Benefactors and Characters A recollection by Prof. David King

Broadly speaking, our grandfather Alfred King holidayed in Fowey occasionally in the 1930s. He was essentially a workaholic (and alas, in later years, an alcoholic) who worked his way up from a young boy working at a large chemical company in Birmingham called Albright and Wilson to become managing director; he was then very philanthropic with his handsome salary. He had a very nicely finished 24-foot motor boat called Ionik built in Fowey - she is now in the National Maritime Museum in Falmouth. I think that his wife Florence and my father John often came without him. They stayed in the Old Ferry Inn and would have known several people there, including the then young Donald Couch, who worked on the Bodinnick Ferry, and his wife Violet, who later became organist at St John's - there is a plaque to her there.

My father married during the war, and he and my mother holidayed in Fowey or Bodinnick every year from 1946 to 1994, except 1947. In 1946 they stayed in the Old Ferry Inn where, alas, they were unceremoniously thrown out for complaining about the food! They had very simple culinary tastes, and I think the chief issue was the quantity of caterpillars appearing in the salad! So, on their next visit in 1948, they stayed over in Fowey. They must then, I think, have heard about the project for St John's. Whether the proprietor of the Old Ferry Inn who so kindly donated the stable for this project was the same proprietor who two years earlier evicted my parents I do not know.

However, on this 1948 visit they were accompanied by my grandmother, Florence, and she must have reported the church project to my grandfather. My father always told me that it was my grandfather who donated the font, and my brother says he was told that it was our grandmother who donated the bell. My brother thinks they also made a donation, possibly towards the roof.

Incidentally, in 1956, aged 11, I spent a lot of the summer holiday helping - or possibly hindering - the ferry crew under Donald Couch, and they kindly gave a me a 3 shilling pay packet for services rendered. In later years, after I took up the organ, I sometimes went to the church with Violet Couch. They were a lovely couple, and of course their only son Leslie is still living in Fowey.

Rev's Ramblings

Why celebrate Christmas?

There is something almost magical about Christmas: Children dream of Father Christmas and his fantasy sleigh. We picture Christmas trees, snowy scenes, filled up stockings, piles of presents and smiling families around the fire.

The reality is often not as perfect as we imagine. Some people go over the top at Christmas. The overcrowding on the streets and in the shops can lead to so called Santa Claustrophobia and over indulging takes its toll on family life. One nine year old boy wrote

'I know Christmas should be a religious time but to me Christmas is a time for the necessities of life such as food, presents and

For some there is a danger of over spending buying presents that others do not need with money they have not got. One little girl wrote to her granny

'Thank you very much for the gloves you sent me for Christmas. They were something I wanted but not very much!'

Others can become over demanding. One doting father asked his small daughter well in advance what she would like for Christmas. Shyly she announced she would like a baby brother. To everyone's surprise and delight her mother returned from hospital on Christmas Eve with a baby boy in arms. When the father repeated the question the next year, there was a hesitation.

'If it wouldn't be too uncomfortable for Mummy, I would like a pony!'

While some go over the top, others go under. For many Christmas is one of the worst times of the year. Suicide rates go up, marriages fall apart, psychiatrist's patients suffer regression and family feuds begin. One MORI poll suggested there are three million family rows each Christmas. A newspaper article headed 'Enough to drive you crackers'! spoke of people cracking up as a result of the pressure to be perfect. Anthony Storr in an article on depression at Christmas entitled 'Cheer up its soon over', had this final piece of advice,

'Remember that Christmas, although recurrent doesn't last forever'.

With all the magic, the stress and the hype of Christmas are we missing the point? What is at the heart of Christmas? In the words of CS Lewis at Christmas we remember the central event in the history of the earth - the very thing the whole story has been about.

Why bother with Jesus? When Jesus was born a group of highly intelligent philosophers thought he was worth bothering with. They stopped everything to take him three symbolic presents.

The first was gold – a present fit for a king. The child in the manger was the King of Kings and Lord of Lords. God himself had come to live as part of our world. The point of Christmas is Jesus Christ. At Christmas we celebrate the birthday of the most important person who ever lived. He is the centre piece of our civilisation.

Why do we need him? The second gift the wise men brought was frankincense, which was used in the temple as a symbol of prayer and pointed to a relationship with God. You and I were created to live in a relationship with God. Until we find that relationship there will always be something missing in our lives. As a result we are often aware of the gap. One rock singer described it saying 'I've got emptiness inside'. Jesus is the bread of life who makes it possible for us to be restored to a relationship with God.

Why did he come? How would he achieve this restoration of our relationship with God? The third present gives the answer. Myrrh was used to embalm the bodies of the dead. Jesus is the only man who has ever chosen to be born in order that he might die. Mark 10 v45: He gave his life as a ransom for many.

The supreme reason for giving Christmas presents is to remind us of his gift to us the most valuable and expensive gift ever given. His death on the cross so that we could be forgiven and spend eternity with him.

Lansallos Church has just celebrated the 700th anniversary of its dedication in AD1321 to St Ildierna. But who was our patron saint? Known records indicate that he, or she, was either a Norman Bishop who was buried somewhere in the chancel, or a Holy Virgin. It's a question that's puzzled historians over the centuries. But thanks to some detective work by Churchwarden Josie Slade we may have got a step closer to finding out!

As all English places of worship would have been part of the Church of Rome at the time of the dedication, Josie decided to write to the Vatican with a request for any information that might be available. And, rather to her surprise, she received a speedy response! It's a fascinating reply that Josie thought might interest a wider audience so the letter (approximately translated from Italian via Google) is reproduced here:

"Most Illustrious Lady

His Excellency Rev. Mons. Prefetto sent to this Secretariat your letter of 28 September with which he asked for information on Santa Ildierna, to whom your church is

In this regard, I have the honour to inform you that from the work Bibliotheca Sanctorum vol. VII, page 772, it emerges that Santa Ildierna must be identified with Bishop Hyldren. I refer you for consultation to the entry for reference bibliography.

Please accept my cordial greeting,

Doctor Marco Grilli

Secretary to the Vatican Prefecture"

Josie has yet to track down the nearest copy of Bibliotheca Sanctorum (Library of the Saints), a document in Latin a copy of which is thought to reside in Exeter University. If it confirms that the dedication is to Bishop Hyldren then the mystery may be solved. As a Norman, his name would have been



Services of Remembrance

Pelynt Primary School joined forces with the Parish Church to hold an outdoor service on Remembrance Day with over 40 people gathering at the War Memorial.

The school children laid a special wreath with a poignant message,

'To those who had died, But their souls shall stand in pride, Even though you're buried in soil, You were always loyal. Thank you for everything you have done for us. Thank you for protecting our country. Thank you for sacrificing your life for us. We will never forget your brave efforts to keep us safe from danger."

After listening to the traditional Last Post and Reveille, The Rev reminded everyone of the sacrifices of war recounting stories of his own family.

His great grandfather had known the futility of warfare and had refused to sign up to go to the trenches of World War One. He had three young daughters aged 8, 6 and 4. Phyllis, Edith and Marge whom he loved dearly. White feathers were posted through his letter box as a sign of cowardice. So he signed up

and within a fortnight of being in France the sad news came back that he had been killed in action. My grandmother, Phyllis, talked of the pain suffered by that young family and recounted having to go with her mother every Saturday evening to register at the local police station for basic benefit. As it was in those days. The story has a sweeter ending. My great grandmother, after the war, met Richard Hanks whom I'm named after and who became an adored and wonderfully loved stepfather.

My granddad Tom, a professional footballer with Bristol City was in the squad for the 1909 Cup Final played then at Stamford Bridge, only to lose 1-0 to Man Utd. He had to give up his playing days apart from a few war cup appearances to go to the trenches. He found himself badly gassed, but thankfully he came home. He signed for Bristol Rovers in 1909 but his lungs were too badly damaged for any success. Imagine the millions he could have made a 100 years on as a premiership player!



We all have special family memories and this is a time upon which we can reflect upon them

When you go home tell them of us and say 'For your tomorrow we gave our today.'

We will remember them.




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News from Polruan Academy

On The Way - Diocese of Truro's Review of Ministry in Cornwall

As you are probably aware, Trelawny Benefice as part of our deanery, will be partaking in the 'On the Way' process which is part of the Diocese of Truro's review of Ministry in Cornwall. We have to look at the financial viability of the Benefice with a long term strategy for mission and sustainability of buildings. I will be outlining this process in greater detail with all of our PCC's in the coming months.

The Benefice is being asked to hold a number of consultative meetings which are open to all. The 4 meetings are listed below with their specific purpose:

Meeting 1: St Saviour, Polruan; Monday, 22 November at 7pm

We will reflect on the current picture in Trelawny Benefice, future possibilities and have the opportunity to pray together. Our agenda will include sustainability and viability of church buildings.

(It is very important that you attend this meeting if you have an interest in St John, Bodinnick and St Saviour, Polruan, as we will need to consider the best way forward for both these churches).

Meeting 2: St Nun Pelynt; Monday, 29 November at 7pm

We will reflect on the current picture in Trelawny Benefice, future possibilities and have the opportunity to pray together. Our agenda will include missional possibilities and innovative methods of doing church.

Meeting 3: St Ildierna, Lansallos; Monday, 17 January at 7pm

Conversations will be had about models of mission, church and pioneering fresh expressions.

Meeting 4: St Marnarch, Lanreath; Monday, 24 January 7pm.

Conversations about finances and buildings, as well as models of leadership and ministry.

There is no easy time to hold these meetings and this time scale is being imposed upon us. It is important that as many people as possible try to support these meetings so that we understand the voice of the Benefice and, more importantly, hopefully the voice of God.

We are anticipating proposing a sustainable model of ministry for the Benefice with a vision as to how we can potentially grow in the future. Proverbs 28 v18 Where there is no vision the people perish. Too many churches are characterised by dwindling congregations and a lack of finance. I genuinely believe that God has a plan and a purpose for Trelawny Benefice. He has plans to prosper us and give us a hope and a future Jeremiah 29 v11. Together we can explore the wonderful possibilities and new things that God can do. We must already be encouraged by our fresh expressions of church which we have seen in action all over Trelawny in the Summer and Autumn ranging from Tractor and Equestrian Services to Harvests of the Sea on the Old Coal Wharf.



Farewell to Mary Rashleigh

[By Ed. At the funeral of her late mother, Angela delivered a beautiful eulogy charting her mother's life, prepared by her and her sister, Sarah. A full transcript is available from The Editor but below is the essence of a fitting tribute to a lady who lived life to the full and who touched so many lives.]



Where to begin? An extraordinary woman who has been part of our lives, both family and friends . . . so let's begin at the beginning.

Mary Pym was born in London on 16 September, the only child to Enid and Jack Pym, and through her life was known as Mary Duvollet, Mary Lynch and Mary Rashleigh . . .

And of course affectionately known as Mum, Grandmother and Great Grandmother, which then became GG Mary and later Gadget Granny, due to her passion for gadgets, both for herself and wicked presents for her grand and great grandchildren.

Mum's great loves were babies, elephants, family, theatre, music, art, animals, nature, gadgets, humour (she was known for writing hilarious ditties about people) and of course ballet — and not necessarily in that order!

Her early life was spent largely with her mother and grandmother, Grace, living in Beaufort Street, Chelsea. Her father having been posted to Africa as Chief of Police on the Gold Coast. From an early age Mum was 'ballet mad' — a passion which was to linger throughout her life and at the age of 7 she became the youngest pupil at Flora Fairbairn's — Mayfair School of Dancing, Singing and Acting. Here she was affectionately known as Pymlet by the other pupils.

Mum left school at 15 and joined The King's Players, a repertory theatre company, touring with productions across the UK with plays such as Charlie's Aunt, Three Wise Fools and Time and the Conways. Sarah recently found a letter from Mum to her mother and grandmother which said she was very excited to have been given the lead role of Alice, in a production of Alice in Wonderland. She added, of course, she absolutely knew she would get the part! Mum had also kept a newspaper clipping quoting "Miss Mary Pym, realising a lifelong ambition, will play Alice". It would seem they weren't the only people she told!

During the war Enid, Grace and Mum evacuated to Topsham to be close to her great grandmother Marty, where she continued her education at The Maynard School in Exeter. After the war the family returned to Chelsea, London and Mum, determined to be linked to the theatre, whilst resting, worked as an usherette, and had the good fortune to meet and talk to Laurence Olivier. She also worked as the Wardrobe Mistress for the ballet company called, The Cygnets, and this led to her opportunity to dance a part in the Dance of the Little Swans from Swan Lake which she recalled was a very fast and difficult piece.

Whilst in London Mum met Roger Duvollet who, much to her delight, introduced her to the Chelsea Arts Club and Cornwall! Apart from Mum having her first child —me — she spent many of these early years holidaying in Cornwall having great fun and often spun yarns of her great adventures.

After separating from Roger, Mum met Stephen Lynch while demonstrating Art Master in Selfridges — their mutual love of music and laughing lead to marriage and four children — Sean, Sarah, James and Katharine. Mum introduced Stephen to opera, which was to become a lifelong passion for him and he in turn introduced Mum to and taught her how to rock and roll!

Mum loved her life in Chelsea and holidayed in Polruan where we stayed with Dr Douglas Roberts, Sarah's godfather. When he became ill and found himself heading for a care home, we upped sticks and moved to Keelson, West Street to care for him and repay the kindness he had shown to us. Our Grandmother, Enid, led the charge, taking Sarah, Sean and James ahead to enrol in the primary school, swiftly joined by Mum, Stephen, Angela and the newest addition to the family, baby Katharine. So, the house started filling up with children — us and others — and also dogs, cats and injured birds brought to Mum for rescuing and nurturing back to health.

It was at this time that Mum started using her skills as a wardrobe mistress to create wonderful costumes for those wanting to take part in Polruan Carnival. Mum's skills and imagination knew no bounds and as she got known for these talents, we often had visitors to Polruan turn up on the doorstep saying they had been guided by locals to our house, asking if Mum had any ideas or costumes for their children so they could join in. Mum never disappointed anyone.

In the late 1960's we sold Keelson and moved up the hill to a bigger house — Moville.

This gave room to the expanding family and allowed Mum to indulge her love of people, parties and family gatherings. During this time Mum had met and married Jonathan and our little sister Theone was born. Mum's version of Air B&B continued at Moville and guests became part of the family, such as Angelica from Germany and Mac and Juliette Macdonald from Australia and many others from far and wide, some of whom would return year on year, captivated by the madness of Moville.

Never to rest on her laurels, Mum was constantly looking out for new ventures and invested in Fowey Flowers — an artificial flower renting business. She indulged her love of gadgets, with particular interest in sound recording and knitting machines – constantly churning out woollen jumpers with computer controlled stitches. She was always seeking to learn new skills and this led her to learning to play the guitar.

Polruan Theatre Club was one of mum's greatest passions in Cornwall. Here she could fulfil her love of theatre and music by acting, directing, producing and creating costume and scenery design. Over the years, Mum made many lifelong and wonderful friends.

As the children flew the nest, a smaller house was needed so Mum moved to 10a St Saviour's Hill with Theone, Katharine and her boyfriend Graham, plus dogs, notably Gracie, who became Mum's constant companion.

Mum was a Steward for the National Trust at Lanhydrock House for over 20 years making many friends and this is where many of her famous ditties were written – a melting pot of ideas! She also wrote for birthdays, weddings and the Theatre Club and for many years enjoyed singing in the choir.

At this time many grandchildren and then great grandchildren began to appear. I remember one wedding meal as mum viewed the mass of family, partners, husbands, wives, boyfriends, girlfriends, children, grandchildren, great grandchildren saying — ye Gad — I'm responsible for all of you!

Mum was lucky to have very special neighbours and friends who supported her and provided friendship, laughter, dog walking and Sunday lunches, for which the family will be eternally grateful.

Three years ago, mum suffered a stroke so debilitating she was unable to live on her own or with family and resided at Hillcrest Nursing Home, where as you can imagine, she kept the staff entertained with her quick wit and sense of fun. Her skills on the iPad and iPhone ensured she could still enjoy her love of music, films, photos and discussions with the family.

There are so many stories, events and fun times we shared with mum, but before Hollywood comes knocking at the door to offer us to sell the rights of the Life and Loves of Pymlet . . . I will finish by saying

Mum was... Unconventional, Kind and loving, Inquisitive, Pragmatic, Generous, and often selfless, Entertaining, A good friend, Ready to listen and give sensible advice, Flirtatious, Creative, Calm in a crisis, Artistic, Musical, Ageless...

She was an optimist and maintained her sense of humour despite leading, at times, a very challenging life. As her children, we are privileged to have had such a unique and wonderful person to call Mum.

News from Frogmore Farm

What a wet Autumn we have had. The mud began to make life very difficult when feeding the animals so it was decided to bring all the cattle into the sheds for the Winter.

What a noisy day that was! As each bunch was brought into the yard they went through the crush, the cows went one way and their calves the other way. Some calves were almost as big as their mothers so it was time to wean them. They were put in separate sheds, bedded up with a thick layer of straw. They began to roar to each other, you could hardly hear yourself speak. The noise carried on all night and the next day too. The separation sounds cruel but it's only like a student going

to university!

On a dry day Ben sheared a few strips of hair off the backs of the cattle. This stops them sweating which will help to prevent pneumonia if the weather gets warm and muggy

Shearing doesn't hurt the animals, they quite enjoy it and stand very still while it's being done. All that is except one little heifer calf, she refused to go into the crush at first. When she was at last contained safely she wouldn't keep still. Her passport was marked NOT

FOR COW. She was cross.

Simon and Ben are now building two bull pens. Trying to keep two bulls apart so they can't see each other isn't easy. They roar and growl at each other. The bull breeder where we bought Hank (our young bull) said build two bull pens next to each other. They will roar and argue for a day then they will gradually get used to each other. These pens must be very strongly built. Two animals weighing over one ton each pushing the barriers calls for big steel and concrete



dividers, concreted deeply into the ground. I think I will be a bit nervous when the bulls go into their new pens.

The ewes have been separated from the rams who hopefully have done their job successfully. We will know in early December when someone comes to Frogmore to scan them. He will tell us how many lambs we will


> been put through a foot bath every few days. This is to try and keep their feet in good condition. All this wet weather is not good for hoof

managed get the ploughing and the tilling of the Winter corn done in a dry spell, just finishing as the rainy weather set in. It has all germinated and the fields have turned to green again. The farming year has started again. Well actually it never stops!

Frogmore have planned to plant

a hundred or so trees which will hopefully, in a small way, help the environment. A hedge has been built across the corner of a field adjoining a small wood. The hedge will protect the saplings from the wind and also the sheep and cattle.

I think if we all buy British food, mostly in season we will all be helping to save the planet. Meat from New Zealand, Australia and South America travel half way around the world to get here. British food is produced on our doorsteps.

During the last month we have had our society AGM. It left the existing committee in place and confirmed the membership subscriptions for next year. Prizes were awarded for a number


of vegetable competitions, notably Tammy had the biggest pumpkins and Des had the best

As the autumn weather drew in, on-the-water and shoreline activity slowed. However, the rapid response of the local RNLI was still

Fowey volunteer RNLI crew launched the inshore D-Class lifeboat Olive Two on Friday, 8 September, to rescue a man and a woman who were stranded on rocks, after being cut off by the tide at Polmear Island in Carlyon Bay.

The pair had called 999 to alert the Coastguard, who requested the Fowey lifeboat to launch. The Fowey crew quickly arrived on scene and spotted two people sheltering on rocks. Although the casualties had managed to get up onto higher ground the tide was rising and, had they remained on the beach, the water would have been at chest height.

On arrival, the helm, Callum Pritchard, put crew member Graham Middlewood onto the rocks to assist the pair. Helped by the other crew member, Peter Perry, the casualties were fitted with inshore life-jackets and helped into the lifeboat. They were then taken to Charlestown Harbour where they were handed over to the St Austell Coastguard.

Helm Callum said: 'Tidal cut off is a major cause of RNLI call-outs. People are often unaware that they are in potential danger and are not prepared. The tide around Polmear Island in St. Austell Bay is a notorious spot for catching people unawares. Fortunately for these two, they had come prepared with a means of calling for help. They did the right thing and called 999 for the Coastguard. We always advise people to check the tide times and heights and to keep a lookout for incoming tides before walking near the water. People should always make sure they have enough time to return safely and if in any doubt, seek local advice."

At 6pm on Thursday, 26 September, both Fowey lifeboats — the all-weather Trent class Maurice and Joyce Hardy and the in-shore lifeboat Olive Two — were launched to assist in a multi-agency search operation for a man who had not been seen since the previous morning. They searched a large area of the coastline from Gribben Head to Chapel Point, while a further search was carried out by the Coastguard along the shore from Charlestown to Pentair Point. This lengthy shout continued until well after dark, with the two boats returning to Fowey Harbour at 10.30pm, while the search continued on land.

Congratulations to Jimmy Hoddinott, who has been named as the new 2nd coxswain at Fowey RNLI lifeboat station. Jimmy joined Fowey RNLI as a volunteer lifeboat crew member in November 1999. He has been a coxswain for the past nine years, progressing to deputy 2nd coxswain and now 2nd coxswain.

Jimmy is a marine engineer who lives in Fowey with his wife Claire. Jimmy says: 'I love being part of the Fowey crew, they are a great bunch of people. My main motivation

for volunteering though is to help keep people safe on the water.

Jonathan Pritchard, 1st Coxswain at Fowey RNLI said, 'Jimmy is a great member of the team and becoming 2nd coxswain is a result of the hard work and dedication that he's shown during his time in Fowey RNLI. Jimmy is part of a team of four coxswains who volunteer to ensure that the Fowey lifeboats can be called out to help save lives at sea 24/7. Congratulations to Jimmy from the rest of the crew.

Jimmy's wife Claire says: 'Our family is incredibly proud of what Jimmy has achieved during his service; which is now approaching 22 years. I admire his dedication and have great respect for the work of the Fowey Lifeboat crew. The sound of the pager still makes me jump as he rushes off to respond to the shout, which can be at any time during the day or night, 365 days-a-year, in all weather conditions.

As part of the backstage work essential to keep the lifeboats operational, major works are being carried out throughout November to upgrade the pontoon and berthing piles where the All-weather lifeboat is berthed. The existing piles were installed over 20 years ago and were suffering from corrosion and wear. For the duration of the works, the All-weather lifeboat Maurice and Joyce Hardy will be moored on the pilot boat berth, thanks to the kind permission of Fowey Harbour Commissioners.

This project is essential to ensuring our volunteers are safe and the RNLI lifeboat can continue to operate from the pontoon for the next 20 years and save lives.

The RNLI is the charity that saves lives at sea.


KEEP POLRUAN SAFE

NCI is a national charity run by volunteers who man 55 lookout stations around the English and Welsh coasts. We are looking out for boating and coast walking incidents that, in Polruan we report to HM Coastguards in Falmouth.

As the days have shortened recently we have been running two daily watches from 9am until 4pm. There has recently been much less water activity than we had in the summer.

We are taking advantage of these quieter times to refurbish the lookout using Barrie Bequest funding. For much of November we have closed the lookout and have stripped it of old furniture and fittings. The very aged roof has been removed and reinstated with new felt, battens and slates, with some of the structural timbers replaced. We have also taken advantage of this roof access to incorporate insulation to modern standards. We believe that most of the old roof covering was original and had lasted about 150 years! We have redecorated and refitted new furniture as well as upgraded the radio and electronics systems and put in new floor coverings. We are very much looking forward to the arrival of our new radar system.

In November we had our first AGM for two years. After an interesting talk by a guest speaker, the existing committee was confirmed for the new year and the Station Manager gave his report. He said that this year we had been involved in six reportable incidents, most of them being in the busy August peak season. The refurbishment was also discussed at the meeting.

Since lockdown ended we have been training a number of new watch keepers who have joined the team. Recently they took their radio course which enables them to be certified.

We always welcome new trainees who need no previous maritime experience as full training is provided. If you are interested, initially call into the lookout and have a word with the duty watch keeper.

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Fowey Harbour News - Winter Newsletter

Stay Safe - Register your SUPs and Kayaks

It has been another incredibly busy season on the water for our team with vessels of all shapes and sizes enjoying all that the Fowey Estuary has to offer. We have again noticed that there has been an obvious expansion in the numbers of Stand Up Paddleboards (SUPs) and kayaks, not just in the lower harbour, but all the way up river to Lostwithiel and Lerryn.

These craft are easily accessible and relatively inexpensive and, whilst they allow access to the water for a wide sector of people, this comes with some safety concerns for us as the Harbour Authority. Users of SUPs and kayaks can lack experience on the water, especially around weather and tides, which can catch them out. We have had a number of incidences where our Patrol Team have assisted SUPs in the busy lower harbour. Although thankfully there have not been any significant injuries, with the sheer number of these craft on the water, it seems that unless we take some steps to educate and control things it is only a matter of time before an incident does occur. The Harbour Commissioners feel it is time to take early action to engage with these harbour users and reach out to them to provide some safety advice and local knowledge.

From January 2022, FHC are launching a safety campaign directly aimed at SUPs and kayak users which will require all SUPs and kayaks to register with Fowey Harbour before use. They will be issued with an annual licence sticker and harbour dues collected. The owner's details will be captured to provide them with safety information, but also be able to identify their kit if it is found adrift or unattended.

We acknowledge that many SUP and kayak users enjoy exploring the peace and tranquillity of the upper estuary and these safety concerns are equally as prevalent here where the receding tide reveals mud-flats and the scale of the estuary means people can easily become isolated.

As we move into the winter months with less boating activity and less people on the coast, we can breathe a sigh of relief as the number of incidents has dropped considerably indeed none at all during October, even with the large number of visitors about during the half term. Perhaps the safety messages are getting through or have I spoken too quickly, we shall wait and see!

Training is ongoing as we meet regularly on the second and fourth Thursday of the month either on station or location to maintain and improve our skills. Back in September we could be seen making use of the Pontoon off of Polruan Quay, before it was removed for the winter, practising our water rescue and safety skills with our new water rescue dummy.

Now is the time to think about winter maintenance and all the jobs that need doing to all the different crafts and engines over the winter including the effects of the new E10 petrol if left in your tanks.

From the Station Log

10 September 2021: Assist Looe Coastguard Rescue Team (CRT) and Inshore Lifeboat (ILB) with Medivac from Fishing boat, Looe harbour, team cleared Looe main beach to set up Helicopter Landing Site (HLS).

14 September 2021: Assist South West Ambulance Service (SWAS) with extraction of casualty at Polperro

25 September 2021: Team called to support Devon & Cornwall Police with person at Parsons Cove, Near Lansallos, using local knowledge team able to get Coastguard Response Vehicle (CRV) close to scene to ease extraction

Remember if you see anybody in difficulty along the coast line call 999 and ask for the Coastguard
