There is no English speaking church here but quite wonderfully our neighbours, a young German Family with two little boys, were Christians. Rosie and Jake, my daughter and son in law, got chatting to them. They invited me over to share a little service on their veranda. We were joined by another little family and their parents who were Russian, living in Germany.

It was one of the most special services I have conducted especially as it was in 3 languages! A tear came to my eye as my brother from Russia prayed a beautiful prayer. We sang in English and German. I preached on that special passage from Philippians where we are to rejoice in the Lord and present our requests to God and we will know his peace.

We prayed too for peace in the world . . . It doesn't matter where you are you can meet with God's people to praise him, pray to him and share his word. I came away up lifted and

strengthened by God and his goodness.

It has been lovely that so many people have joined us on the Quay for our outdoor services held throughout the summer. A real mix of different people and often people who would not come to a more formal setting. It is important that we are continually open to God and the strange and wondrous ways in which he works.

We will be continuing to meet our community in October with Tractor Services on village greens and of course our farm harvest. We shall also look forward to sharing with you at Frogmore, our farm nativity in December.

News from Lansallos

from John Feesey, Lansallos PCC

It was Charles Dicken's character, Mr Wilkins Micawber, who said: "Annual income 20 pounds, annual expenditure 19 [pounds] 19 [shillings] and six [pence], result: happiness. Annual income 20 pounds, annual expenditure 20 pounds, nought and sixpence, result: misery." How true - and it applies to church income and expenditure as well as to that of people! Which is why Lansallos PCC works so hard to try and balance our books. Last year our very small regular congregation of some 10 people managed to generate an income of over £16,000 – or around £1,600 per head! We're fortunate that many holidaymakers visit the church on their way to Lansallos Cove or the Coastal Footpath and make donations, often using our new contactless credit/debit card reader. The PCC is also grateful to the Limoges Trust which, thanks to the good offices of church visitor and benefactor, Ms Judy Dyke, makes an annual donation of £2,000, to Polperro Community Council for an annual grant of £600 towards churchyard maintenance and to Truro Diocese which made a one-off grant last year of £1,205 towards electricity costs.

Our major annual fund raiser is the Annual Fete, and this year we were lucky enough to catch a brief window of fine weather on 29 July, the rest of July and August being really dismal. Fete income was nearly £2,300, including donations, and our warmest thanks go to Ms Tess Silkstone for letting us use her beautiful gardens and to all who helped in any way or came and supported us. We'd have made more if someone hadn't inadvertently parked their car in the entrance to the NT overflow car park, leaving several people with nowhere to park and who had to drive away again. The NT has been asked to put up a sign asking drivers not to block that entrance.

On 27 August we sold a large quantity of donated bric-abrac at the West Wayland car boot sale, and again we were lucky with the weather, making a very useful £140. We're very grateful to Looe Lions for waiving the usual car boot fee. Additionally, we raise funds by asking for donations for bric-a-brac displayed in the church porch; for good quality second hand books in two bookstalls in the

church; for potted plants which PCC members grow and provide; for tea towels and hemp shopping bags with images of the church printed on them; for correspondence cards with a copy of a colour painting of the church; and for a variety of attractive postcards and a church information leaflet. A very popular card shows the only view of Lantivet Bay available on a PC, with Lansallos and Palace Coves and the church in the background. And we're always grateful to receive items in good condition that we can offer for sale or for donations.

We're often asked, "why do we need to raise so much money – doesn't the Diocese or the Church of England pay for the upkeep of St Ildierna?" No! On the contrary, we have to



pay about £8,200 as our "parish quota" to the Diocese each year to cover our share of the cost of funding our Benefice priest, and as a contribution towards the provision of clergy housing, training, retired priests' pensions etc. On top of this the annual insurance premium is now over £3,000, church repairs and maintenance cost about £3,000, churchyard grass cutting £1,200, benefice administrator's fee £1,100, heating, lighting and water £600 plus many other smaller bills. If all this is added up and compared with our income, there's still a deficit which has to be met from our small savings! And costs, especially for energy, can only be expected to rise . . .

One particular cost is the standing charge for electricity. For domestic users, this has been capped by the government at 55.52 pence per day (less than £17 per month) until next December, while there is no cap on the charge for 'small businesses', which is what churches are classed as, despite being charities. At Lansallos Church we usually have only one service a week, meaning that from May to October we use no heating and have the lights on for less than two hours a week, at a cost of around £6 a month for the electricity used, plus about £1.70 in VAT. And yet our electricity bill for these months has averaged over £38.00, due to a standing charge of some £31.00 a month! It appears that, since the domestic standing charge is subject to a cap, electricity companies are instead hitting 'small



businesses' like St Ildierna with such an enormous charge relative to what we use. What a rip off!

Future Event We're very pleased to welcome back the famous Polperro Fishermen's Choir for our Festival of the Sea service at 6.30pm on Sunday, 22nd October. This will be followed by a pasty supper, with other savouries, cakes, tea and coffee. Do come and give thanks for our seafaring communities, who do so much in all weathers to keep us supplied with our seafood and other essential supplies, as well as the search and rescue services who keep us safe on the coast and at sea.

Cornish Celtic Way from Kathryn Hill

The Cornish Celtic Way Pilgrimage has been set up by Rev'd Nigel Marnes and follows the various ancient pilgrim routes in Cornwall calling at the churches that are on these routes; locally these include Lansallos Parish Church, Lanteglos-by-Fowey Parish Church (St Wyllow), St Saviour Church and the ruin of the original St Saviour Church next to the NCI Lookout on Polruan Hill and also Fowey Parish Church.

Pilgrims pay a small amount to sleep in churches, church halls and similar but St Wyllow is not suitable because it is too remote and St Saviour is unsuitable because it has no toilets. Because of this both Polruan Village Hall and Polruan WI Hall are included in the list of possible sleeping places which is in the book that CCW Pilgrims buy. Both halls have had a number of pilgrims sleeping in them both pre-Covid and since Covid restrictions were lifted.

All the churches on the CCW Pilgrim route have rubber stamps and stamp pads so that pilgrims can stamp their book to show where they have been. When St Saviour Church is sold, Polruan will still be on the pilgrimage route because of the ruin of the original St Saviour and because it was on the route of pilgrims going to Santiago de Compostela who walked to either Polruan or Fowey and then took a ship to northern Spain. Because of this we will be looking for a new home for the "St Saviour stamp & pad" near to the ruin and easily accessible to CCW Pilgrims.

I would love to go on a CCW Pilgrimage but, sadly, my days of being able to do long walks are over so I am delighted that, from time to time in my role as 'CCW Pilgrim Liaison Officer for Lanteglos-by-Fowey Parish', I have met with organised groups of CCW Pilgrims who are passing through Polruan and served them drinks and biscuits in St Saviour Church and enjoyed chatting with them and encouraging them on their way - we will need a new venue for that too!



News from Polruan Academy

from Jane Wills, Headteacher

It is lovely to have the building full of children again after the summer break. They have returned with energy, enthusiasm and a renewed thirst for learning.

Teachers have lots of exciting things planned for their classes.

The younger children in Canute class are exploring "Why am I amazing?". They are learning about their senses and bodies in science so they can understand how their bodies and senses support them in their everyday life. In geography, they are completing fieldwork and mapping skills focusing on their immediate environment and where they live. They are studying colour in art and will be learning to create self-portraits in the style of Andy Warhol.

The children in Tregeagle class are exploring prehistoric Britain, looking at the changes from Stone Age through to Iron Age through their enquiry "Who Needs Change?" In Design technology, we tried replicating bronze casting by using some modern materials to find the best ways to make durable tools. The ielly was not particularly useful for tools but tasted great! We are linking space science to history by

considering how the changes through time on our planet is linked to our solar system. Some great opportunities for deeper thinking and philosophical pondering.

As part of the enquiry, we will take a whistle stop tour of two important prehistoric sites in Cornwall including Chysauster Ancient Village and Castle an Dinas hillfort so the children can make links between our wider history learning in school and Cornish history.

It promises to be a busy half term and I am sure you will be seeing us out and about in the village over the coming weeks.

The children were delighted to compete in and win a category in the Scarecrow Competition.



News from Frogmore Farm

Where are all the wasps? Usually at this time of the year we are inundated with them. We would be almost afraid to pick up a fallen apple. Now the grass is covered with fallen fruit and the trees are laden, but no wasps.



Has our very wet Summer got something to do with it I wonder?

The ants manage to survive whatever the weather. We were horrified one day to find our window blacked out by flying ants. They had followed a young queen through the window. I looked up flying ants and found the details quite fascinating. They only fly when the weather reaches a certain temperature, and it seems to happen all over the country on the same day. Another very surprising fact is that the queen ant usually lives for about fifteen years in the wild but has been known to live to twenty-four in a zoo. The green woodpeckers had a real feast that day, they hardly left the lawn.

The terrible gale we had a couple of months ago, the one that blew our runner beans out of the ground, also blew our swallows away. We haven't seen one since. We hope they managed to fly back to Africa in front of the storm. . .



As I write this the weather is so hot. We have put a shallow pan in the garden filled with gravel. Then we put some sugar in and topped it up with water. Within minutes there were dozens of bees drinking there, we have

to top it up regularly it's so very popular. The butterflies use it too.

The grain store pictured in the last newsletter is now full to the brim. The Spring barley yield was not as good as usual because the rain held up the combining for a couple of weeks and some grains fell onto the ground. It's a big loss but something we have no control over. The wheat however was better than we had expected.

At the moment the tractors are busy ploughing and working some fields to plant grass seeds. The crops have to be rotated from field to field to keep the soil healthy and good grass is always needed for silage to feed our animals over the Winter. It's a never ending cycle.

The rams were delighted to meet their ewes again this year. They had their harnesses fitted with a yellow crayon in place. This yellow mark tells us which ewes have been mated and that they will be the first to give birth in January. Three weeks later the flocks were brought into the yard and a red crayon was put in place. Within a couple of days dozens of ewes were marked red. I suspect the third week in January is going to be very busy indeed for Lorna and Sophie!



I am now retired so I know my job will be to amuse our Great Grandsons, who can now run faster than me and are full of mischief. The really exciting news is that we have another Great Grandson. Hamish has arrived, a baby brother for Angus. We are all so thrilled. I think I may be working the hardest after all!

Lanteglos-by-Fowey Parish Council October 2023

from Cllr Rob Rooney, Chair Lanteglos by Fowey Parish Council

Meeting of 25 July 2023

Councillors 'strongly object' to a planned replacement house on the clifftop at the entrance to Polruan. Revisions to a proposed demolition of Ferry Climb and its replacement with a much larger building did not go far enough for Lanteglos Councillors. There had been many objections lodged with the Planning Authority and several residents attended the meeting to speak against the proposal.

One resident compared the scale of the proposal to that of a hotel with a 'ballroom-sized' balcony overlooking his property. Councillors, listing the provisions of the Cornwall Local Plan that would be breached, agreed that the plan would be made 'void' if this proposal is approved. The Parish Council would have no objection to "a more modest development of a similar size and profile to the current property."

It is hoped that Cornwall's East Planning Committee supports the community and rejects this proposal.

Other planning applications

Also considered were two applications by Bodinnick's Old Ferry Inn. One was for variations to an existing permission to alter part of the building and the other was for alteration of the western elevation to provide parking and an enlarged terrace area. The meeting had no objection to these proposals.

A pre-application for the Old Sunday School, Polruan met with a negative response from Councillors. Despite amendments having been made, councillors felt the plan fell short of what is needed and that a full re-design should be considered.

Councillors felt unable to make a comment on the application for a replacement communications mast on land overlooking Bodinnick at Hall Farm "until the need for change is understood." The plans show a more obtrusive mast design, albeit reduced in size from the original conception.

Informal planning group

Councillors Adams, Ainley and Kelly, with Cllr Rooney sitting in on Bodinnick applications will form a panel of Parish Councillors to look at Planning Applications before they reach the full council meeting. The idea is to streamline the discussion before the full council makes its views known.

Grants available

Cornwall Council, via its 'Community Capacity Fund' has grant aid available for qualifying projects. If your community organisation needs funding (£2-5,000) for things like feasibility studies, business plans, architect's drawings or other professional

support, applications can be made to Cornwall Council.

She was assured that the surface water drain system is functional. Residents are urged to report any instance of overflows from manhole covers at the bottom of Fore Street and The Quay.

Planning Applications September 2023

PA23/03996, Old Ferry Inn Old Road Bodinnick – proposed parking and alterations to West elevation. Members had no objection.

PA23/04640, Old Ferry Inn Old Road Bodinnick – Change of Use of Part of the Old Ferry Inn to Dwelling – Variation to Approval PA22/07129. The applicant advised there is no room for a vehicle turning circle. Members had no objection.

PA23/04661, Ferry Climb Townsend Polruan – replacement dwelling. Members strongly objected to this application, which was subsequently withdrawn by the applicant.

PA23/05380 47 Fore Street Polruan – works to trees within a conservation area - removal of a Holly tree. NOTE – as this application is for works to trees in a Conservation Area, it will be decided under delegated authority. There is no need for Members to submit any comments to the local planning authority.

PA23/05623, 39 Fore Street Polruan – application for tree works within a Conservation Area: Full removal of 1 Ash tree. NOTE – as this application is for works to trees in a Conservation Area, it will be decided under delegated authority. There is no need for Members to submit any comments to the local planning authority.

PA23/00842/PREAPP, The Old Sunday School Polruan – pre-application advice for extension and alterations. Members objection to this application.

The Lanteglos by Fowey parish Council (LBFPC) thank the applicant and their representatives for the Pre-Application and response to the concerns, made by LBFPC and Cornwall Planning, from the previous application.

Whilst the Applicant, through the DAS, indicates they have addressed the issues cited in the LBFPC objections to the original application, we do not believe from the information provided that there are any significant changes to mitigate the majority of the PC's original concerns. Key comments include:

- The development is still considerably larger in size, scale and bulk than the current property and ridge height has not been altered significantly from the previous application with the majority of the ridge still at 46.4 so the bulk of the property has not changed significantly.
- The metal roof material is not in keeping with the surrounding area, it will be seen prominently from many areas of the village and most worryingly from 'the Bound' which is a key entrance and view into the village from $\operatorname{\mathsf{St}}\nolimits$ Saviour's $\operatorname{\mathsf{Car}}\nolimits$ Park with the estuary view being interrupted by a higher bulkier and incongruous roof line. Although there is one metal roof in the area — part of a ground floor extension — this is not large or visible and should not be used as precedent as at the time of development there was not a NDP in place. If the bulk of the roof could be reduced with a traditional slate tile roof covering this could make a significant
- There are still concerns around the extent of glass (although reduced slightly) and large balcony on westerly elevation which will impact the view of Polruan from the Estuary

 There could be privacy issues for the neighbouring properties as a raised balcony will undoubtedly increase the extent of overlooking.

LBFPC feel the applicant should consider a full redesign to reduce the above issues and would welcome the opportunity to informally discuss alternative options with the applicant and/or representatives.

PA23/05333, Hall Farm Old Road Bodinnick – proposed development by telecoms operator for the proposed removal of an existing 12.5m high aerial structure and replacement with a 15m high aerial structure on new foundations with associated electronic equipment.

Members noted the height had been reduced by 2.5M from the original proposal, however, it was not clear why the proposal is necessary, ie, what are the gains that would be made. Members are unable to determine their comments until they understand the need for the change.



Lanreath Parish Council

Summary of draft Minutes

Meeting of 18 July

Attendance by 7 of 9 Councillors. Chairman — Cllr Peter Seaman, Clerk — Mrs R Warren. County Councillor Colin Martin not in attendance.

Members of the public attended and expressed concerns regarding increasing antisocial behaviour in Lanreath, and complained of lack of Police response. Absence of the local PCSO was commented on. Later in the meeting, following a report made by a councillor, The Chairman offered to make contact with the relevant housing officials, if he is provided with a log of incidents – giving specific details of dates, times.

The Councillors stated their disappointment that Cty Cllr Colin Martin was absent again and had failed to attend an LPC meeting since February 2023.

Matters arising were considered including the reports of unauthorised building in the Parish, which were still unresolved, due to lengthy delays at Cornwall Council Planning Enforcement, an incident on the road to Stonerush Lakes where damage had been caused by a speeding/out of control vehicle which failed to stop, and a councillor vacancy.

The Meeting then considered correspondence from Cornwall Council and others. The Clerk reported that she had learnt that Cornwall Council had not been selected to receive part of the £775,000 Government funding being offered to selected local authorities to assist with fly tipping.

The Councillors considered the Clerk's Business Recovery report, regarding continuation of Parish Council operations in the event of the Clerk/Responsible Financial Officer being absent or incapacitated. To be considered further at the next meeting. Other agenda items considered by the meeting included an asset inspection report, Village Hall report, request for a donation towards the village fireworks display, and the proposed Youth Group meeting to be held in the Village Hall on 20 July.

The Vice-Chairman provided a report regarding the two funds administered by Cornwall Council (Community Capacity Fund and Community Levelling Up Fund). Any applications received are referred to Community Area Partnership (CAP) for comments. Councillors agreed that such requests could be circulated by email. As for the name of the CAP for the area including Lanreath, the Councillors agreed that Caradon was their preferred choice.

Cllr Sue Cave reported to the meeting regarding climate change issues, and it was resolved that she would be the LPC representative on CAP.

After considering the Clerk's financial report, and year to date figures, the meeting went on to discuss parish problems and any other business. The meeting was concluded, there being no further public participation from those attending.

Meeting of 8 August

Extraordinary meeting to consider two applications relating to the lodges development at Stonerush Lakes. Attendance by 6 Councillors. Chairman — Cllr Peter Seaman, Clerk — Mrs R Warren.

After discussion as to the reason for the applications, it was agreed that both applications were non-material, no objection.

Following a complaint regarding the draft minutes for the July 2023 meeting, members of the public expressed concerns that some of the recorded public comments could be viewed as discriminatory. It was agreed that amended draft minutes would be published.

The agenda items having been considered, and Parish problems reported, it was agreed that the next meeting take place on 19 September, and the meeting closed

The highlight of the summer season in the Fowey estuary is Regatta Week, culminating on our side of the harbour, with our annual RNLI Pig Roast and Barbecue. Another successful event was held this year. Do seek out the separate article for the record of this excellent occasion.

On the water and clifftops, while many enjoyed themselves, the RNLI volunteer crew were kept busy helping those in trouble. At lunchtime on 13 July, the Coastguard requested the launch of Fowey's inshore lifeboat to support cliff rescue teams who were dealing with an incident involving a person at Porthpean. As the incident progressed it was clear that this would be a long shout, so in mid-afternoon the Allweather lifeboat was launched to act as mother ship and allow crew-swapping. Eventually, after discussion between the RNLI and the Coastguard rescue team leader, the lifeboats were stood down. They eventually returned to base and prepared for service after a shout lasting over nine hours.

Two days later, both lifeboats were on their Tuesday evening exercise when at 7.05pm, the Coastguard requested that they proceed to Readymoney to investigate calls for help. They searched the area from Readymoney to Coombe for an hour and found nothing, before resuming their exercise.

An example of inter-agency operations took place on the afternoon of Saturday, 19 August when the Falmouth Maritime Rescue Coordination Centre requested the response of Fowey's Inshore lifeboat to reports of two people being cut off by the tide at Little Lantic Bay. Given the weather conditions, with a Force 5 onshore wind, it was decided to also launch Fowey's All-weather lifeboat. On arrival at the scene, large waves breaking onto the rocks prevented the inshore crew from recovering the casualties, now identified as a woman and her dog. The Coastguard helicopter was tasked to assist; a winchman was lowered onto the rocks and was able to recover both the woman and her dog. The helicopter then landed on the cliff top and handed them over to the Polruan Coastguard

Later the same evening, the All-weather lifeboat crew were tasked to proceed West beyond Dodman to Portloe, where reports had been received of a dinghy drifting about half a mile offshore. The lifeboat arrived on scene and quickly located the dinghy with noone on board and no evidence of recent use.



The dinghy was lifted aboard the lifeboat and brought back into Fowey Harbour.

The pagers for the Fowey RNLI lifeboat crews went off for the third time that weekend on the Sunday lunchtime, alerting them to a report that a powerboat had capsized while attempting to land on the beach at Lantic Bay, resulting in two casualties, one with a head injury. The Inshore D-class lifeboat was first to the scene, followed by the All-weather lifeboat. Inshore helm Amelia Luck and crew member Ross Jezard were landed ashore through the breaking waves, to assess the casualties. Crew member Callum Pritchard then transferred from the all-weather to the inshore boat to assist with the evacuation. After assessment of the casualties, they were ferried by the inshore lifeboat to the Allweather lifeboat, which was standing by offshore. They were then rushed to Fowey to await the arrival of an ambulance.



On 23 August, at the request of the Coastguard, Fowey's lifeboat crew launched the inshore D-class lifeboat, in response to a report that a day boat had broken down just off the Four Turnings race mark outside

Fowey Harbour. They found the broken-down boat anchored, with one person onboard. The lifeboat crew set up a tow and returned the boat safely to its mooring in Fowey.

RNLI volunteers provide a 24-hour search and rescue service around the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland coasts. The RNLI is independent of HM Coastguard and Government and depends on voluntary donations and legacies to maintain its rescue service. Since the RNLI was founded in 1824, its lifeboat crews and lifeguards have saved over 142,700 lives.

The RNLI is the charity that saves lives at sea. $\,$

Higher Windmill Allotments

Yes, we say this every year: this season has been quite difficult for vegetable growers in Polruan. We started with a late spring which was quite cold and then developed into a long dry early summer, followed by a warm wet spell.

The end result was that seed sowing was delayed and rainfall and warmth came at the wrong times. Potatoes have been very small but, courgettes and marrows thrived, if they were watered. You may have seen our courgettes and marrows offered free to passers by outside the allotment gate at Gypsy Lane. On the other hand, beans have had a bad year because of an absence of warmth and pollinating insects early in the season and the damage done by the hefty storm on 5 August (72.4mph northerly gust — remember?) to runner and French beans. Beetroot have done well but they are later than normal. We mustn't complain too much — we've had rhubarb and strawberries, blackcurrants and gooseberries. Winter greens and parsnips are looking promising.

We often forget to mention flower growing in our dedication to vegetables and fruit. This year some of our plots have been extremely attractive because of the flowers grown on them.

At this time of year, as they are freed up, we start preparing parts of our allotments in readiness for next year. There is much to do to control weeds because of recent warmth and rain.

The allotment year draws to a close in September when we pay the next year's rent and reallocate plots. We will also be electing a new allotment society committee at our AGM.

If you are interested in joining us by having a plot, speak to any allotment holder.

Polruan Coastguard from Des Libby, Station Officer



As we move into Autumn and look back on what has been a busy summer (with numbers depleted for various reasons), the team has been stretched with multiple call outs over the summer months. Some of these could have been avoidable with a few simple precautions and local knowledge. It is important to check the weather forecast and understand that conditions can be very different around some of our headlands and out to sea, than in the sheltered harbour of Fowey. Check the tide times either by buying a local tide book or checking it out online. If you have gone to a

secluded beach, keep an eye on your exit route as many beaches can leave you cut off as the tide comes in. Don't over stretch yourself whether swimming or in any craft, stay within your capabilities and conditions for your vessel. Know your location and have means of communication; remember you don't always have a signal on a mobile phone. If walking alone along our beautiful coastline or out in a boat alone, tell someone your plans for the trip and keep in touch with them should they alter.

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NCI POLRUAN QAVS

from Ray Rigg, Station Manager

By time that this article is published the sailing season will be drawing to a close and leisure boat owners will be thinking about laying up their boats for the winter. The NCI Station team will continue to keep watches during the winter but the emphasis will be turning to training and maintenance. So, we thought now would be a good opportunity to report on our achievements this year.

In common with many other charities after COVID and the lockdowns, we realised that we had lost a lot of our membership due to a variety of reasons, and that it was impossible to cover all of our watches. We have been steadily recruiting and training new watch keepers, we currently have 30 members including four trainees. Our adjacent stations at Charlestown and Rame Head have much bigger catchment areas and so they have seconded half a dozen volunteers to help us keep watches and that has been working very well. The lookout was manned for approximately 2000 hours to the end of August which is a vast improvement on last year.

We log all the vessels that we can identify, as of the end of August the figures were: -

Commercial vessel movements 1,426 [782] Leisure vessel movements 7,183 [3,524] Military vessel movements 50 [11] Other/FHC vessel movements 143 [63]

The figures in brackets are for last year so you can see that there has been a significant increase in movements this year.

The station has been involved in six incidents already this year, as compared to only three in 2022. Of our six this year three were engine failures, including one vessel that had run out of fuel.

The station has benefitted from a significant grant from the Barrie Bequest together with grants from various other bodies and a very generous donation from one of our members. This has enabled us to refurbish and re-equip the station to a very high standard, this work is now drawing to a close, the final job being to repair and/or replace our optical equipment during the winter. During the last two years we have replaced the roof, completely replaced the interior fittings and fixtures, acquired an additional radio set and



a VHF scanner, replaced the CCTV camera under the cliff and upgraded various pieces of equipment.



The Fowey Harbour Commission have been upgrading their radar and port control systems and the station now hosts their radar system. We were able to use some of our grant money to purchase a computer system that allows our members to use the radar in the lookout. It is an excellent system that combines the radar, AIS and sea charts all onto one screen

During the Autumn and Winter months the emphasis will be shifting to training, beginning with a presentation by the local UK Border Force team. We will be joined by our colleagues from the local Coastguard Rescue Team and will be following this up with some exchange visits so that we better understand one another's roles.

The station members will also be visiting The HM Coastguard Operations centre at Falmouth, to meet our opposite numbers and to see how they work. Later on, we are planning to visit both the HMCG Search and Rescue helicopter base at Newquay and the Air Ambulance.

There will also be an opportunity to visit the RNLI lifeboat in Fowey.
