

The Rev's ramblings Hearing and doing

It might be good for the state of Britain if all church services carried a compulsory 'Spiritual Health Warning'. Imagine the Church Bulletin next Sunday bearing a red boxed message: 'WARNING attendance at this service may seriously affect your spiritual health'. Possibly congregations would diminish - but at least we'd be moving towards a more radical understanding of Christianity. In his open letter to Christians, James issues a spiritual health warning about the danger of hearing God's word and doing nothing about it. He would have some sympathy with G K Chesterton who wrote, 'The Christian ideal has not been tried and found wanting it has been found difficult and left untried'.

James was concerned that Christians get their act together and start to practise what they claim to believe. He pinpoints some areas for action.

Hearing God's word: Do not merely listen to the word and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says (James 1v22). That is a direct warning about hearing God's truth and remaining totally unchallenged by it. At the Parish Church of St Just in the Roseland, etched in the lynch gate is 'Do not merely listen to the word do what it says'. A timely reminder as you leave church.

Reading the Bible and failing to obey the message is like looking in the mirror and then going away and forgetting what you look like according to James' epistle. We all know about those frantic dashes in the morning where we try to rearrange the bits that are still re-arrangeable. That frantic mad dash can apply to our attitude to God. A quick glance at the Bible and a few disjointed prayers aren't the best way to build a solid relationship with God. James tells us to look intently into the perfect law and then he says we will be blessed in what we do. Looks intently translates peer into. It's the same word used of Peter and Mary when they looked into the empty tomb. James says do what it says!

So how well do we control our tongues. How is our faith expressed in terms of caring for people with deep needs? These are marks of true spirituality. True wisdom is seen in a pure life which is peace loving, considerate towards others, submissive in tough situations, full of mercy and kindness. It is recognised in those who are impartial in their judgement of others and have sincere hearts after God. These are the sorts of people who are peacemakers determined to build bridges for God – concerned to draw others in rather than cut them off. Doing God's will involves working it out in practical everyday living.




The Three Horsemen of the Apocalypse?

Soaring energy costs! Spiralling inflation!! Uncontrolled global warming!!! Every business and householder will be familiar with these "Three Horsemen of the Apocalypse" that seem to be hitting the headlines on a daily basis – and churches are no exception to their effects.

St Ildierna had six large off-peak electric storage heaters installed after the great fire of 2005. The PCC wanted wall mounted infra-red (IR) heaters similar to those used by Pelynt Church, on the basis that they are relatively cheap to run, provide almost instant heat when switched on and warm the congregation more effectively than many other methods. But our faculty applications were repeatedly turned down by the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) because IR heaters were considered "unsightly and inappropriate for a Grade One listed 14th century church".

So, storage heaters it had to be. They need turning on some 24 hours before a service and even then, because they work by convection, much of their heat rises into the ceilings of the church leaving little warmth for the congregation. Not only that, but the radiators have proven very expensive to run, especially as the cost of even off-peak electricity started to rise inexorably.

Last year, we succeeded in getting permission to install wall mounted IR heaters in the Lady Chapel. And guess what? They don't need to be switched on until just before a service starts, they heat the people not the air so are



much more effective - and our electricity bill has halved! It's a win-win situation, keeping service-goers warmer, at much less cost and with a reduced effect on global warming. We are now investigating the possibility of installing more IR heaters in the chancel and nave, so keep your fingers crossed and watch this space.

In order for Rev'd Richard to be present so that we can have a service of Holy Communion, the church service in Polruan on the fourth Sunday of each month has been at 9.30am. However, this time is difficult for some, so the PCC have decided to experiment with having a non-Communion Service at 11am on alternate months and then review the situation at the end of the year. There are also some special dates which effect where and when our services will be held and whether or not it is a communion service. PS — Jim will have been gone 12 months in June, we still miss him heaps.





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

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Letter from Nigeria

from Kathleen and Daniel

Folks have asked how we fill in our days, so here goes —

4:45am — the alarm goes and by 5am we start the daily Bible reading and prayers.

5:30am — the girls, Hannatu and Blessing, start to prepare breakfast and do some jobs before going to school by 7:30am. Daniel and I do odd jobs in the house.

7:30am — Daniel and I have our own Quiet Time. Daniel then carries on reading in the office.

8:30am – 12 noon — I work in the sitting room and do the accounts — giving out money as necessary to those building or going to the market. Each day is different, but there are always jobs to do. I've been sorting out our office and getting rid of unnecessary papers and sorting and distributing books received from the UK. There are always visitors and it's a good time to catch up with Internally Displaced people and hear their news

10am — Coffee break (something Daniel learnt from our UK visits!!). Sometimes it's biscuits or fried locust, if folks from Maiduguri have brought us some. I can hear you say ugh!! But honestly they're delicious.

12noon — Lunch, then if there are still jobs to do, we work for a bit but I find I need a good rest in the afternoon. So tend to play Sudoku, a game on my phone or read a book. Daniel will rest and read. If he hasn't visited the Block Industry or the building of a house in the morning he often goes in the afternoon.

4pm — Wednesday is Prayer meeting

4pm — Friday is Bible study

6pm — evening meal, then we watch the BBC News and then Nigerian News, followed by Bible study with Hannatu and Blessing.

It's early to bed, early to rise, makes a man healthy, wealthy and wise. I doubt if it is true!!

Recently I haven't been able to go to the prayer meeting and bible study activities because I am taking a diuretic — but I do enjoy my own Bible study – I have just finished Revelation and Daniel – I love these two books – it's so relevant for our situation

and encourages us as we know God will win in the end.

Some have asked after our health. Daniel's arthritis of the spine is reasonable and with the belt, massager and exercise, he does very well. In January 2021 we both caught Covid but mine developed into long Covid (and later in the year I developed Sepsis) for which I am receiving treatment. Having just seen the Cardiologist, I am making progress and am due a review in 6 months. We know you prayed for us.

An up date on some local news. The Karl Kumm University opening and the hospital Centenary are not yet sorted out – we wonder whether they will be? Please keep praying. Attacks on the Plateau are ongoing — so please keep praying for Vom. Trouble is expected for the main elections next year — please keep praying but we are in God's hands.

And other news . . . we thank Grace for her help with our UK accounts. She is home teaching Jason part time as he only goes to school some afternoons. Christabel and Jessica are enjoying school and doing well. Yusuf is still in Nigeria but hopes to visit them soon. Mark keeps busy with the Stefanos Foundation. He built some shops and units for renting out, so we ask you to pray that soon they will all be filled. Bethany finishes Hillcrest next year and would love to go to University in the UK. Pray she gets a scholarship. She also keeps busy with her cake making enterprise. Ella is in Primary and doing well. Pray for her future too. Kumi, in the UK, enjoys a busy time - his apprenticeship with day release to college (they want him to upgrade to day release at University) is a full-time job, he plays basketball and football and goes to the gym. He enjoyed meeting so many committed Christians at the Banner of Truth Youth Conference - making new friends. Our prayer is that all of them come to know the Lord as their Saviour and friend.

Thank you so much for your prayers and concern for us. For those who write or email us we appreciate having your news. May God bless and encourage you.

News from Nigeria from Kathryn Hill

As I think I have mentioned, I attend a Former Missionaries Fellowship Prayer Meeting on Zoom most months. At the May meeting someone shared an article about Nigeria from Open Doors magazine with grim statistics about those persecuted for their Christian faith in Nigeria. The article said that the Nigerian Church leaders commenting on the situation quoted 2 Corinthians chapter 4 verses 16 – 18:

"Therefore we do not lose heart. Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day. For our light and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen, since what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal."

I am awestruck and humbled by their faith and courage.

Some uplifting news — some of you will remember my late mother holding coffee mornings to raise funds for equipment and school fees for my blind students, including a talking scientific calculator and other specialist equipment to enable Emmanuel to successfully study for his BSc in Maths at the University of Jos. Emmanuel phoned me recently. He is married with four children, the eldest of whom is at University – that made me feel old! Emmanuel works in Abuja in the Special Education Department of the Federal Ministry of Education and, in his spare time, he is a volunteer maths tutor for blind students in schools in Abuja.

When Emmanuel was blinded by measles aged six his father assumed the only possible future he had was to beg and he only allowed Emmanuel to attend the School for Blind Children because it was free and a friend paid his fare to and from school. Emmanuel passed the entrance examination to the Boys Secondary School, Gindiri where I was teaching, but he was only able to attend because of funds raised by my friends and family. His father initially thought we were wasting our money but when Emmanuel regularly came top of his class he began to change his opinion. Sadly, he didn't live to see Emmanuel graduate from University and then get a well-paid job, but Emmanuel's mother did and was very proud of him as am I – not bad for a boy written off as only fit to





Heading north — cycling for Ukraine

Home in Cornwall now and looking back at my big bike ride from Bristol to Moffat it seems like another world. I just had to concentrate on finding my way and keeping going. I had some sleepless nights before I left mainly because I was worried about getting lost. I knew that the mileage I was planning each day wouldn't leave me with any energy for covering extra bits of the country - especially hilly bits. And if I didn't get to where I was going I would have no bed for the night.



With tyres pumped up hard and a bag full of Lucy's homemade snacks, I set off from Bristol. Luckily the first day went well and got me to just south of Tewkesbury feeling very upbeat. A good night's sleep and I was all set for an early start. Unfortunately I managed to pull the blind off the wall in my air bnb room. Felt terrible but left £20 and a message for my hostess. It wasn't a good start and it turned into my worst day. My power pack (which charges my phone en route) had failed so I couldn't afford to use the phone for navigation which uses a lot of battery. In consequence I ended up on busy main roads and frightened myself! Later in the day following the Staffordshire and Worcestershire Canal I was silly enough to get sun burnt and dehydrated. I arrived in Wolverhampton in poor shape both physically and mentally, feeling weepy and unable to make decisions. This is such an important lesson and I should have known better.

By the next morning daughter, Bean, had swung into action and organised a replacement powerpack for me to collect from Argos on my way out of the city. I felt back in charge again if you'll forgive the pun! The day's route was supposed to be all along the Shropshire Union Canal from Wolverhampton to north of Nantwich. It was going to be flat and easy. Ha ha! It turned out to be hillocky grass deteriorating into quagmire mud. Slow progress to say the least. For a boat this is a beautiful canal, very peaceful and with no noisy main roads nearby. Maybe a mountain bike would have done it but my old road bike was completely jammed up with mud, I was up to my ankles in it and after some 15 miles or so I began to yearn for smooth tarmac. Thanks to Bean I had enough battery to navigate myself a new route through about 33 miles of tiny lanes to Church Minshull. It rained hard for the last two hours but at least that washed some of the mud off.

Day 4 was mostly a day of big roads and conurbations as I crossed the Mersey and cycled through Warrington and Wigan and up to Chorley. Absolute highlight of the day was coming across the Marbury Lady tree carving by Simon O'Rourke at Marbury Park, Northwich. A fascinating spooky legend and the most beautiful piece of sculpture. Please google it and look for yourself.



Day 5 took me into Preston along a lovely series of leafy cycle paths, avoiding the big roads nearby and arriving in the huge and beautiful Avenham Park where I met a very jolly Flatcoat Retriever. From there it was up to Lancaster, crossing the River Lune on a sculptural new bridge and to my next night at Hest Bank looking over Morecambe Bay.

On day 6, after looking with trepidation at the elevation profile of Shap Fell on the edge of the Lake District and realising that I would probably be pushing the bike uphill for the best part of 10 miles to get there, I decided to re-route to the east and spend a day on the edge of the Yorkshire Dales. It was probably the right decision but a minor navigational error meant that I pushed the bike up what proved to be an unnecessary extra hill anyway. Even without the extra hill it was a long day at over 53 miles and I was glad to get to Penrith just as it started to rain.

Day 7. I had thought I might make a push to finish the remaining 68 miles to Moffat in one day but I was tired and it didn't seem like such a grand idea after all. Day 8 was still blustery with spits of rain but progress was good along straight roads through Lockerbie and on up to Moffat. The scenery was getting more beautiful with each mile and then quite suddenly I had arrived and the flags were out to welcome me.

It has tested me both physically and mentally and I am extremely grateful to family and friends who have accompanied me in spirit and sent messages along the way. I have covered a fair length of our country and everywhere I have encountered the kindness of complete strangers. I have also found support for Ukraine at every level with the Ukrainian flag flying in cities, towns and villages, in shop windows, house windows and gardens. Despite times being hard for many, the people of this country are doing what they can to help. Many have offered a home to refugees but are still waiting for them to be allowed in. Can it be that there is more compassion in the people than in the government?



News from Frogmore Farm



Good news, at last we have had a clear TB test. It was a stressful two days. All the cattle had to be brought into the sheds, not an easy task when there are so many cars on the roads! We try to stop all the traffic so the cattle can have a clear run without being frightened by engine noise etc. Most people are very understanding and wait patiently, but others get very cross. I'm sure a five minute wait is better than having your car door kicked in by a frightened animal!



The second day (three days later) is always the worry day. Will they be TB free? We can't be sure until the very last animal has passed the test. We took the opportunity to give the cattle a worming dose as they went through the crush. A much easier job than it used to be, now the wormer is spread along the backbone with a spray gun (we used to have to squirt it in their mouths). We also put some fly repellent on them. That will stop the hundreds of flies from biting them. That's not organic but the welfare of our animals must come first.

We had a very tiny calf born, her Mum wasn't supposed to be pregnant but the Bull must have mated her while she was still drinking milk from her Mother. We noticed her udder growing a couple of months ago and the vet





confirmed her pregnancy. She was put into the field outside the house. One morning on looking out of the window, this tiny calf was spotted. The young Mum looked very surprised when it tried to have a drink from her, she kept walking away, but the calf's persistence paid off and soon she was filling her tummy with the warm colostrum (first Milk) that all new born animals need in the first few hours of life. This gives them protection from all sorts of illnesses that calves are prone to.

Now at two weeks old, she races around the field at full speed, her little tail curled high in the air, then back to Mum for a drink again. It's so sweet.

The swallows were late arriving this year, ten days later than last year. They soon got to work repairing their nests with mud, chattering loudly as they worked. We are looking forward to hearing the chicks calling for food as Mum and Dad work hard to feed them. The tiny wrens who use the nests in the Winter were very cross when the swallows came back. One has built a very untidy nest in the porch roof but as yet hasn't managed to attract a female to inspect it.

The wild flowers in the hedgerows don't seem to mind the dry weather we had in April and May. The bluebells and primroses have been fantastic, the perfume from them as you walk along the road is wonderful.



The wheat and barley crops are now growing in the fields. We are hoping for a good yield this year because there will be a shortage of grain due to the ongoing war in Ukraine. Dairy farmers are having to pay almost double for the cattle feed needed to produce the milk we all drink. Poultry farmers have the same problem. It's a vicious circle.



Saving Lives

Through the generosity of the Fowey Community Hospital Welfare Trust, an additional defibrillator has been installed in our Parish at Whitecross Village Hall

This is particularly important for members of our community who live in more isolated rural areas.

Coast Medic, a National Maritime Ambulance Charity, supplied the equipment.

The defibrillator is very simple to use, with voice instructions given whenever it is activated.

A training session will be organised later in the year and everyone is welcome to attend.

Parish Council Report

Parish Council Meetings

The Parish Council have now returned to face-to-face meetings. Members of the public are warmly invited to attend.

Fore Street Drains

Mr Will Glassup, Highways had provided a further update on the drains in Polruan. He advised: "The data and surveys have been reviewed and unfortunately are not straight forward. The surveys completed to date show Cornwall Councils drainage out-falling to a South West Water combined line. From discussions with Cornwall Councils Asset Management Team, South West Water have a responsibility to make improvements to this line. The CC Asset Team are discussing this with SWW to find an outcome that suits all involved. Installation of a separate surface water line is not really practicable in this location so improvements to the combined line we have are the only feasible option".

Road Signage on Fore Street

Mr Will Glassup, Highways advised:

"I am doing some work this week on the reconfiguration and additional signage into Polruan itself. Original plans with Edwina and the Parish mentioned installing buildouts at the junction to St Saviours Hill, this at the moment is not possible without secured funding and will require a statutory consultation as outlined by Cornwall Council Policy. However I am seeking guidance on what rationalisation we can undertake on the original signs in place and adding the signs the Parish Council has recommended from the site visit at the end of November. This included 'no through road' signs on key locations and repositioning of current signage to aid the tourists within the area".

Public Conveniences

All the public WCs are now fully open for the summer season and were given a deep clean. Various minor repairs / maintenance issues were dealt with from unblocking drains to doors that wouldn't close properly. Members are in the process of drawing up a Regular Maintenance Schedule.

Valuation reports had been commissioned from Steren Surveyors and the insurance cover in respect of rebuilding costs had been increased accordingly.

Road Closure

The road from Pol-tec Lane to Old Road, Lanteglos will be closed from 18 to 22 July 2022 (24 hours).



Planning Applications

PA22/01635, Old Ferry Inn Old Road Bodinnick – proposed re-roofing and addition of new roof light on south elevation. Members had no objection.

PA22/02189, 16 West Street Polruan – reinstatement of lean-to porch. Members had no objection.

PA22/02059, Jan Syvy Old Road Bodinnick

– Two Storey Extension. Members had no objection but Members query if the proposed design is out of character and not well integrated as required by the Policy 1 of the NDP. In particular, the wooden cladding is not in keeping.

PA22/02753, Overferry Old Road Bodinnick – the complete demolition of the existing house and the construction of a new 4-bedroom replacement dwelling and detached garage with associated landscaping works. Members had no objection.

PA22/02775, 42 West Street Polruan – proposed erection of a timber summerhouse in the rear garden. Cllr. Clare-Dunbavand left the meeting when this item was discussed. Members had no objection.

PA22/02728, Vevery Car Park and Reservoir Polruan – change of use of disused reservoir to storage facility with associated road and parking, new parking layout to car park with ANPR barrier system with payment meter, solar panels to reservoir and garage roof. Seasonal cafe/takeaway. Allotment gardens and landscaping.

Members had no objection in principle to the development of the site but have concerns about the road access, the impact on the coastal SSI and the "Green Space" identified in the NDP. Members do request a construction management and traffic management plan as conditions.

PA22/03595, 8 St Saviours Hill Polruan – non-material amendment in relation to decision notice PA21/07112 dated 28.09.2021: glazed link/flat roof sections between proposed dormers removed on front and rear of roof and reinstated as pitched slate roof; proposed first floor outrigger cladding revised from render to timber cladding; external downlighter by rear entrance door and terrace door; and other minor material revisions to balustrades, doors and windows. Members had no objection.

PA22/03366, 4 Battery Park Polruan – redesigned roof to property. Reconfigure internal layout. Form first floor bedroom over existing balcony. Enclose garage side covered walkway within garage. Construct Veranda. Members had no objection.

PA22/03601, Pont, Uppasite Road from Whitecross Hill to Little Churchtown Farm – proposed remodel and extension. Members supported this application.

PA22/03552, 42 West Street Polruan – construction of an area of decking and glass balustrade on the flat roof of the existing timber garden building. It was confirmed this was a retrospective application. Members had no objection.

Planning Applications Approved by Cornwall Council

PA21/12235, Pengegon Essa Polruan – demolition of existing detached house and detached garage, and the erection of a replacement detached dwelling, detached carport and workshop and associated landscaping.

PA22/00237, Bryn-Y-Mor 3 Chapel Lane Polruan – conversion of loft space to create new first floor, raising the ridge by 1.7m and installing new roof with dormer windows. Upgrading of conservatory, alterations to ground floor layout and reconfiguration of windows. Re-building of workshop in garden and addition of bathroom to existing studio. Gardens to be landscaped.

PA22/00605, 72 Fore Street Polruan – proposed garage.

PA22/01057, The Old Vicarage 2 Battery Lane Polruan – the erection of a potting shed in the walled vegetable garden on the south side of the site.

PA22/02189, 16 West Street Polruan – reinstatement of lean-to porch

And if I smugly start to bore friends, well then may they stop me with a fervent amen.





The policy, in summary, is as follows:

- •Stop Right-to-Buy
- •End the Bedroom Tax
- •Build homes for rent using Cornwall Council financial resources publicly-owned, publicly-accountable housing, designed and built by Cornwall's own workforce. Developers, whose priority is profit rather than meeting need, to be excluded
- Requisition empty or under-used properties
- ·Adopt policies to reduce second home ownership and holiday rentals
- Bring back secure tenancies for council tenants
- •Outlaw S.21 (no fault) evictions; create a hostile environment for rogue landlords
- •Set up rent tribunals throughout Cornwall to match rents to local incomes
- •Set up a register of private landlords
- •Change the definition of affordability link to local incomes rather than house prices
- •Close the house transfer register to people with no Cornwall connection

Higher Windmill Allotments

We complain when it's wet, we complain when it's too dry . . . when it's too cold, when it's too hot! Gardeners are always seeming to be struggling with the elements!

Recently we have had a particularly dry period that was also quite chilly at night. This discouraged early sowing and planting. We have had the promise of rain showers but these more often than not have not materialised so we have all been out with watering cans trying to get our seeds to come good.

But this is an optimistic gardening time of the year when we are looking forward to having a good season's abundant produce. Across the allotments, potatoes are in and seeds of carrots, spinach, beetroot, parsnips and beans have been sown. We also have plants that have been raised at home to put out . . . cabbages, cauliflowers, various beans, sweet corn, courgettes, lettuce and more. About now we realise that we haven't been quick enough to prepare sufficient ground to take all this produce . . . more pressure, but it's worthwhile.

We are already eating early produce like broad beans, that were sown before the winter, and early lettuce and spinach that stood through the winter. We have had our first rhubarb crumbles of the season too!

Soft fruit always does well on these allotments. Strawberries have flowered and are now fruiting. These will need protecting from birds. Gooseberries have also fruited and we see early signs of other currants.

We mentioned in our last report the reopening of Gypsy Lane as a private access to the allotments from the village. This continues to be a boon and is well used. There are finishing off works to complete to the boundary of the lane.

It is particularly pleasing to see the school pupils on their patch. They are obviously enjoying themselves and will turn out to be great gardeners.

The waiting list for allotments is short. If you want to join us, initially talk to Des Libby. He'll be glad to show you around.

10 ways to be more sustainable in your garden from the Royal Horticultural Society

Make a difference to the environment with these easy tasks



Trees are brilliant at drawing down carbon from the atmosphere.

If all 30 million UK gardeners planted a medium-sized tree in their community, school, workplace or garden and nurtured it to maturity, they would store enough carbon equivalent to drive you more than 11 million times around our planet.

Switch from mains to rains in your garden to save carbon. Make your pledge on mains2rains.uk

Use a water butt containing water that falls onto your roof instead of turning on a tap from the mains supply, or use a watering can instead of a hosepipe. So far 6.6 million litres of water have been pledged to save on the RHS mains2rains website, equivalent to taking 82,385 baths - saving enough carbon equivalent to charge 1.3 million smartphones.





3 Go peat-free Peatlands are the world's largest carbon store on land. They provide valuable ecosystems for plants and animals and act like sponges, reducing the risk of flooding.

When we take peat for our gardens, carbon is released and habitats are damaged. Keeping peat in bogs – not bags – is a crucial part of the fight against climate change. Our planet's billions of acres of peat hold more carbon than all the world's forests combined.

Carbon saving quantities linked to home composting (as opposed to buying bagged retail compost) are equivalent to 1.85 miles (driven by average car) saved per kg of home compost made.

Every 1kg of homemade compost typically saves over 0.1kg fossil CO, emissions, which could save more than 5.1 kg carbon, per gardener, every year.



Garden soils and perennial plantings play an important role in storing

If 30 million gardeners pulled up a paver and planted 1m² of perennial plants (either herbaceous, shrubs or trees) in their community, school, workplace or garden and allowed it to develop to maturity, depending on the plants grown this would be equivalent to heating between 86,000 to more than one million homes for a year!

Pollinators need our help. Loss of habitat is one of the main reasons why we see fewer bees, butterflies and other insects visiting our gardens.

Help slow and reverse the declines in bees, butterflies, moths, hoverflies and other pollinators by growing a wide variety of plants including a mixture of native, near-native and exotic plants to support pollinator diversity.



Some imported flowers have up to 10 x the carbon footprint of home or UK-grown bouquets.

Growing or buying UK-grown cut flowers can save up to 7.9kg carbon per bunch compared with buying some imported bunches.

An average petrol power tool emits 0.848 kg carbon per litre of petrol used. It's not only carbon, they emit harmful particulate and noise pollution too.

If the 21% of UK gardeners who use power tools switched from fossil fuel to green energy electric-powered tools, it would save enough carbon equivalent to drive around the planet 29,820 times.

Since the last update the Trust held its well attended AGM at the beginning of April. With Edgar Goddard and Robert Libby leaving the Trust there are two new trustees Tony Cottrell and Vicky Halls. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Robert and Edgar for their contributions to the Trust and welcome Tony and Vicky. After steering the Trust through what has been a difficult period, Robin Sainsbury has decided to stand down as Chair and Dave Guy was elected by Trustees to be the new Chair.

The plans for Vevery are currently going through the planning process and the outcome of the application should be known in June. A site meeting was voluntarily held by the Trust at Vevery where the views of those present were heard and subsequently parts of the plans were amended. Thank you to those who took the time to attend and share their views.

The prolonged process of the transfer of the Quay from South West Water to the Trust continues although the end could finally be in sight.

The current delays are mainly around tying up legal issues which are in the hands of the Trust's solicitors.

The majority of the funds from Marjorie Barrie's generous bequest to the village have almost gone however there is still some residual remaining. If there are any organisations who would like to apply for funding/additional funding from the bequest, please get in touch with the Clerk.

The repairs and refurbishment of the children's playground on the hill is nearly complete which will mean children will once again be able to safely enjoy this area.

Shortly a fence will be erected around the ruin of St Saviour Chapel to restrict access and keep everyone safe whilst enjoying the area. The decision to erect this fence was taken after professional, expert advice was received and is not only to keep everybody safe but to also dissuade interference with the structure itself.

In the coming months the Trust will be creating and developing a website, further details of which will be promulgated once it is up and running.

Ongoing and future preventative maintenance plans for the Trust's assets is being evaluated and we hope to provide further updates in the coming months.

As the summer season gets underway and onthe-water and shore-based activity increases, our volunteer lifeboat crew has been putting their training to good use. On 23 March, the All-weather Lifeboat Maurice and Joyce Hardy was launched to assist a para-glider who had landed on Vault beach, near Gorran Haven. On arrival at the scene, the Fowey crew, assisted by Mevagissey Coastguard, found that the man was safe and had been able to recover his para-glider from the beach.

On the afternoon of *Easter Saturday*, 16 April, the Maurice and Joyce Hardy moored up on Fowey Town Quay to welcome visitors for guided tours. Visitors were enjoying the onboard experience when a distress call was received, and the lifeboat was launched to a yacht stranded seven miles south-east of Fowey Harbour.

The yacht was being helmed single-handed by an 85 year old man who was on passage from Torquay to Falmouth. His navigation system had failed and he was experiencing engine problems. Light winds were hampering progress. As he was in unfamiliar waters and on his own, he made a Pan Pan distress call. A Pan Pan call means that the situation is serious, but unlike a May Day call, there is no grave and imminent danger to the boat or anyone on board.

Fowey lifeboat quickly reached the vessel and put a crew member onboard the yacht to assist. The yacht was then taken in tow and safely towed into Fowey.



On Wednesday, 6 April, the Maurice and Joyce Hardy was launched in response to a request from the Coastguard to locate and assist an inflatable dinghy being blown offshore at Pentewan, with a father and daughter onboard. The request for assistance was also answered by All-weather Lifeboat 16-11 from Angle, South Wales, which was on passage from Poole back to Wales and happened to be near the casualty vessel.

Lifeboat 16-11 was first to arrive at the scene, where their volunteer lifeboat crew recovered the dinghy and rescued the father and daughter. Fowey crew then assisted in taking the dinghy and the two people back to safety in Mevagissey.

With more people heading to the coast for the summer, the RNLI urges people to

fastenings and crotch straps. They also advised that fabric is significantly affected by salt water. If lifejackets have been stored in damp conditions, for example onboard, critical elements such as the salt tablets used to trigger the inflation will absorb moisture. Defects can be revealed by being regularly opened and inspected, and through manual inflation.

Fowey Lifeboat Operations Manager, Chris Ogg commented:

"I'd like to thank Ocean Safety, TMS and all the volunteers who helped out. While it was encouraging to see a good turnout, many other people will not have had their lifejackets checked in the last couple of years. It is vital that they are checked and serviced regularly by the manufacturer or recommended agent."

follow safety advice. Offshore winds and high tides can be particularly dangerous so it is imperative to check the weather forecast and tide times before setting out. Always tell someone where you are going and when you expect to be back; wear appropriate buoyancy aids or lifejackets; and always carry a means of calling for help. If you see anyone in danger on or near the water, call 999 and ask for the Coastguard.

Back on shore, March saw the welcome holding of the lifejacket clinic at the lifeboat station. The marine safety specialists, Ocean Safety, carried out safety checks on 169 lifejackets. Over 50% needed a critical safety part replacing, meaning that had they been used in an emergency, they might not have worked and could have caused loss of life. Eleven lifejackets were condemned outright as being unfit for use; a further 51 needed new capsules; and 26 required replacement cylinders, both critical elements in a fully functioning lifejacket.

Ocean Safety advised people on danger signs to look out for: for example looking at the webbing and the stitching that holds the webbing together, checking for signs of worn stitching and also checking zips, buckles, In return for the valuable service provided, a voluntary collection on the day raised over $\pounds 700$ to support the running of Fowey lifeboat station.

The comprehensive work on the pontoon, with the installing of new piles, has been completed and the All-weather lifeboat is now back on home station. The old piles were installed over 20 years ago and were showing signs of corrosion. The new piles will ensure our volunteer crew are safe and that our lifeboat can continue to operate from the pontoon for the next 20 years and continue to save lives.

Congratulations to volunteer crew members Nat Wilkinson, Graham Middlewood and Steven Harris on passing out as qualified Allweather lifeboat mechanics.

Visiting sessions to the lifeboat station are well underway and it has been great welcoming visitors back onboard. Our guides will take up to eight people over the vessel at a time to show where the mechanic, navigator, helm and cox work in the wheelhouse, and explain what they do and what their responsibilities are. Visitors can see the charts, radar, electronics and equipment that the crew use onboard and go below into the survivors' cabin and up onto the flying bridge. All visits are subject to the weather and lifeboat operational issues, such as shouts. Opening times are Wednesdays and Saturdays, from 10.30am to 3.30pm. Please check our Facebook page, @FoweyLifeboat, for details and times. The RNLI is the charity that saves lives at sea.

At the beginning of April the 8 members of the team took part in the new Coastguard Emergency Responder Casualty Care course (CERCC) spending 3 consecutive days training at the freshly modernised Polruan Village Hall. It was an excellent venue for what we needed providing plenty of room, a computerised screen for slides and videos, great kitchen facilities and being local making it easier for members to attend. The course is taught by a variety of media including slides, videos, demonstrations, scenarios, paper based exercises and practical sessions. It was assessed by a multiple choice question paper and a practical assessment. Happily, every one passed even me! The course has been updated to include the new HM Coastguard CERCC Casualty Check Cards equivalent to those used by other Search and Rescue (SAR) agencies, for example the RNLI.

Backing up the new CERCC course the team took part in a realistic training exercise on the Bodinnick Ferry where a crew member was trapped between two vehicles and then the driver of one had a cardiac arrest. It provided great exposure to the team working in front of other people with their new skills and provided the ferry crew with the opportunity to join in the casualty care and improve their skills. Many thanks to the Ferry Company and the crew for providing us with this opportunity.

Thinking of walking the beautiful coast paths or taking the dog to the beach? Please take some appropriate precautions, wear sensible foot wear and clothing for the conditions, make sure your mobile phone is fully charged,

NCI Polruan is having a recruitment drive. We are looking for recruits who want to join our existing team of watch keepers in manning our newly refurbished lookout building. We have re-equipped the lookout with new furniture, equipment and fittings and made it feel really spacious and comfortable. Recruits don't need to have a nautical, boaty background as full training is given.

We are currently undertaking two watches each day and covering the period between 9am and 4pm. We expect shortly, as summer boating and coast path activity ramps up, to be increasing this cover by extending watches into the early evening. Normally our watch keepers do two or three watches each month . . . quite a modest commitment.

We look out for boating and coastal walking incidents. In Polruan these are reported to HM Coastguard, Falmouth who can call in the relevant rescue resources.

We are part of a national charity run by volunteers who man approximately 60 lookouts around the coast of England and Wales. As part of a national NCI day we are having a public barbecue on the Coal Wharf on Saturday, 23 July . . . all are welcome. Our station will be open for visits on Sunday, 24 July, when we will welcome anyone who wants to see what we do and the equipment we use.
