The Rev's ramblings A few thoughts

Sir Winston Churchill has been described as Britain's greatest ever leader. He lived a long and heroic life and rallied a nation with his inspiring rhetoric. One of the most striking parts of his biography is that he had to resign from the admiralty during WW1 over the failed Dardanelles campaign. He had failed spectacularly yet he was to learn not to give up.

I was told that once when he returned to his old school, Harrow, to address the boys, the whole school assembled to listen to his words of wisdom. The great man arose to speak: "Young men never give up, never give up, never, never give up". The entire speech lasted only a few seconds. Then he sat down. No one present ever forgot his words.

That at least is the popular version of the story. Churchill did indeed say words to that effect, but as part of a longer speech. Towards the end he said "Never give in. Never give in. Never, never, never, never give in - in nothing, great or small, large or petty - never give in except to convictions of honour and good sense. Never yield to force. Never yield to the apparently overwhelming might of the enemy".

In today's generation our lives have become so instantaneous that anything requiring patient perseverance can appear unattractive. We require instant returns and instant results. But sometimes the biggest pay offs are a long time coming.



St Wyllow Lanteglos-by-Fowey Gift Day Sunday 7 August 2022

At the 11am Holy Communion Service we will be having a special gift day. It's an opportunity for people to give specifically to the ministry of the Lanteglos-by-Fowey Parish. The Parish is expected to pay £30,000 per annum (as their part of the Trelawny Benefice contribution of £68,000) to the Diocese of Truro for the services of a full time priest and all the other associated Diocesan charges. The PCC has to maintain and insure three places of worship, St Saviour, Polruan, St John, Bodinnick and the Parish Church, St Wyllow, Lanteglos-by-Fowey.

To prune costs, as many of you are aware, it is not economical to repair St Saviour, so at some stage it will be sold and ministry continued in other venues in the village. At present the Parish is only able to pay a third to a half of its Diocesan charge. It is also faced with having to renew the Parish Church heating system, amongst other building issues.

The Parish tries very hard to reach out to its community. A series of Coal Wharf services are planned over the summer months and family services (normally conducted outdoors) are continuing to be held ranging from Lambing and Tractor Services to Pets and Harvest on the farm. There is also thriving youth work in Polruan.

News from Lansallos

from John Feasey, Lansallos PCC

Is cash becoming obsolete? Fewer people now seem to carry loose change with them and many rely on card payments for almost everything. This has potentially serious implications for church income through the weekly collection plate as well as the donations box, sales of books and other items in the church and, of course, functions like the annual fete. So, Lansallos PCC is exploring the possibility of purchasing or leasing a debit/credit card reader but will first await the results of a Diocesan trial which is taking place this year in several parishes.

We were reminded that cash used to be king, when back in 2004 we found a quantity of pre-decimal coins in the churchyard. Part of the stone wall along the path leading from the church porch to the Old Rectory had collapsed and the late Brian Langdon, our former churchwarden, spotted a gleam of silver while re-building the wall. He discovered 14 old pre-decimal coins amounting to one halfpenny, three silver threepenny bits, two sixpences, five shillings, and three half crowns. The total comes to some 14 shillings and threepence ha'penny, from the reigns of Queen Victoria, King Edward VII and King George V, with the most recent coin being dated 1922 - a hundred years old this year! This sum of money would probably have been about a typical farm labourer's weekly wage at that time (it's around £445 today) so it was a significant loss whether it came from the church or an individual. To put that in perspective, a loaf of bread would then have cost 4d (four old pence or 1.8 new pence)

We conjecture that perhaps the Rector was taking the collection to his rectory but was distracted and absent-mindedly left it on the wall, never to be found again! Or, perhaps a thief stole it from the church but met someone on his way out and threw the incriminating evidence into the vegetation growing on the wall – but dared not come back to recover it. What is your best guess?

Brian made a very neat wooden display unit to enable the coins to be viewed from



both sides (the photo is of the 'tails'), but as they are made of solid silver (apart from the ha'penny) it's necessary to keep them under lock and key. The coins can be viewed on request to a PCC member.

St Wyllow Organ

from Eric Patterson

The organ in St Wyllow Church, Lanteglosby-Fowey, is one of only two remaining pipe organs in the Trelawny Benefice, the other being at Talland, an account of which I wrote here a few months ago.

The Lanteglos instrument is a 1975 rebuild by Lance Foy of an 1885 Hele instrument from St Mark's Church, Dawlish, Devon.



A few of the pipes came from an organ in Barrow-in-Furness, and the vicar at the time, the Rev'd Francis Otto tells of transporting them the four hundred miles from there in his car! Rev'd Otto was very much the inspiration behind the instrument and raised much of the money needed for its installation. The organ's present stop list differs slightly from that outlined in the National Pipe Organ Register. Originally it had a Trumpet stop on its own chest mounted above a radiator on the North wall, but unsurprisingly the heat was problematic for tuning and this was later removed and is now in an instrument

in Charminster in Dorset. Another reed stop, the swell Cornopean has also been removed at some stage, but the remaining reed stop, an Oboe is adequate as part of the whole. There are small changes to the Great and Pedal too, otherwise the present specification reads as in the National Pipe Organ Register, available on line.

The organ is placed at the East end of the North aisle, facing West. It has a pitch pine case, with a pipe rack to two elevations. There is a light, pleasant tracker action to Swell and Great and pneumatic pedals. The trackers are in excellent condition and the organ chamber is one of the cleanest I have seen, despite the efforts over the years of some particularly rare bats! The touch remains light when the manuals are coupled and the instrument has some lovely sounds, with six stops to the swell, seven stops to the Great, two to the Pedal and three couplers. It is a tribute to the rebuilder that it is difficult to produce an unpleasant combination of sounds on the instrument, and I have enjoyed getting to know it again.

Finally, the tuning book, safely kept, shows the organ has been lovingly maintained, and it contains many entries in the hand of Peter Skellern, former Director of Music there, whose music is still sung as part of services in the church.

News from the WI

There are 59 Stations (at the last count) around the coast of England and Wales and growing. Not only are the Coastwatch looking out for problems at sea, but they also look out for problems/accidents which may affect hikers and climbers and for anything unusual or suspicious (for example smuggling). If anything is spotted, Coastwatch inform the Coastguard in Falmouth and monitor the situation until help arrives. After this informative talk, our competition winners were announced: First, Maureen, Second, Pam and third Chris. There were 8 entries in all.

As I mentioned in the last issue, our river trip was cancelled so instead we visited the Platinum Jubilee Garden Party at Tregreham Gardens (organised by our Area WI). We had a lovely afternoon in a really beautiful setting — a welcome break in routine for us all. The weather was dull and damp - not too hot, which was lucky — and we indulged in cream teas and cakes. There were stalls of all sorts, a tombola and raffle. 



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News from Nigeria from Kathryn Hill

"far from an isolated incident".

The last couple of months have not been good in Nigeria. You may have heard on the news that the House of Commons held a debate on violence against Christians in Nigeria following on from the attack on a Catholic Church on Pentecost Sunday (which was also, of course, Jubilee Sunday). The Prime Minister's Special Envoy for Freedom of Religion or Belief, Fiona Bruce, described it as

In the run up to the International Ministerial Conference on Freedom of Religion and Belief which was held in London on 5 and 6 July, Baroness Caroline Cox, the Founder President of Humanitarian Aid and Relief Trust and Cannon Hassan John from Nigeria (who broke the story of the abduction of the Chibok girls back in 2014) reported on their recent visit to scenes of atrocities carried out by Islamic Fulani militias. These attacks, which amount to a religious jihad (so called "holy war") are aimed at driving out indigenous Christian communities in what they described as amounting to ethnic cleansing or even genocide but which is all too often misreported in western media as "tit-for-tat conflict due to issues of climate change between settled farmers and nomadic herdsmen." Nigerian journalists who report this religious persecution for what it is have even been imprisoned.

Baroness Cox and Cannon John reported that the Fulani militias use sophisticated military equipment and, in some cases, have even been supported by helicopter gunships. There is no help from the Nigerian military despite their numerous checkpoints and no investigation into the use of the helicopter gunships has ever been carried out. They further claimed that some senior figures in the Nigerian Government collaborate in these attacks which result in the some villagers being killed and the rest driven away; the Fulani and their cattle then settle in the village and re-name it.

Amongst the books I read onto tapes for blind students when I was their Resource Teacher at Boys Secondary School, Gindiri, were history books which included the Fulani Jihad of Usman dan Fodio, the leader of what is often described as the greatest Jihad in what is now Nigeria in the early 1800's. There are many in Nigeria today who see the current Fulani attacks as a continuation of Usman dan Fodio's unfinished work.

The ransom they ask for is ridiculous, but if not given, they do not return. Tensions are really mounting as the elections draw nearer in February next year.

The rains are coming and we need to pray they will carry on until harvest time. Some of the IDP'S here with us gave us a plot of land alongside theirs; they paid for the ploughing and the seeds and will also weed and harvest it for us. We appreciate their help; they know we pay school fees and supply money for food to some that need it in other areas.

News from Polruan Academy

from Jane Wills, Head of School

We are coming to the end of another unusual school year. Thankfully we escaped further enforced school closures and managed to battle our way through a Covid outbreak, so resilience and determination has been in ample supply. This year also saw the return to National Testing, with our Year 2 and Year 6 children sitting their SATs and the Year 4 children having their times table knowledge tested. So, all this behind us, we have spent a very busy final half term polishing off on building knowledge sequences, perfecting skills and for our Year 6s, enjoying being the "oldest" for the final weeks of primary school.

Summer term is traditionally the time of year where we are able to spend the most time outside and with our allotment, wild tribe and trips this proved to be the case again this year. The children have taken turns to visit the allotment weekly to weed (what a challenge this has been!), water and learn the biology behind the plants they are growing. With the help of Mr Sandy building raised beds and Mrs Sandy providing plants, we now have a fantastic outdoor learning space with strong community links. Fingers crossed our 1 sunflower will grow tall enough to be considered for the annual competition.

Amazingly, we were awarded 1st prize again this year in the Jubilee themed Scarecrow Competition. Like last year, the children choose the design and help make it and I am sure you agree that our "Queen walking her Corgi" is worthy of the prize.

A generous donation of £500 from a kind local benefactor, enabled us to arrange a series of experiences for the children linked to their learning. We spent a day rock pooling at Ready Money Cove with Friends of the Fowey Estuary. We found out that changes to our climate means changes to the creatures living in and around our shores. We found lots of salp, a type of sea squirty not usually found on our shores and learnt how these travel across the ocean in long chains of up to 10 meters. We also found strawberry anemones, a rare St Piran's hermit crab, common starfish and green shore crabs.



The following week, we went to the National Marine Aquarium in Plymouth to further explore and learn about the wildlife living in the waters around us. Again, this was another really informative and learning rich day for the children (and staff) building on our

knowledge gained from lessons at school and rock pooling. We also arranged an afternoon with Fowey Gallants Sailing Club for our oldest pupils. The children had a fantastic afternoon trying out sailing in different boats. All of them were beaming on their return to school with one of them exclaiming, "This was the best day out ever!"

Finally, our Year 6s had a trip to Camel Creek adventure park and to finish their celebrations, they camped out at Polruan camp site. Thanks to the generosity of Liz and Ray, who donated space for us to pitch our tents and use the facilities for free, we were able to give the children the experience of cooking, eating and sleeping out. Very much appreciated by all!

All there is left for us this school year, is to say goodbye to our amazingly talented and fun Year 6 children and wish them all the best on their learning journey in secondary school.

This has been a year where our school has firmly benefited from the generosity and good will of our local community; we have gained an allotment, re-established a weekly routine with the wonderful Open the Book team, gained committed and supportive volunteers coming in to read with children every week and our fundraising events have been fully supported by the wider community. On behalf of all – Thank you.



Parish Council Meetings

The Parish Council have now returned to face to face meetings. Members of the public are warmly invited to attend

Annual Parish Council Meeting

Cllr John Adams was re-elected as Chair for 2022/23 and Cllr Rob Rooney was subsequently re-elected as Vice Chair.

Social Housing Manifesto

Members revisited the manifesto and amended Policy 1.7 to read: "Allocation of social housing in a parish is to alternate between those deemed in desperate need, followed by an allocation to applicants with a connection to the parish. Town/parish councils to be consulted at every stage of the process."

Public Conveniences

- a. St Saviour's WCs the Working Party will draw up a specification seeking tenders for work that Members believe needs to be done to improve the drainage problem and refurbish the toilet block; with a proviso to invite other observations (e.g. wiring regulations, building regulations requirements); and a separate quotation for a replacement toilet block.
- b. The Quay WCs a local builder will be invited to carry out an inspection and advise Members on the work that he believes needs to be done. A briefing note will then be drawn up for discussion with the Polruan Town Trust (the building's owners).

Jubilee Tree for Whitecross Green

Following advice from Mr Meike Weiser, Forest of Cornwall Project Officer, Members have resolved to plant a Hornbeam in the

Whitecross Village Green

The Deed of Grant made when the Green was passed to the Parish Council stipulates: "To use the land hereby conveyed in connection with the function of the Donee and the Village Hall..." Following complaints from the Whitecross Village Hall Committee, Members therefore had no choice but to write to Whitecross residents requesting they do not park on the Green.

Road Closure

The road from Pol-tec Lane to Old Road, Lanteglos will be closed from 18 to 22 July 2022 (24 hours).

End of Year Accounts 2021/22

The accounts had been checked by the Parish Council's Internal Auditor (Hudson Accounting Ltd) and subsequently submitted to the External Auditor for their check. Further information can be found on the Council's website.

Planning Applications

PA22/04403, Castle Keep West Street Polruan – works to a tree in a conservation area, works are to T1 (Monterey Cypress) - remove first primary branch growing toward Castle Keep and remove x2 lowest second-order branches to the east over the roof of neighbouring property. NOTE – this application is for works to trees in a Conservation Area, and was

decided by Cornwall Council under delegated authority

PA22/04395, 24 West Street Polruan – proposed alterations to existing outbuilding and deck. Members had no objection.

PA22/04998, 2 Butts Park Road from Trenewan to Junction West of Carneggan Farm – construction of two-storey extension at 2 Butts Park. Members supported the application.

PA22/05284, 10 Hockens Lane Polruan – alteration of vehicle parking, construction of retaining walls, and re-levelling of the site to create garden amenity. Members found the plans difficult to understand and deferred commenting until a design and access statement is received. They also request a site visit is made to aid their understanding of the proposal.

News from Frogmore Farm

Sometimes you think your work is done for the day and it's time to relax. Maybe you are washed and dressed up to go out. Then the phone goes. Your cattle have broken the fence by Palace Cove, they are balanced on the cliff edge. This message is too dangerous to ignore until the morning so Simon and Lorna rush down and do a temporary repair. Thanks to the person who telephoned — no steers were injured or lost. The fence has now been replaced and hopefully will last for many years.

One morning we heard a noisy knocking on the door, on going to look who it was, we were amazed to find a magpie fighting it's reflection in the pane of glass! The horrible bird had killed the little swallow in the nest above the door, eaten her eggs and wrecked the nest. We were so upset. Her partner has been coming back repairing the nest with mud but as yet he hasn't found another mate. I think babies have hatched out in the porch nests. There is a great deal of noise and lots of poo.

Warleggan Young Farmers asked Ben if they could visit Frogmore one evening. They were interested to compare coastal farming to moorland farms. We thought this would inspire us to clean the grain store and tidy the yard — a job that has got to be done before the harvest in any event. Simon cut the weeds in the fields and everything looked really tidy. Lorna and Sophie organised some refreshments.



Twenty young farmers turned up. Simon drove them around the farm on a trailer lined with straw bales to sit on. Ben talked to them about the fields, crops, cattle and sheep. From the cliff fields above Lantic bay the whole farm can be seen. A wonderful view from the clay hills to Brown Willy. The sea was a beautiful blue. We could see fish leaping out of the water and sea gulls diving. The fish were very big but not dolphins or porpoises, they were a silvery blue colour. Someone who has been fishing said it's possible they were tuna fish. It seems they have been seen around the coast this year.

After weeks of watching the last pregnant cow she has had a lovely bull calf. She was very protective towards it and wouldn't let anyone near it. She even chased a crow away.



Every night the dogs have been barking waking everyone up. When they were let out they would race madly around the lawns . The night camera was put out and the next morning there were pictures of foxes on the lawn. One sniffing the camera. There was



another with a cub following her. They looked very hungry. Since the rabbits died of the flu a couple of years ago, foxes have struggled to find enough food. The wild ducks on the farm ponds have lost their ducklings and the pheasant chicks have gone too. I wish the foxes would catch a few pigeons! They have devastated the vegetable patch and everything has had to be replanted. Now the garden is covered in nets and fleeces and looks horrible.

Some good news about the hedgehogs, several have been seen crossing the farmyard at night always a lovely sight. They can run quite fast on their little short legs. As long as they stay away from the roads they should be safe.

Today as I write this the combine has started to harvest the first field of Winter barley. The first outing of the Summer is always a bit stressful, after a long Winter in the house, will everything work OK? It has been cleaned, greased, filled with fuel so fingers crossed.



Higher Windmill Allotments

One of the joys of gardening at the allotments this year has been seeing the children from our school hard at work growing plants. A cursory inspection of their plot revealed strawberries (long eaten now), a big bed of beautiful Cosmos flowers, Sweet Williams and Marigolds in tubs, parsnips and what look like artichokes. The children have been working very enthusiastically with staff and helpers showing them the way . . . a credit to all of them!

Another new feature of the allotments is the wildlife area and pond. This is looking established now. A quick look at it recently revealed dragonflies (or are they damselflies?) flitting above the pond surface and water boatmen paddling below. Earlier in the season tadpoles were seen. If they haven't been eaten, they will be frogs now . . . but they haven't revealed themselves.

More generally, we are now at the early stages of the harvesting season. We have had new potatoes, courgettes, broad beans, a few French beans, onions and beetroot with more to look forward to. Shortly we will have an abundance of runner beans and greens.

We have done well for fruit so far this year. Strawberries were abundant, as were gooseberries and early raspberries. At the moment it is time to pick blackcurrants with other fruit to follow.

The Allotment Society recently had a members' meeting when progress on a number of issues were discussed and decisions made for the future. Also a race night at the Russell was a great success.... everyone had a great time and much needed funds were raised.







Town Trust Report

from Dave Guy, Chairman

The Trustees are aware that the way the Trust operates and makes decisions has been questioned in recent months. We would like to take this opportunity to assure the community that Trustees discharge their duties to the best of their abilities in line with the Trusts Scheme and Charity Commission guidance and rules, taking legal advice when appropriate. If anyone doesn't feel this is being done, then we encourage them to raise their concerns in writing with the Trust. If you are not satisfied with the Trust's reply, then anyone has the option to raise a complaint with the Charity Commission.

Since the last update Tony Cottrell has unfortunately taken the decision to resign as a Trustee. The Trust has therefore co-opted Beth Rigg as a Trustee.

Many in the community will know that the Reading Room committee have taken the decision to hand the Reading Room back to the Trust. The Trust do not wish to change the Reading Room but we are looking at some subtle enhancements such as preservation of the current contents and creating a focal point for local history. The Children's Hospice books will also be staying and we have reinstated the provision of local weekly newspapers.

We are opening up the Reading Room to everyone to use as a meeting place, for which bookings can be made on the calendar just inside the door, and as a wider community space. As part of this offering we are investigating the provision of Wi-Fi. We would request that anyone using the Reading Room treat it with respect and make a donation to assist with the cost of its upkeep. A donation box will be available soon to facilitate this.

Anyone who would like to continue supporting the Reading Room as they did previously is welcome to become a 'friend of the Reading Room' with a suggested minimum £5 annual membership available from Robin in The Russell Inn.

The development plans for Vevery have been given conditional planning consent and the Trust will now consider how best to proceed with the short and long term development of the site. Details will be made available once this has been done and we will make sure the community is kept up to date with progress.

The prolonged process of the transfer of the Quay from South West Water to the Trust continues although the end could finally be in sight. The current delays are mainly around tying up legal issues which are in the hands of the Trusts solicitors.

The majority of the funds from Marjorie Barrie's generous bequest to the village have now been allocated with funds going to the Coastguard, School and Allotment Society since our last update.

The final repair to the children's playground on the hill should be completed by the end of July.

In the coming months the fence will be erected around St Saviours ruin on the hill to restrict access and keep everyone safe whilst enjoying the area. As a reminder, the decision to erect this fence was taken after professional expert advice was received and is not only to keep everybody safe but to also dissuade interference with the structure itself.

The Trust (or more accurately through the efforts of our clerk) has now created and will continue to develop our website at www.polruantowntrust.org . Currently there is just a basic landing page, but by the beginning of August version one of the full website should be released.

Ongoing and future preventative maintenance plans for the Trust's assets has commenced and it has been identified that several of the Trust's properties require significant works to maintain them to expected standards. The Trust is in the process of costing these works and we will provide further updates in the coming months.

The arrival of summer and sometime good weather has led to many more people out on the water, which has inevitably led to a busy couple of months for Fowey's volunteer lifeboat crew. This trend is likely to continue, with a recent RNLI study estimating that 35 million people plan to visit the coast this summer.

On Sunday, 22 May, Amelia Luck responded to her first shout as a lifeboat helm when the Inshore Lifeboat, Olive Two, was launched. The 21-year-old and her crew were called to assist a 16-foot motorboat with one man on board that had drifted onto Par Harbour west wall following failure of both its main and auxiliary engines. Amelia and her crew, brother Oli Luck and Luke Watts, set up a tow line and returned the vessel and owner safely to the harbour.

On the morning of Thursday, 2 June, the All-Weather Lifeboat Maurice and Joyce Hardy was launched to assist an injured crew member on a yacht racing from Mevagissey to Fowey. A pulley block had exploded, breaking the man's leg. Lifeboat crew members Paul Gamble and Jan Philp boarded the yacht to assess the casualty, but due to the extent of the injury were unable to realign the broken bone. The yacht was escorted into Fowey, where it rendezvoused with the Cornwall air ambulance. The lifeboat crew administered pain relief until the paramedics took over. When the ambulance arrived, the casualty was stretchered off and taken to hospital.

On Tuesday, 7 June, the All-weather Lifeboat was launched to assist a 39-foot sailing vessel with one person onboard. The vessel had become entangled in fishing gear. Crew member Graham Middlewood was put aboard the casualty vessel and using a grappling hook and knife, he managed to cut the vessel free. The lifeboat crew then established a tow and the vessel was brought safely back into Fowey Harbour.

On the evening of Thursday, 16 June, a 67-year-old woman fell whilst disembarking from a moored boat in Fowey harbour and hit her head. The Fowey volunteer lifeboat crew attended the incident using a Harbour Commissioners vessel, as this was the fastest way to reach the casualty. The crew gave oxygen and administered first aid until the ambulance arrived to take the woman to hospital.

The next day, Fowey's all-weather lifeboat was launched in response to a request from HM Coastguard to assist a broken down, 17-foot, open sports boat. On arriving at the scene, the volunteer lifeboat crew found one

man onboard, who had gone out on a fishing trip. The boat had broken down near Black Head, about six miles from his home base in Fowey. The lifeboat crew set up a tow line and towed the boat back to Fowey, where it was handed over to the harbour moorings team to return it to its mooring.

On the late afternoon of 22 June, HM Coastguard received a call for urgent assistance for a 70-year-old man, who was suffering from a suspected heart attack on Vault beach, south of Gorran Haven. The All-weather Lifeboat was despatched and on arrival, the volunteer crew launched their small XP inflatable boat in the calm seas to ferry two crew to shore. The Cornwall air ambulance was already at the scene and paramedics were treating the casualty. They confirmed that while the symptoms were consistent with a suspected heart attack, they were probably a result of heat exhaustion. The casualty, with his wife, was taken on board the Fowey lifeboat and given casualty care by the trained volunteer lifeboat crew during the journey to Mevagissey, where an ambulance and paramedic were waiting to monitor his condition. The casualty and his wife were then taken by ambulance to hospital.

Even its own volunteers can occasionally require the help of RNLI crews. On 23 June, HM Coastguard received a Pan-Pan (non-life threatening) call from a man on a RIB (rigid



inflatable boat) off Lantic Bay, after a tube on his five-metre RIB had burst and deflated. The D-class inshore lifeboat Olive Two was launched. The crew found the man was Rob Collings, fellow RNLI volunteer and a 10-year member of the Fowey fundraising committee. Rob said:

"I was about one mile off Lantic bay. It was a lovely calm day, when suddenly there was a loud bang and the rear starboard tube burst and immediately deflated (see photo). The sponson had part-filled with water and was dragging the side of the boat down. I initially thought that I could pump it up, but the cone at the end of the tube had split. At that point I thought this could get a bit serious, so I made a VHF Pan-Pan call to Falmouth Coastguard. A local boat in the area heard the Pan-Pan and immediately came to my rescue. They were very helpful and managed to tow me to the harbour mouth. There we were met by the inshore lifeboat and the crew set up a tow line."

Rob was transferred to the inshore lifeboat and his RIB was towed back into Fowey Harbour to Caffa Mill.

Rob concluded:

"I know the crew well and have watched the lifeboat go out many times over the years, but this was the first time I have ever been on the receiving end as a casualty vessel. The crew gave me real confidence, they were so reassuring and dealt with the situation in such a professional manner. To see them on a shout and to see how good they are was a real eye-opener. They couldn't have been more helpful. I would like to offer them my sincere thanks and I would also like to thank the crew of the local boat that came to my assistance."

Well done to the 16 Fowey RNLI volunteers, with a combined total of 295 years of service, who have been awarded a special commemorative Platinum Jubilee medal in recognition of their service and dedication to saving lives at sea. The medal, created to mark The Queen's Platinum Jubilee, recognises frontline emergency services personnel who have completed five full calendar years of paid, retained or voluntary service. The 16 volunteers at Fowey RNLI are among 4,500 volunteers and front-line staff from across the Royal National Lifeboat Institution to receive the medal.

Fowey RNLI are reminding anyone visiting the coast or going out on the water in hot weather conditions to ensure that they take an adequate supply of water and a means of shade. If you do see someone in trouble, call 999 and ask for the Coastguard.

Finally, more good news. The RNLI Polruan Pig Roast is on again this year, after the Covid-induced hiatus. Please put the date, Saturday, 20 August, in your diary. Details are below.

Half way through July as I write this, there is a marked difference in the number of call outs received as compared to last year, even though temperatures are soaring and everybody is heading to the coast for respite — or have I spoken too soon. We shall see!

As ever we are on standby 24/7 and never quite know what's around the corner. Back in May, the team were tasked to support Looe Coastguard Rescue Team (CRT) to search for a high risk missing person (MISPER), turning out in numbers, nine of the team headed for the rendezvous point in Looe to meet up with the short handed Looe team who were organising the Coastguard response on the ground. Other agencies were also mobilised for the search, including Looe Lifeboat, Devon and Cornwall Police, East Cornwall Search and Rescue, Looe Fire Brigade and a search aeroplane. The Coastguard split into two search teams and set about searching our designated area and a big feather in our cap, when one of our teams found the Missing Person safe and well. Working with Looe Lifeboat and Police the person was taken to a place of safety.

- Please take care whilst going to the beaches or coast line.
- Know your limitations and don't take risks
- Have a means of communication and know where you are
- Check the tide time table and weather forecast
- Keep a close eye on children especially with inflatables
- Don't enter the water after drinking or a large meal

From the Station Log

18 May 2022, 18.44: Team tasked to support Looe CRT Missing Person

2 June 2022, 11.44: Team tasked to support Fowey Lifeboat with medivac and liaise with South West Ambulance Service

16 June 2022, 13.46: Report of person fallen on footpath east of Polruan, Team quickly located casualty, gave care and stretchered casualty to nearby Ambulance

Grants and Bursaries

for Persons under 25 attending Further (including professional and technical) Education

The Fowey Grammar School Foundation is a registered, local charity (No. 306751) providing annual financial assistance to individual students under 25 in tertiary education who qualify for awards in the form of grants and bursaries.

In the last financial year over £44,000 was awarded to 65 qualifying applicants from the area but there remain a large number of new and future students who are eligible to apply but fail to do so.

Awards are normally paid at the start of the second term, whereas those to existing applicants are normally paid in November of their second/third years.
