could reach my gasping frame! Thankfully I lived to tell the tale!

At one level fear is healthy. Fear is an emotion induced by a perceived threat. It is a natural human emotion. It is God given. It is a basic survival mechanism. It keeps us alive. It protects us from danger. However, there is also such a thing as unhealthy fear. The Greek word commonly used in the New Testament is 'phobos' from which we get the word phobia. This is unhealthy fear. It is disproportionate to the danger posed. It is false expectations appearing real. It is when I catastrophise – overestimate the danger and underestimate my ability to cope.

Common phobias include fears in relation to health, finances, failure, growing old, death, loneliness, rejection, messing up, public speaking, flying, heights, snakes and spiders. They also include things such as, what is now called 'fomo' – the Fear of Missing Out, the fear of not being special.

In my own life, I have experienced many fears from a fear of heights to panic attacks and other irrational fears; fears about preaching and a fear of doing anything that might bring disappointment to the name of Jesus.

Whereas the spirit of God does not produce negative fear, there is a kind of healthy fear – the fear of God. This does not mean being frightened of God. In fact it means the opposite. It is an understanding of who God is in relation to us. It means respect, reverence, awe, honour, adoration and worship; it could even be translated as love for God. It recognises the power majesty and holiness of God Almighty. It leads to a healthy respect of God and is the antidote to all other fears and phobias we experience in life. Fear God and you need not fear anything else or anyone

It is no coincidence that as the fear of God has decreased in our society, all the other fears have increased. We need to return to a right relationship with God. The expression 'do not be afraid' is one of the most frequent commands in the bible. There are in fact 365 - perhaps one for each day.

The Organ at St Tallanus, Talland

The organ at Talland is one of only two church pipe organs remaining in our benefice and is quite a fine instrument. Its maker was an organ builder of high reputation, James Conacher of Huddersfield, whose brother Peter also built good organs. Their instruments are particularly revered in the north, and are instantly recognisable by their

characteristic decorative pipework. That in Talland is particularly attractive and comes to life startlingly when properly lit. It is something of a rarity in Cornwall, as **James Conacher** built only one other in the county, that in Gulval Methodist Church near Penzance, which

has long since closed.



The present Talland organ began its life as an undated instrument of two manuals and pedal in the Methodist Church, Shutta Lane, East Looe. It was moved to Talland by the firm of George Osmond of Taunton in the 1960s, replacing a very small instrument by Heard & Son of Truro. That organ was undated too, but was certainly in place by 1936. The Methodist



church meanwhile later became a bookshop. The specifications of the Looe and Talland organs differ slightly, the latter benefiting perhaps from some extra stops added

subsequently at some stage by Raymond Greaves of Plymouth, but perhaps losing rather by his slight alteration of the great manual, hampering its ability to accompany solo stops on the swell. Some of the details can be found in the National Pipe Organ Register Nevertheless, it remains a satisfying instrument to play. Some of the flues have

almost a French sound to them and most of the louder stops speak strongly and lead well. The quieter stops are perhaps the most appealing though, and in general almost all the stops combine well. The organ is built like a battleship, like all Conachers and has lasted well, though

there are areas which need attention and essential improvements are slowly being made. It is maintained by Lance Foy of Truro, who recently updated and improved the pedalboard and replaced the rather weak reed stop with a superior one from Duloe, adding greatly to the bite and power of the full organ.

The organ is treasured by the present church members and those who play it, and rightly so, and I enjoy using it as a regular practice instrument.


News from Lansallos

from John Feasey, Lansallos PCC

This year we celebrate the 700th anniversary of the completion of the present Lansallos Church (the third place of worship on the site) and its dedication to St Ildierna in 1321AD, during the incumbency of Richard de Kernyre – and, yes, the rector was another Richard! The building would have looked quite different from the church we know today, as the tower, porch and probably two aisles were later additions in the late 15th century.

But have you thought what must have been involved in constructing such a large building without the benefit of more recent technology? There would have been no blueprints as we know them today, but just a sketch plan on vellum by the master mason, a very skilled artisan. The basic building material was slate, with shillet infill, stones being quarried as close as possible to the site to minimise the need to transport such heavy loads. Materials from the previous Norman church were also recycled, including the limestone font from Normandy. As the walls grew higher, external and internal scaffolding would have been built of wood by a team of carpenters. To get the heavy stones to the top, systems of wooden pulleys and ropes were employed, probably helped by a human treadmill (and what a job that must have

The real challenge would have been transporting the granite used in the huge pillars as well as for the arches, transoms and some window mullions. The pillars are each in one piece, weighing several tonnes, and the nearest sources of granite are Bodmin Moor and west Cornwall. It's likely that river and sea transport was used a much as possible, the road network of the time being very rudimentary. Having arrived by boat at Lansallos Cove, the granite would have been transferred onto wooden sledges to be hauled up to the village by teams of oxen. Deep grooves made by sledges can still be seen in the track leading up from the cove. Roofing



slates may have come the same way from quarries such as Delabole.

Although the Romans used cement and concrete, the secret of making these strong building materials was lost in the Dark Ages, so weaker lime mortar had to be employed. The interior walls would have been plastered and covered in colourful religious frescoes, now sadly long lost. There was probably little or no seating until the present oak pews were introduced in around 1500AD. The church would have been what we now call a "multifunctional space" being used for markets, meetings and plays as well as for services. We are so lucky that the building has survived really well for seven centuries despite fires, lightning strikes and even damage from shrapnel from an aerial dogfight during

Our 700th anniversary will be commemorated at 4.00pm on Sunday, 21st November, by a special service at which Bishop Graham, the former Bishop of St Germans, will be returning to preach. This will be followed by plenty of birthday cake (but we can't afford 700 candles . . .), wine, tea and coffee, so come along and help us to sing Happy Birthday to St Ildierna!

Another date for your calendar is Harvest Festival at 6.30pm on Sunday, 17th October, with cocktail pasties, coffee and tea to follow. Do join us in celebrating Harvest Home.






We have not heard from Mary for a little while, and I had been concerned as both she and Jim have not been in the best of health recently. Shortly after going to press for our last issue I received the following letter.]

Sorry it's been a long time but I had a very sick husband to look after and unfortunately he died on 19 June, he was at home with all the family around him.

I am very lonely now without him, he was the love of my life . . . Some good news though, Tamara and Brandon are expecting a baby It's a short note this time and I will write again when things settle down a little. I hope you have all had a good summer - Love to all the readers.

I've been trying to write for a while now but there's been so much paper work and things to sort out. Not helped by the fact I've been waiting for a cataract operation since January and now my other eye is getting worse.

It's been two months now since Jim died, I really miss him a lot and keep talking as if he's here sometimes. I'm coping well though and the family are really supportive and helpful and I have home carers coming in too.



The family did a good job at the service in the funeral parlour. We had the wake at the Wallendbeen Hotel, Jim's old drinking hole and gave him a good send off!

We are in lock down again and everyday more and more people are getting the virus. Thankfully I've had my 2 jabs and don't get out much anyway – I only go for medical appointments and the boys take me to those. They bring in my shopping too.

While we've been in lockdown I've taken the opportunity of turning out some drawers – you do hoard a lot don't you! I've sent bags and bags to the Red Cross – all good stuff as Jim dressed well and looked after his things. We're getting lovely weather here. All the best to everyone in Polruan.

I have been back to the hospital and the professor was very pleased with my progress. There are signs of improvement, so I am to take tablets for 4 months at which point my heart will be X-rayed again.

Sadly we had the funeral of one of the IDPs yesterday. His widow will come under our widows project, the childrens' school fees are being paid and neighbours have been very good to them. Please pray they will be comforted and adjust.

The Bible Study with the young people is going well and once a month they play games in our sitting room. Grace brought a few new games when she last visited which were popular, as well as Lego and Brunchum (they have called this COVID-19 because it looks like the virus pictures!). Pray for these young lives as there are so many temptations.

Continue to pray for Vom and Jos which have been subject to terrible attacks recently. We fear for the folk there. Thankfully things have settled a little recently, but for how long we don't know.

Unfortunately COVID-19 is spreading in Nigeria, some of the doctors are on strike and the country is in a mess and getting worse. All we can do is pray and thank you that you pray too.

On a more positive note, the rains are good for which we praise God and we are eating potatoes and corn in the cob from the farms.

May God encourage you and bless you as we work together for the Lord.

Planning Applications

PA21/05956, 52A Fore Street Polruan – householder application for proposed extension and alterations. Members supported this application.

PA21/06090, Polveithan Farm Lanteglos Highway – construction of agricultural shed as covered dung store for mid-tier stewardship scheme. Members supported this application.

PA21/06096, Penmarlam Caravan and Camping Park – S73 application to vary condition 3 of planning decision 5/78/0832 dated 2/04/1979. Members made no comment.

PA21/06903, Pont Sawmill Lanteglos

– application for a lawful development
certificate for the existing use of the building
as a residential dwelling. Members had no
objection, subject to a condition that a detailed
survey is provided to ensure the integrity of
the building is preserved.

PA21/06367, Rock Cottage Tinkers Hill Polruan – replacement roof structure, and substandard rear extension. Replacement with new rear extension and conversion of roof space. Members objected on the grounds that the height will increase by 2.3 metres and Members feel this equates to over development in terms of mass and the visual impact. Members request a "Daylight and Sunlight" report.

PA21/07112, 8 St Saviours Hill Polruan – rear extension and alteration of roof dormers. Members had no objection.

PA21/06500, 67 West Street Polruan – retrospective planning application to retain existing spiral staircase from garden to owned foreshore. Members had no objection but noted that no Notice 1 was included in the application.

PA21/07433, 9 Ocean View Polruan – replacement dwelling. Members had no objection but requested that the planning officer looks into the large increase in footprint and ensures there is sufficient green space around the plot.

Planning Applications Approved by Cornwall Council

PA21/03651, 76 Fore Street Polruan – extension for new bedroom and bathroom on first floor above existing kitchen to rear of property and new opening for a small window to the north west elevation.

PA21/02653, Ring O'Bell Lanteglos – full application for the proposed partial demolition of dwelling, construction of extension and provision of new openings.



News from Nigeria

In addition to the terrorist attacks and threats in Plateau State mentioned by Kathleen, there are numerous reports from all over Nigeria of both terrorist attacks and of kidnapping for ransom by criminals. There are some reports of both criminals and terrorists being arrested or killed by the military but these hardly seem to scratch the surface of the problem and Nigeria is a very dangerous place to live.

I have had two recent phone calls from former students and while each mentioned the fear and ongoing problems and dangers, they both seemed to have a much more positive outlook than I would have expected from knowing the dangers they face every day.

I came across a news item about the Duchess of Cornwall becoming a patron of the Mirabel Centre in Lagos. The centre, which was founded in 2013, gives free medical and psychological help to victims of sexual violence and they have helped over 6,000 survivors.





Nostalgic Jubilees 1935 - 1977

the late Mavis Cocks

Nostalgia indeed. In 1935 for the Jubilee of King George V and Queen Mary,

I was one of the five 'village maidens' chosen to represent Polruan for the Silver Jubilee. Using maiden names, we were - Veronica Jacobs (Miss Jubilee), Carmen Hunking, Ina Peard, Audrey Cocks and myself, then Mavis Tomlin. We had a wonderful time. I was 19 years old and we were all young and carefree.

Polruan had never looked as it did then. The magnificent arches, banners, bunting, and flags on the water as well as ashore. The weather was perfect. We were taken to St Wyllow and back in a beautifully decorated wagon and the atmosphere was magical. The village women, as always, provided masses of scrumptious food and drink for the outdoor feasts, the dances and the sports events.

Among the organisers were Capt. and Mrs Hill (Kathryn's grandparents) and Mr Rix of West Street. My father was one of the many helpers. It was the work of the men to see to the building and lighting of the beacon. My souvenir photo shows us clustered near it. On a sombre note many in the photo are gone and sadly I am the only one left of the five 'maidens'. We weren't given mugs - these the children had- but we were presented with our Jubilee brooches. I still have mine. I am so proud of it and would not have missed that wonderful time for anything.

I was a widow by the time of our present Queen's Silver Jubilee. I was crossing to Fowey to work in David Moss' newsagent shop (formerly W. H. Smith), so enjoyed the 'goings on' both sides of the river. Polruan was just as decorative and festive as in 1935 with the feasts, school activities and dances etc. Fowey was equally decorative with stalls in the street before the Church and people

I will point out one big difference - in 1935, all were locals - in 1977, there were just as many visitors as locals, the result of Cornwall being 'opened up' after World War II. The shop did a good trade in souvenir books, mugs, plaques and cards etc. The staff were given souvenir pens which I still have. I also have a mug and a beautiful plate.

Wonderful memories.

News from Frogmore Farm

More excitement in the Palmer family. Emma and Alun presented us with Angus, our first Great Grandchild, a beautiful little boy. Where have the years gone? Our son is a Granddad!

Angus Edwin James was Christened at Lansallos Church by The Rev Richard. It was a very special lovely service, very child friendly for all the little children present.

A cattle shed (thoroughly cleaned) was the Christening tea venue, decorated with balloons and bunting. It's very useful having big sheds for parties. Lots of room and fresh air to keep people COVID safe.



Unfortunately after yet another TB test we are now under restrictions again. Two beautiful cows have had to be slaughtered. It's very upsetting for us to see them go and more so for their calves who are left calling for their mothers milk. I was a bit annoyed by the lady with the alpaca, I know how sad she feels but she kept the animal for four years although it had two positive tests. It may have been isolated from other alpacas but wild deer could easily jump the fence and carry the disease to other animals. The press and famous people surrounded the alpaca to try to protect it from slaughter. No one was there to protect our animals. But then they are only

cows. It seems although cows have provided meat, milk and leather, feeding us and clothing us humans for thousands of years they don't matter any more. These TB rules, harsh as they may be, are in place to protect all of us from disease.

The sheep have been dipped to protect them from flies

landing and laying eggs in their fleeces, which when they hatch are maggots. They may not like swimming for sixty seconds but are so refreshed when it's over. The rams have been put with the ewes, hopefully we will be seeing lambs in the new year. Sophie won't be able to help with the lambing this time. It's not a good idea for pregnant ladies and sheep to mix. There is a disease called toxoplasmosis which can have a nasty effect on expectant



mums. All being well, she will be looking after a baby of her own in February.

There have been so many people in Cornwall this year, although it's lovely to see people enjoying our beautiful area it has caused us some problems.

Gates left open when cattle are in the field is really a nightmare. Someone walked through a field of forty plus animals (with no public footpath) and left a gate through to a corn field open. In the night, the cattle noticed this and went through into the barley. Maybe because it was dark they walked in single file down a tractor wheel mark. If they had started to eat the barley in any quantity they could have died because it ferments in their stomachs. At 4am we were awoken by cattle roaring and galloping around. It was still dark and I couldn't see what the problem was, I got dressed, took a torch and went to investigate. I looked over the gate and all I could see was cattle fighting. I was afraid to enter the field with a bull and his cows and calves all milling around. I tried to phone Frogmore but nobody answered. It was getting light so armed with a hefty stick I went into the field. I was shocked to see ninety animals all racing around instead of the usual fifty one. I realised that the two bunches had somehow got together but had no idea how. Everyone at last roused from sleep came and we had to take the cattle back to Frogmore and sort them all out, not an easy task. Luckily none of them was hurt apart from a few bruises. We later found that an electric fence had been knocked down as the cattle had broken through a hedge. Now there is a heavy chain and a padlock on the gate.

Simon and Ben have had a very busy Summer, they have worked all day and into the night to get the grain harvest done. We have a

> contractor to do the actual combining and Simon and Ben bring the trailers of corn into the sheds. The strange Summer weather didn't help our barley crop. The strong gale we had earlier in the season had knocked some of the corn down. The grains don't dry as fast on

the ground as they do standing. So the noisy, dusty drier had to be used. Roaring day and night until the moisture level in the grain was low enough to store safely.

The straw has been baled and stored in the sheds ready for the cattle beds when they are housed in the Winter.

Another farming year over, but the planning for next years crops has already begun.

In the garden

Top Tips for winter

Prepare outdoor plants for winter

The onset of winter can wreak havoc on the unprepared garden, with water-logging, early frosts and biting winds being common sources of misery for the unsuspecting gardener. Luckily, there are a few simple things you can do that will minimise the effect that winter can have on your garden and will see you well prepared for almost anything that the season has to throw at you.

Container plants are particularly vulnerable during winter. Often, they become waterlogged and this can lead to the compost freezing and the plant rotting or dying. The container itself is also at risk of cracking, if it is not frost resistant.

Raise the containers off the ground, as this has the benefit of aiding drainage and means the container is not sitting in water. You can do this effectively using bricks or pot feet which are available from most garden centres. Remember to remove saucers as these can also cause water-logging and should not be used in periods of heavy rainfall.



Insulate the pot by covering it with bubble-wrap—this will stop the compost from freezing and reduce the likelihood of the pot cracking. To prevent plants in beds and borders from succumbing to frozen earth, apply an organic mulch around the base, as this will retain heat and prevent root damage through freezing. Now that the base is protected, it's time to secure the top half of your plant. Frost and strong winds have the potential to devastate the non-hardy plants in the garden, often leaving behind traces of their work in the form of scorching, brown patches, stem-collapse, leaf-spotting and blackening.

Prevent these from happening by wrapping your plant in a frost fleece. These can be gently wrapped around the plant, ensuring all the tender parts are covered and carefully secured with garden twine or string. You can also use old bed sheets or tablecloths if frost fleece is not available.

Cover plants before dusk and remove the fleece in the morning, unless the weather is particularly formidable, in which case it can be left on until it subsides. Some hardier plants can withstand the occasional frost, but can suffer if they are allowed to thaw out too quickly.

This often occurs with the rising of the morning sun and vulnerable plants should be moved to a more suitable location, preferably one that is reasonably sheltered. It is also a good idea to move tender plants to sunnier locations, or indoors, where they will be able to withstand the temperatures better.

Plant winter bedding

Winter bedding is truly one of the miracles of the gardening world. While the rest of the summer plants are dying off, these colourful delights are just getting ready to explode onto the scene. They have a truly amazing impact on anything from the smallest window boxes to the largest palace gardens and November is



the perfect time to start planting them.

A few examples include the wonderfully colourful cultivars of Violas (pansies and violas), and the many unique varieties of Primula (primroses and polyanthus). There are also Erysimum (wallflowers) and Dianthus barbatus (sweet williams) among many other winter bedding plants that look spectacular in the winter garden.

They can be planted into beds, hanging baskets, containers, borders and window boxes for mesmerising winter colour.

The plants are usually available at garden centres in the bedding plants section and typically come in trays of 4-6 plants—meaning there's no need to choose between quality and quantity!

Provide food for winter birds

The classic winter garden would not be complete without the appearance of winter birds, which flutter in to feed and breed from November onwards. They are also joined by their cousins from the continent, which migrate to populate our gardens from Scandinavia, Russia and Europe.

The most well-known of these, which is also the national bird of the UK is the Robin. Other winter birds that are common sight in gardens



are finches, blue tits and nuthatches. These are joined by migrating populations of red wings, waxwings and bramblings which come to the UK for winter.

Providing food for these amazing birds will not only help them survive the winter, but is also a great opportunity to see them up-close and can bring a great sense of satisfaction—a feeling that encouraging wildlife into the garden often creates.

There are a number of ways you can provide food for winter birds and this includes putting out bird feeders with seeds, suet balls or blocks and a source of water. A simple bird feeder with a seed mix will draw in plenty of flying wildlife, like sparrows, nuthatches and finches which greatly enjoy sunflower seeds. Niger seeds are a particular favourite of goldfinches.

Do you have much over-ripe fruit sitting in your fruit bowl at home? Scatter over-ripe apples, raisins and other fruits on the ground to attract thrushes and blackbirds. You can also plant berry and other fruiting trees to provide food and shelter.

It is important to remember that birds need fat as well as grains and fruit to survive throughout the winter. The most common method of providing this food group is with suet balls and suet cakes. These are balls or blocks of suet, pork fat or coconut oil, sometimes containing seeds, insects or mealworms.

They can be bought from shops, but are just as easy to make at home. Simply take a half coconut shell or a hollow piece of wood and fill with melted suet. Then add your choice of seeds, insects or dried mealworms and leave in a cool space or fridge to set.

Once it has been set, you can leave it outside and watch as the birds flock to it. You can also put out grated cheese or bacon rind, thinly cut for smaller birds like wrens to feast upon.

When hanging suet balls outside, try to avoid plastic netting and opt for metal or plastic cages instead. This will prevent birds or any other curious animals from getting caught in the netting.

It is just as important to provide a source of water and this can be in either a birdbath or a shallow dish. Make sure the sides are sloping to allow easy access and top up the water regularly.

Spring was cold which delayed the beginning of the growing season and we have had some wet/dry spells that haven't helped the gardener. The result is that weeds have managed to take off, but vegetable production hasn't been what it should be in a better year. Notwithstanding this, we have seen good crops of potatoes, the various beans and some of us have grown good beetroot. Salad crops have successfully weathered the attention of caterpillars, snails (always prolific in Polruan) and pigeons. Courgettes have done well for some, but others have been disappointed. Outdoor

tomatoes have had a poor year because of blight.

Rhubarb has done well.

We have had good fruit crops, particularly strawberries, gooseberries, raspberries and blackcurrants. These always seem to repay the effort of looking after them.

We tend to concentrate in these reports on produce that we eat. We mustn't forget that many of our allotments have flowers. Some of these are for cutting, but others are simply to brighten up the plot. There are plenty of flowers around the allotments at the moment.

At this time of the year, we are harvesting and


then clearing ground in readiness for preparing it with manure for the next season. If we haven't already done so, we will shortly be pruning fruit bushes to maximise next season's production.

We told you last time that we were planning to have a wildlife pond on one of the plots. This has now been installed and the area around it will soon be landscaped.





Looking back on the past summer, the enduring effects of the COVID-19 pandemic meant that all of our regular fundraising events, whether the Pig Roast, Lifeboat Day or Flag Week, all had to be cancelled, to keep both volunteers and others safe.

However, as the summer season got into full swing the Fowey volunteer RNLI lifeboat crew were kept busy. On 11 July at 1:45pm they were tasked to assist a commercial sailing vessel with a person onboard who had suffered a suspected seizure.

On 17 July, a man collapsed onboard a yacht and lost consciousness. The yacht managed to reach Albert Quay where the crew assessed the casualty and, assisted by the Coastguard, took him back to the RNLI station to wait for an ambulance.

A request for medical evacuation was received at 4.35pm on 18 July. In Lantic Bay, a 19-year-old female had jumped into the water from the rocks and injured her leg. The crew were concerned about a possible spinal injury, so with the help of the Coastguard, they got her on to a stretcher and into Fowey's Inshore lifeboat. She was subsequently safely transferred to the Devon Air Ambulance helicopter.

On 23 July, at 10pm, the crew were requested to assist local police and the Coastguard near Carlyon Bay. A female casualty was successfully located by the Coastguard and police and no further assistance was required.

The month finished with reports of, firstly, a boy falling off rocks near Readymoney beach, which fortunately turned out to be a false alarm, and then a call to assist a windsurfer near St Catherine's castle. The lifeboat was launched at 6.53pm but was later stood down, as the windsurfer was found not to be in danger.

The busy summer season continued during August. In addition to assisting a drifting kayak and people stranded on rocks, *at* 3:27pm on Monday, 16 August, just after the Falmouth working boats had completed their regatta race to Fowey Harbour from Falmouth, the Fowey RNLI lifeboat pagers sounded.

Falmouth Coastguard requested that we launch our D-Class boat to assist a 4.6m rib that had lost all engine power approximately one mile off Pentewan beach. It was reported that there were three people on board.

Helm Adam and two crew, Graham and Callum, made their way across St Austell Bay to the casualty position. Initially, they had no visual sighting of the vessel. A search established that a local sailing vessel was standing by with the casualty vessel around 2.5miles off the beach, the casualty vessel having been pushed further away from the beach by a north-westerly wind.

An initial assessment of the three people on board was conducted and it was decided the best way to get the casualties back to shore was to tow their vessel into Mevagissey Harbour. Once in the harbour, one D-Class crew member was able to identify the fault with the casualty vessel's engine, and the decision was made to escort the vessel back to Pentewan beach once it was operational.

At 1:09pm on 18 August, Fowey's All-Weather lifeboat was called out to assist with a medical evacuation of an 82 year old male with a badly gashed leg. The casualty was on-board one of the Fowey Regatta committee boats and was receiving care from the St Austell Coastguard when the Fowey lifeboat crew arrived on the scene. The casualty was transferred to the All-Weather lifeboat, and safely returned to Fowey where he was looked after until South Western Ambulance Service NHS Foundation Trust ambulance resources were available. A great result with excellent multi-agency cooperation: the casualty has since been in touch to thank all services involved.

The month ended with an action-packed August Bank Holiday weekend:

At 6.01pm on Friday, 27 August, Fowey RNLI's inshore D-Class lifeboat crew launched. They responded to a call from the Coastguard advising that the Charlestown NCI had spotted three people in danger of being stranded on Polmear Island, a spot notorious for being cut off by the tide. Fortunately, on this occasion Fowey's lifeboat crew were not required and the shout was cancelled shortly after launch. Tidal cut-off is a major cause of RNLI call-outs and people are advised to always check the tide times, carry a means of calling for help and to tell someone else where they are going.

At 8.12pm on Monday, 30 August, Fowey's lifeboat crew responded to a call from the Coastguard. There was an urgent requirement to rescue a 49-year-old man who had injured himself after jumping off Charlestown Pier. Fowey's D-Class inshore lifeboat launched, travelling to Charlestown as fast as it was safe to do so, to assist the Coastguard Rescue Team, who had recovered the man from the water. The man had badly injured his leg and was in acute pain, so the Fowey crew supplied pain relief for the casualty. They supported the Coastguard and South Western Ambulance Service at the harbour and, together they aided the injured man, who was taken to hospital.

Commenting on this case, Chris Ogg, RNLI Lifeboat Operations Manager for Fowey, said: "Jumping or tomb-stoning off piers is a highrisk activity, and hazards such as submerged rocks or low tides can cause significant injuries. Fortunately, a member of the public raised the alarm and a collaborative effort between the RNLI, Coastguard Rescue Team and emergency services resulted in the man being safely rescued in this instance."

Chris recalled: 'Our volunteer crews had not finished their work for the evening though. At the same time as the rescue in Charlestown, our crew responded to a call from the Falmouth lifeboat to help assist a twin-engine 32ft motorboat that had lost its propeller. After arriving at the pontoon in Fowey Harbour, the boat was subsequently lifted out of the water and taken to a local boatyard for repairs. This weekend rounded off what has been a busy August for Fowey RNLI, where we have faced some challenging weather conditions and call-outs."


KEEP POLRUAN SAFE

Town Trust Report from Robin Sainsbury, Chairman

Since the last report little has happened largely due to the ongoing COVID issues. The Trust have however distributed a large proportion of the monies left to the village by Marjorie Barrie. Several of the projects have been completed and others are well underway. There is a residue of funds and some of this will be used to set up a Higher Education Trust Fund similar to the ones in Fowey, Polperro and Looe. This will be to benefit young people going to university who have attended Polruan Primary and a local secondary school.

The environmental reports for the proposed works at Vevery Car Park have been received and we will now progress the project and have plans drawn up. As soon as these are available we will invite and welcome comments from the public on the scheme.

The electric charge point at St Saviour Car Park has been out of commission since earlier this year, due to the supplier not paying the Trust for over a year. We are now close to agreeing terms to have this facility switched back on.

During the coming weeks the Winkle Picker, Doctor's Surgery and Quay area will under go external decorations as they are now due, this work was put out to tender and Ian Liston was the successful contractor and plans to start within the next few days.

With the increased number of COVID cases in the village the decision was taken to postpone the AGM until next April, the Chairman's Report and the Accounts for the year are on display on the notice board outside the Reading Room.

Goodbye and thank you to Nick Beard

from all the Volunteers in Fowey and Polruan

On Friday 20th August, Fowey RNLI said a big thank you to Fowey Lifeboat's Second Coxswain Nick Beard, who is leaving after 19 years' service with Fowey RNLI.

Nick began his lifesaving career aged 18, initially joining Padstow RNLI in 1975, and later progressing to Coxswain and Mechanic on an independent lifeboat based in Harlyn Bay, near Padstow. After moving to Fowey and founding his business, Nick joined Fowey RNLI as crew, eventually becoming a lifeboat Mechanic and later a Coxswain. Nick has volunteered for 11 years in this role, commanding the crew for approximately 75 call-outs.

Nick's time with the RNLI has been an enormously varied one.

"My toughest shout was probably during the Fastnet Race of 1979. Those of you who are sailors will know it well as one of the most tragic incidents of the race's history with multiple lifeboats out for days. I was on the Padstow crew at the time, and we were out for 18 hours. I will remember it forever. It gave me the conviction to continue volunteering in lifesaving. On the other hand, I have many good memories over the years, including a shout for which Fowey crew were awarded for seven lives saved, and, of course, the day I was called to the office and asked if I would become Second Cox. I'll miss it".

NCI is a charity run by volunteers who man 55 lookout stations around the coast of England and Wales. We are looking out for boating and walking incidents along the coast. In Polruan we initially report them to HM Coastguard in Falmouth who have the resources to deal with the emergency.

We man the station in summer by running three watches in daylight hours. Our hours will be shortened during the winter.

We have had a very busy summer keeping a good lookout and logging vessels in and out of the harbour. While commercial activity continued through lockdown, since it was lifted there has been a huge increase in leisure traffic. One notable feature of this summer compared with previous years is the great increase in the use of canoes and paddle boards. It is common now to see them leaving the harbour for Lantic Bay or Polridmouth. Given that they don't usually have any safety cover and the paddlers often don't wear buoyancy aids, these trips are undoubtedly hazardous and are a great concern. We particularly keep an eye on these potentially vulnerable people.

We are currently planning the detail of the refurbishment of the lookout and expect the work to be undertaken this autumn

and winter. During this period a temporary facility will be in place so that a watch can be maintained as usual.

We have a weather station that is on line 24 hours a day at polruan@nci.com.

We are keen to recruit additional volunteers. No nautical experience is needed as comprehensive training is given. If you are interested, call into the lookout and have a word with the duty watch-keeper.

We were involved in four emergency incidents in August.

Keep testing for Cornwall



! Carrying out regular testing for COVID-19 - along with taking up the vaccine - is continuing to help to bring down Cornwall's rate of infection.

We're doing everything we can to help bring down case numbers after Cornwall was designated an Enhanced Response Area earlier this month. We've been visiting towns across Cornwall this week to talk to residents about the vaccine and give advice on how to stay safe.

Polruan Coastguard from Des Libby, Station Officer

After another busy summer the team have worked hard to carry out many rescues and no doubt as we move into the Autumn and the "staycation" continues, we are likely to have a few more. We have been trying something slightly different this summer by trying to educate visitors before they have even reached the coast. Our team have been setting up the new Air Shelter, kindly funded by the Barrie Bequest, in the car park at Lantic Bay and have been providing safety advice to tourists as they prepare to journey to the beautiful coast line and beaches. They have been handing out activity books to children encouraging them to stay safe, together with the ever popular stickers, book markers, beach bags and fridge magnets. Adults too have been targeted with safety material, all of which has been generally well received. Several visitors have commented this is the first time they have been to this particular beauty spot and many have no idea of the terrain that awaits them with the many steep and uneven steps going to and from the beach, often wearing inadequate footwear and

attempting the journey with camping trolleys.

- Know your limitations and don't take risks
- Have a means of communication and know where you are
- Check the tide timetable and weather forecast
- Keep a close eye on children, especially with inflatables
- Don't enter the water after drinking or a large meal
