But if Jesus is risen then your future is so much more beautiful and so much more certain than

The promises of God: in the book of Leviticus Chapters 25 and 26 which I was reading recently, God promises that if you obey him you will enjoy fruit, satisfaction, safety, peace, no fear, growth, the presence of the Lord and confidence to walk with heads held high. God says if you live by my decrees, you'll have a place of peace, you'll be able to go to sleep at night without fear.

What different styles of service will you find in the seven churches of Trelawny Benefice?

Everyone is welcome, and all our services and teaching are based on the Bible. There's usually tea, coffee and biscuits afterwards, with time to chat.

Please come along and discover what kind of service you like best.

Lansallos (St Ildierna): all services follow the ancient and beautiful words of the 1662 Book of Common Prayer, apart from a monthly contemporary service.

Lanreath (St Marnarch): evangelical services, with some led by the Lanreath Music Group (musical instruments and choir).

Pelynt (St Nun): traditional village church Holy Communion or Service of the Word, in contemporary language, together with a monthly contemporary service, sometimes outdoors.

Talland (St Tallanus): traditional village church Holy Communion or Holy Communion-by-extension services, in contemporary language.

Lanteglos-by-Fowey parish: has three churches:

Parish Church of St Wyllow: traditional services with organist and Lanteglos Choir. Holy Communion in contemporary language, and occasional Evensong with the 1662 Book of Common Prayer.

Polruan (St Saviour): friendly Café Church once a month, with round tables, prayers, singing, Bible readings and a chance to talk.

Bodinnick (St John): community services every other month, based around major Christian festivals and usually with wine and nibbles.

Outdoor services: held in the open air on village greens, farms and quaysides – they're family-friendly and great fun. 'Church on the Quay' in Polruan runs on six weekends in late July and August. Other services dotted around the Benefice include Plough Sunday, Rogation, Harvest, Tractors, Pets, Equestrian and Lambing.

News from Lansallos



By the time you read this the famous Lansallos Fete will have been and gone, we hope very successfully as the church relies very much on the income generated that day. The biggest potential problem is, of course, the weather – and the fete lies in the middle of the forty days after St Swithun's Day on 15 July, which every year we pray will be dry (a hope we share with holidaymakers too!). For according to a popular Elizabethan verse:

"St Swithun's Day if thou dost rain For forty days it will remain St Swithun's day if thou be fair For forty days 'twill remain na mair"

How did this curious legend come about? A little research reveals that St Swithun was a Saxon bishop, known for his charitable giving, for building churches and for a miracle he performed when he made whole again an old lady's eggs which workmen had accidentally smashed when building a church. He was said also to have performed posthumous miracles. St Swithun had asked with his dying breath to be buried humbly, outside where the rain from the heavens could fall on his grave, and his wishes were met for over 100 years.

But on 15 July 971 his remains were removed from their simple grave and interred in a shrine in Winchester Cathedral, where they remain to this day. St Swithun's feast day is the date of the removal of his remains, not the day of his death. But, according to legend, forty days of terrible weather followed, indicating that the Saint may not have been very pleased with his new resting place! Ever since, it's been said that the presence or absence of rain on 15 July determines the weather for the next forty days (though it must be mentioned that this hypothesis is not generally supported by Met Office data!).



It's also possible that the legend derives from a posthumous appearance that he supposedly made to Queen Emma (also known as Oelfgifa), the mother of Edward the confessor. She was accused of adultery with the Bishop of Winchester and had to prove her innocence, or otherwise, by walking barefoot across redhot ploughshares in the nave of the cathedral. She invoked the help of St Swithun who duly appeared and told her "fear not, the fire shall do you no hurt". The next day she miraculously walked across the hot blades without harm, thus showing her innocence, the achievement being accompanied by a ferocious rainstorm.

Future Event — Harvest Festival at Lansallos will be at 6.30pm on Sunday, 29 September, with the lovely *Just Voices* ladies choir from Looe singing with us. Do come and join us in giving thanks for the food we eat and for our hard-working farming community that produces so much of what sustains us.



News from Polruan Village Hall

Although most of the major works needed in the Hall have been completed, our Hall Improvement



We are grateful for a grant to replace the water heater in the kitchen from the late Councillor Edwina Hannaford's Community Chest and to Cornwall Councillor, Jane Pascoe, for enabling us to obtain this after Edwina's sad death. Edwina had supported the Hall with several grants over the years and was very supportive of this locality.

The hall continues to be well used with a variety of activities – Bowls on Mondays, Coffee and Chat on two Tuesdays a month with lunch on one of them, Yoga on Wednesdays, School PE on Thursday afternoons in the Autumn and Spring terms plus Table Tennis in the evening, Kidz Klub on one Friday evening a month, Film Club on one Saturday evening a month and Parish Council on one Tuesday evening a month in the Autumn and Winter.

We have also seen a number of Cornish Celtic Way Pilgrims sleeping in the hall overnight, mostly in ones or twos but including one group of six from Germany. They have commented on how comfortable they felt in the hall and on the excellent facilities and the lovely view from the balcony.

Polruan Village Hall is an ideal venue for parties and other family gatherings and for fund-raising events like our May Day Cream Tea which was reported on previously and for Table Top Sales like the one for Christian Aid reported in this issue.

Forthcoming events include our BBQ on the Old Coal Wharf on Sunday, 18 August from 6.30pm, plus an Afternoon Tea in the Hall in the Autumn – no date yet fixed for that so look out for posters and for posts on social media. Offers of help at the BBQ would be very welcome!

Our talk in June was given by Mike Hayward on 'The Voyage of the Mayflower: the myths and the reality'. Mike has illustrated and written many books on this and other subjects.

The Mayflower took the Pilgrims to North America, they weren't the first to make the voyage, they were preceded by explorers and traders, many of whom sailed past the Americas. Those who did land, spread terrible disease amongst the indigenous people and it's said up to 90% died. The Mayflower was supposed to accompany another ship, the Speedwell, on this voyage, but it was too leaky, never making it past Lands End. Both ships returning to Plymouth where some of the Dutch passengers jumped ship to the Mayflower which finally set sail in September 1620 with 102 on board. It should be noted the Pilgrim fathers would not have survived without the Pilgrim mothers and children, so the 102 were made up of men, together with 28 women, 31 children and a crew of 15 to 20. Strong seas prevented them getting to the planned destination and they ended up at Cape Cod; there was a lot of sickness on board and a lot of strife between the rank and file after ten difficult weeks at sea. To stop the arguing the Pilgrims signed the Mayflower Compact prior to leaving the ship to establish Plymouth Colony, a document which established the first form of democracy. A very interesting and informative talk.

At July's meeting we welcomed Tracy Jones to talk about her role as a 'Guide Dog Midwife and Trainer'. Tracy brought someone along to help her — a lovely, patient

51/2 year old dog called Poppy — who loved a fuss. The statistics she referred to were really quite shocking and we learned that every five minutes someone loses their sight, that 2 million people in the UK live with sight loss, including children and 25% of people of working age with sight loss are unemployed. During lockdown all training more or less stopped and after lockdown, like many charities, the Guide Dog Association had lost more than half of their volunteers. Guide dogs began in 1931 and then German Shepherds were the preferred breed. With the help of technology an App has been created called 'be my eyes' and also a group called 'my sighted guides' to help train people to help those who are blind. It costs £34,600 to breed and train a single guide dog and it can cost £54,800 to support guide dogs from birth to retirement. (2019 stats). All puppies are cherry picked to ensure only the best litters go on to training which takes a lot of hard work. Tracy works hard to raise the profile of the Association and funds needed to continue the fabulous work they do. A lovely talk with a dog included!





Letter from Nigeria

Violence has returned to Gwoza again as Boko Haram used 10 suicide bombers, all women, to create havoc in the area and thus allow Boko Harem to swoop in and shoot those fleeing. Unfortunately, 40 people died, including two of our COCIN members, many more injured, but Boko Harem were prevented from entering Gwoza. In the goodness of God, the soldiers saw them coming and were able to stop them. We need to pray for wisdom for the leaders and protection for the people. It was reported that one of the suicide bombers said, "I want to die and go to heaven" and then set off the bomb outside a Muslim wedding. We hear that worldwide Muslims are turning to the Lord and it's happening here too. COCIN is setting up a place at Foron, on the Plateau, renovating the Old Bible School buildings. Once this is ready and they have teachers, Muslims who are being persecuted for wanting to leave Islam can come for teaching and counselling before going back to their area. Do pray for this new outreach.

At the moment the Plateau is quiet, and the Police and Soldiers are successfully catching large numbers of kidnappers, drug dealers and those in possession of guns. Quite a number of folks kidnapped all over Nigeria have been released by the good works of the Soldiers

Positively, I can confirm that my hospital appointment with the consultant went well and unless there are any complications, I will continue with the same medicine and go and see the consultant again in November. PTL Recently the Gwoza community had a gathering to encourage each other and to recognise the work some of the older Gwoza Christians. Daniel was amongst those recognised. It's lovely to see the younger ones taking leadership, some of whom were our TEE students.

The crops are doing well. Some areas up North have not had any rain and yet in some parts of Nigeria there are floods.

Daniel and I are both well and busy and we continue to be able to help some who need food and supplies. Jason has just finished the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze medal and really enjoyed the challenge. Christabel is acting in a drama and enjoying it and Jessica recently sang a small solo at a Festival commemorating Shakespeare. We had a lovely time with Kumi, Bethany and Lydia when they visited Nigeria recently for a short holiday. They are now back in the UK and were able to take Ella with them for the school holiday, Mark will visit the UK in August and bring her home. Mark and his wife, Peace, recently dedicated their new child at COCIN HQ Church. Yusuf, Grace and all of the grandchildren, except Kumi, hope to be at the Carey Family Conference and look forward to seeing some of you there.

Rifkatu Manasa has now had her mastectomy and waiting for 2 more doses of Chemo in August. Thanks for your prayers.



News from Nigeria

At the end of June, I half heard something about violence in Nigeria on the BBC World Service and looking it up on the internet read about the Boko Haram attack on Gwoza that Kathleen wrote about. More recent news is that the death toll from that attack is now 40. That news item also stated that 'Borno state has been at the centre of a 15-year insurgency by Boko Haram Islamist militants, which has displaced more than two million people and killed more than 40,000.' Gwoza is where Kathleen and Daniel lived and worked for many years and I spent several very happy holidays there with them. During one holiday I climbed to the top of the Gwoza Hills with Daniel and others to a wedding that he officiated at. It was quite a climb over very rough terrain!

At about the same time as the attack on Gwoza, an armed criminal gang attacked a rural community in Sokoto State in the North West of Nigeria killing six people and capturing nearly 100 people to hold to ransom. The Nigerian economy is in a



dreadful state and this is resulting in many crimes including people stealing crops before their owners can harvest them.

There is some good news from Plateau State where Governor Caleb Mutfwang (who I taught at BSS Gindiri) is doing an excellent job of bringing the different tribal and religious groups in the state together for the common good and in containing the Fulani terrorists. He has stationed security units in a number of rural communities and equipped them with motor bikes so that they can easily pursue and arrest those trying to make terrorist attacks.







In the garden

Top Tips to bring great seasonal colour to your garden this August

August is usually one of the hottest months of the year. The warmth and summer spirit always combine to make August one of the most enjoyable months and where better to enjoy it than in the garden. The following plants will ensure fantastic summer colour.

Zinnia Elegans (Common zinnias) is a delightfully colourful, bushy annual in the Asteraceae family whose close cousins



include Sunflowers, Asters and Daisies. They bloom from early summer right through to early

autumn, making them fantastic for summer colour throughout August. They are available in a huge variety of colours from delicate daisy white through to fire cracker yellow and lipstick pink. They enjoy moist well-drained soil in full sun.

Clematis Viticella, have beautiful rich purple, deep blue and mesmerising white flowers which renew themselves, time after time,

continuing to bloom throughout the season and providing a wealth of colour all the way into Autumn. It is



incredibly hardy, enduring hot summers and cool winters with ease. For best results, these Clematis should be planted in full sun or partial shade, in moist but well-drained soil of any type. Be careful with the pH though, as this plant does not like very acidic soils.

Crocosmia 'Lucifer', this handsomely devilish perennial is easy to grow and will add fiery intrigue into almost any garden. Crocosmia's profuse, orangey-red flowers



make a vivid contrast against its green sword-like leaves and the plant is perfect for adding colour and

structure to the border. It also gives your garden a welcome burst of late summer colour just as other plants may be starting to fade. It is a clump-forming plant that does not require any pruning and is generally disease free. Crocosmia 'Lucifer' will thrive in a humus-rich soil that is moist but well-drained. It is extremely hardy and prefers a position in full sun or partial shade.

Agapanthus 'Regal Beauty', is a truly mesmerising plant. Throughout August and late summer, it exhibits dramatic violet-blue flower heads measuring up to 30cm in diameter. They grow on upright stems above the strappy evergreen foliage and are perfect for perennial borders or as potted plants. Agapanthus is not fully hardy and will need moving into a sheltered spot over winter. Use

loambased compost with added grit for drainage and keep the soil fairly moist.



Grow in a sunny, sheltered spot for best results.

Three top jobs for September

Summer is drawing to a close but there are still a number of gardening jobs that are worth doing. Get outside to catch the last of the summer sunshine, create some additional plants for free and prepare your garden with bulbs to ensure a spectacular spring colour display.

Dividing Perennials

Summer-flowering herbaceous perennials can be lifted and divided in September when they've finished flowering, but the soil is still warm enough to aid new root development. In fact, most perennials need to be divided every two to three years, otherwise they get too big for the space they're in and become congested.

To do it, gently dig out the plant you wish to divide. This is often best done with a fork



rather than a spade, as the latter is more likely to sever plant roots.

Once the plant is out, divide it in a way suitable to its type.

Small fibrous-rooted plants like Hosta (Plantain lily), Heuchera (Alum root) and Epimedium (Barrenwort) can be gently teased into two with your fingers, while larger fibrous-rooted varieties, such as hardy Pelargonium (Geranium) and Hemerocallis (Daylily), are best levered apart using two garden forks thrust back to back into the plant's centre. This will separate the plant into two with minimal root damage. If the plant you're dividing is especially big, you will need a good strong fork.

Plants that have woody crowns or fleshy roots, such as Astrantia (Masterwort), Delphinium (Larkspur) or Helleborus (Hellebore), usually need chopping in two with a spade or saw. So there's no need to be shy with these varieties.

Once the plant has been divided, replant the newly-divided specimens in your chosen spots and remember to water them frequently as they get established.

Planting Bulbs

September is the perfect time to plant hardy spring-flowering bulbs such as Narcissus (Daffodil), Hyacinth and Crocus. These bulbs will do best in a warm, sunny spot and they all love good drainage.

If you're planting them in a bed or border, dig a hole about four times the depth of the bulb



and put a layer of sand and grit in the bottom of the hole to aid drainage. Cover this with a little compost, then plant the bulbs under about 2-bulb's worth of depth of soil. Try bunching six to ten bulbs together in one spot, placed one bulb's width apart, or line a path them for an impressive display.

Bulbs are also excellent grown in pots, which can then be brought indoors for a marvellous spring flower display. Since they love good drainage and could rot if kept too wet over winter, plant them three bulbs deep in a good quality compost mixed with horticultural grit from the garden centre at a ratio of 3:1.

Taking Cuttings

Tender perennials like Fuchsia, Petunia, Salvia (Sage), Verbena (Vervain), Penstemon and Chrysanthemum can all be propagated with cuttings. This is a brilliant way to grow more plants for nothing, and there's something satisfying about nursing plants through from tender young shoots to fully-fledged plants.

You'll need to find strong, young growth that hasn't flowered this year and snip it off at an angle just beneath a leaf joint, leaving a stem of 5-

10cms in length. Next, strip off the leaves from the lower stem.

leaving



just one or two pairs towards the top. This will help to prevent the plant from losing too much water via its leaves while it has no roots to take moisture up from the soil.

Dip the end of the cutting in hormone rooting powder and plant in compost mixed with a little horticultural grit for drainage. This will help to prevent the end from rotting and promote good root growth.

Put the plants in a propagator or push wooden chopsticks into the soil around the cuttings and cover them with a plastic bag to help retain moisture. Place the cuttings somewhere bright and warm, but keep them out of direct sunlight until roots have formed (about six to ten weeks). It's a good idea to mist plants daily to ensure their water needs are met while they are still rootless.

When the cuttings have rooted, pot on into larger containers and overwinter them in a greenhouse or cool conservatory or porch.

Lorna had to roll all the fleeces and stack them twenty to a sack.

Simon and Ben hosted a visit from the East Cornwall South Devon Herd book society. Thirty or so people turned up one Sunday afternoon to take a tour of the farm and to look at the cattle. Ben carried them on a trailer with straw bales to sit on. Lorna and Sophie provided a barbecue to finish. It was a great success, enjoyed by everyone.



The weather was kind when the silage was cut and gathered into our new silage pit. It was harvested and safely covered down in just one day. Unfortunately, everyone got into a filthy wet mess as they covered the pit with tyres. All the tyres were full of smelly water left over from the Winter rains. I was thankful that I am now retired and considered far too old to help with that job!

In the last newsletter I wrote that the swallows were back and the little wren was in their nest. One afternoon there was a great deal of noise in the porch. A confused swallow was trying to inspect her nest only to find a very cross very tiny wren attacking her. After a couple of days of argument, the swallow gave up the fight and began to build a new nest, making thousands of trips to the boggy patch in the field bringing back a beak full of mud each time to build her new nest.

The wren's eggs hatched and we were very excited to watch the little fledglings taking their first short flights. Since then, the bossy little wren has hatched another brood and some baby swallows are now peeping out of their nest

Still on the subject of birds, the swifts arrived back at Frogmore announcing their arrival with their shrill shrieks. A few years ago, two birds came and nested in the eaves of the house. This year fourteen have been counted. This is really good news because they are becoming quite rare. They really are quite remarkable birds. They have very tiny feet with four toes which all point forwards so they cannot roost in a tree or wire. For approximately three years they never land at all, then the female flies into a flat surface to lay her eggs.

A lone red kite has been spotted gliding around the skies, it's bigger than a buzzard and has a very wedge-shaped tail.



This year is the NCI's 30th Anniversary, our first station at Bass Point was opened in 1994. To celebrate the anniversary, the NCI has commissioned a special flag with all of the station names on it. The flag is currently being relayed around the UK, having started at Fleetwood on 3 June; when it reaches Filey in September it will then be taken to Trinity House for permanent display.

Each station has tried to find an innovative way of carrying the flag to the next station. On 5 June it was carried from the station at Portscatho to Charlestown aboard a sail training ship. On 6 June Charlestown station dispatched it to us by bicycle through the Pinnock Tunnel to Fowey, where one of the Polruan watch keepers, Salvador Potter, brought the flag and its courier across the river in his classic rowing boat which was built in Fowey.

On 7 June it was Polruan's turn to carry the flag to our colleagues at Rame Head. So Ray Rigg, the Station Manager, along with his deputy, Grant Sharpe, travelled aboard watch keeper Mark Duffy's splendid Fairy Swordsman, Liberty. Going out was very enjoyable but coming back was a little more challenging as the wind and the tide were against us and we got somewhat wet. We met our colleagues from Rame Head in Cawsand bay for the handover to Robert Hillman, the Rame Head Station Manager.

We have now had three incidents this year the latest was on 13 July. A vessel had engine failure a mile offshore between Fowey and Lantic Bay. They called us on Channel 65 to ask for assistance and Jonathan Yeldham, who was on watch, relayed the information through to Falmouth Coastguard who issued a PAN PAN. A tow with Katie (FY 124) was organised and the casualty was safely returned to Fowey Harbour.

We are always on the lookout for new members to join our happy band of volunteers, who we train up to a standard similar to the RYA Day Skipper qualification. If you are interested in joining us do pop into the lookout and talk to the duty watch keeper or contact Ray Rigg, the station Manager, on 07956 286270.

Lanteglos-by-Fowey Parish Council Report July 2024

In its 400-year history, Bodinnick's Old Ferry Inn has probably never been more loved as during the last couple of months.

A community sprang into action once word spread that the current owners wanted to convert the river-facing third of the building into a private dwelling. Lanteglos-by-Fowey Parish Council's May meeting was the first rallying point, with over 30 people crowding into Whitecross Village Hall to object. With community group, Bodinnick United, conjured into being, over 200 objections lodged with Cornwall Council's planning department, window posters and banners appearing overnight, it was clear that a hornet's nest had been stirred.

The Parish Council unanimously objected to the proposal and then, on 3 July, Cornwall's Planning Department rejected the application. That prompted a huge sigh of relief but the battle to preserve a priceless heritage is far from over.

The Inn is now for sale. It remains to be seen whether the planning decision will be appealed or if the prized outside terrace will be restored.

One objector, speaking at the May Parish Council meeting, said the planned conversion was an attempted 'privatisation of public space'. I was impressed with that at the time but, on reflection, it is factually incorrect. The Old Ferry Inn has always been in private hands and has always been subject to a mixture of owners' whims and economic pressures.

But the first part of that equation could be neutralised if a bold initiative by Bodinnick United succeeds. It is a sad fact that, all over the country, pubs and clubs have closed their doors forever. And whenever that happens, the community dies a little.

But communities can and do rally to step in and take ownership of the former business as a community asset. That is what Bodinnick United hopes to do with the Old Ferry Inn. There are many obstacles to overcome, not least meeting the asking price. But restoring this iconic, world-famous Inn to its former glory and ending uncertainty over its future could be the glue that binds together the community on the east side of the River Fowey.

Polruan – application for Non-Material
Amendment to PA23/01876 for Renovation
and extension of an existing dwelling
including changes to levels and layout, an airsource heat pump and work on windows and
voids. The case officer was unable to grant an
extension and a response of "NO
COMMENT" was agreed by the Planning
Working Group.

PA24/03148, Ferry Climb Townsend – proposed installation of stone cladding on the lower ground floor elevations, vertical timber board cladding on the existing dormer and a full-size gable end window. Works to be carried out to lower the existing dormer to match the original height of the main roof under permitted development right. Members made "NO COMMENT" as the work is already in progress and there is no significant change to the original planning application.

PA24/02582, Land Adjacent to Vevery Car Park Townsend – change of use of land to storage compound, and the creation of a new access. Cllr. Kelly left the meeting for this discussion. Members OBJECTED to this application. Their full response can be seen on Cornwall Council's website, or you may obtain a copy from the Clerk.

PA24/00516, Land North of Frogmore Farm Lanteglos – erection of new agricultural barn for livestock purposes. Members commented this was similar to the application discussed before and recognised this as a specialist issue.

PA24/02259, Old Ferry Inn Old Road
Bodinnick – change of Use of Part of the Old
Ferry Inn into Dwelling with additional
balcony to West Elevation. Members
OBJECTED for several reasons, specifically
because it Contravenes NDP Policy1.1 and
CLP Policy 24 Historic Environment – harm/
removal of a heritage asset in a conservation
area. Their full response can be seen on
Cornwall Council's website, or you may
obtain a copy from the Clerk.

Proposed Telecommunications Base Station at New Hill Road, Fowey – there was insufficient time allowed for Members to consider this proposal at a formal PC meeting.

Members comments were sent to the applicant, Galliford Try with concerns about; the increase in height, siting of the mast close to schools and housing, preference for siting on higher ground such as near near Four Turnings garage.

PA24/03863, 7 Fore Street Polruan – single storey side extension to fill in existing courtyard. Members noted the deadline only allowed consideration via email and a response of "NO COMMENT" was submitted to Cornwall Council.

PA24/00622/PREAPP, Pink Cottage 18 Old Road Bodinnick – pre-application advice for additional storey to the existing property to create an additional bedroom and bathroom. plus adding an additional story to the detached garage to create a self-contained 1 bed flat. Members made "NO COMMENT" as there is insufficient information provided to make any sensible comment.

PA24/04174, 58 West Street, Polruan – extension to incorporate a small courtyard into the main house . Members made "NO COMMENT" as this looks to be a simple infill and extension of roof line all to be painted in the same colour.

There was also discussion about the Trust's future projects, their relative priority and the means of funding them . . . the Winkle Picker apartment, public toilet refurbishment on the Quay and roof repairs to the Reading Room and Surgery.

Summary of draft Minutes Meeting 21 May

Annual Meeting. Attendance by 5 of 8 Councillors and County Cllr Colin Martin. Chairman - Cllr Peter Seaman, Clerk Mrs R Warren. Election of Chairman (Cllr Seaman) and Vice-Chairman (Cllr Heard).

PCSO Cocks reported via email that there had been no crimes reported in the Parish throughout April.

County Cllr Colin Martin provided a full report, a copy of which can be accessed on the Parish website.

Considering matters arising, Councillors expressed their disappointment at the lack of progress by Cornwall Council Planning Enforcement after reports were made a year ago of unauthorised building around the Parish. The Chairman will continue to actively pursue this.

Concerns were raised about the continuing issue of safety on the B3359 which is regularly flooded. Some works have been carried out, but their efficacy is yet to be tested.

Cornwall Council and other correspondence was then dealt with, after which the meeting reviewed Lanreath Parish Council's Policies and Procedures. Thereafter Councillor representatives reported to the meeting regarding Lanreath Village Hall, Parish Council assets, and Climate Change. The meeting then discussed the Councillor vacancies, which it was agreed should now be advertised.

Finances were reviewed following the completion of the year end, and payments approved including the annual insurance premium and the purchase of two replacement benches for the Millennium Green – from the Contingency General Reserve.

After a brief review of the annual RoSPA playground inspection report, Councillors discussed Parish problems and the meeting concluded.

From Travelers to Tourists, the Story of Pre-1914 Visitors to Cornwall

A talk by Louis Turner



Louis Turner will tell the story of the early travellers passing through Cornwall, including an intrepid lady adventurer in the 1690s, Daniel Defoe, Charles Dickens and Queen Victoria. As we move into the peak summer season for leisure activities in the estuary, both on and off the water, so too the volunteer crew of the Fowey lifeboat crews are called upon for those in trouble.

On the afternoon of Sunday, 12 May, Fowey's volunteer lifeboat crew launched their Allweather lifeboat, the Maurice and Joyce Hardy, to assist a 17ft Dory, which was reported to have broken down in the vicinity of Lantivet Bay. When the lifeboat arrived at the scene the vessel was empty and anchored while the three recent occupants were spotted on a nearby beach. As the beach was only accessible from the sea, the onboard XP inflatable was launched. On reaching the shore, crew members James Dowrick and Graham Middlewood found the three marooned boaters safe and unharmed. They were transferred to the All-weather lifeboat and then the lifeboat crew boarded the anchored Dory. They were able to restart its engine and, escorted by the lifeboat, returned the Dory to Fowey where it was handed over.

On Sunday, 19 May, a phone call was received by the duty Launch Authority (LA) at Fowey lifeboat station, reporting a man immobile and with a serious head injury on Little Coombe Hawne beach, to the west of the harbour entrance. Fortunately, both the Allweather lifeboat and the D-Class inshore lifeboat were manned for their regular Sunday morning training sessions, and in view of the nature of the emergency, both were tasked to the scene. A request was also sent for assistance from St Austell Coastguard. On arrival at the scene, casualty-care trained personnel were landed, while further crew followed, using the D-Class lifeboat. The casualty, who had fallen from the cliff, was triaged, given oxygen and bandaged. He was then placed in a stretcher and, using the inshore lifeboat, transferred to the All-weather lifeboat, along with a family member and their dog. The lifeboat then sped to Fowey station, where the injured man was passed into the care of a waiting ambulance team.

Fortunately, someone was at the lifeboat station to take the phone call reporting the injury. However, Fowey station, like many others is not always manned. In the event of an emergency, the caller should first dial 999 and ask for the Coastguard. The Coastguard has direct contact with both lifeboat crew and station personnel and can request lifeboat launches, as well as coordinating with other emergency services such as the ambulance service and rescue helicopters.



As a happy footnote to this emergency, the casualty, his companion and their dog Brodie called into the station to thank the crew and to donate £1,000 to express their gratitude for everything the crew had done, even looking after Brodie! The casualty had needed 21 staples in his head, and had cuts and bruising, but after tests and scans, had not needed to stay in hospital.

On the afternoon of Saturday, 25 May, Fowey's All-weather lifeboat was launched to assist with the rescue of a woman swimmer in difficulties in the sea below Carlyon Bay Hotel, whilst participating in a local swimming event. The Carlyon Bay Lifesaving Club were able to get the swimmer to nearby Crinnis Beach, which can only be accessed from the sea, while teams from St Austell and Mevagissey Coastguard had descended the cliff by rope to assist. The casualty was exhausted and suffering from hypothermia. The crew on the All-weather lifeboat launched their small inflatable XP boat, to ferry the woman off the beach and bring her safely onboard. Onshore conditions prevented the lifeboat landing at Charlestown so, while the casualty was managed for hypothermia, she was taken back to Fowey, given dry clothes and warmed up. She then returned home with her husband.

The next day the woman sent a message to the crew: 'Hello! I just wanted to pass on my sincerest thanks to James, Will, Harry and the crew who rescued me from near Charlestown yesterday, when I got into trouble swimming. You were all so kind and truly amazing. So sorry to have interrupted your Saturdays. Thank you.' An excellent outcome and teamwork by all the rescue services involved.

On Bank Holiday Monday, 27 May, Fowey's inshore lifeboat was again launched. A 13-year-old boy had fallen down a cliff on his bike, on the east side of Spit Beach, Par. Due to conditions and reducing visibility the crew on the inshore boat requested back-up from the All-weather lifeboat. When they reached the scene, the local Coastguard teams had located the casualty and an ambulance had arrived. Both lifeboats were stood down as no further assistance was required.

On Sunday, 2 June, at 6.42pm, Fowey RNLI crew launched their D-Class inshore lifeboat after the Coastguard requested assistance for three paddle boarders. They had been spotted by the National Coastwatch Institute watch-keeper and there was concern that two adults and one child appeared to be in difficulty on two paddle boards, about a mile off Par Beach. With the strong offshore wind, they

were struggling to reach the shore. The inshore lifeboat crew located the paddle boarders who had made their way to the shoreline. They confirmed that they had got into difficulty earlier but were now fine and did not require assistance.

Fowey Lifeboat Operations Manager, Chris Ogg, said: 'It's important to check weather conditions before going out paddle boarding. Avoid offshore winds because they will tire you quickly when trying to return to shore. Always wear a personal floatation device and a leash and hold onto your board if you get into trouble. Try to choose a lifeguarded beach and always carry a means of calling for help. If you do get into trouble, call 999 and ask for the Coastguard.'

On Sunday, 9 June, the Fowey All-weather lifeboat was launched to assist in the search for a missing diver off the Eddystone Lighthouse. The search was co-ordinated by Falmouth Coastguard and involved the local lifeboat, Plymouth All-weather and inshore lifeboats, Coastguard Rescue Helicopter 94 and the MOD aircrew training vessel, the Smit Yare. The Smit Yare had reported that all but one of its divers had returned to the vessel and a coordinated search was established for the missing diver. The Plymouth inshore lifeboat crew located the diver floating on the sea surface and transferred him to their Allweather lifeboat. A paramedic from the rescue helicopter was winched down onto the Plymouth boat and carried out a full assessment of the casualty. He was found to be well, required no further medical support and was returned to his vessel.

On a happier note, don't forget the Polruan RNLI Pig Roast and Barbecue, to be held on the Coal Wharf on the evening of Saturday, 24 August. The Elderberries will be providing the entertainment.

As we move into July you can tell its summer, the wind is blowing, the rain beating against the window and the Cornish lanes are filled with drivers who can't reverse! But whatever the conditions, the Team carry on with their training in readiness for whatever situation they are likely to be tasked to assist. It's not only the traditional cliff rescue work, with all its dangers, but in the more modern era they are trained in different search techniques which could include working with many other organisations such as the Lifeboats, Cornwall Search and Rescue, Police, South West Ambulance Service, Fire Brigade and local authorities. Good communications and local knowledge are essential assets for everyone. Water rescue and safety also plays a large part in the Teams' regular training, being able to carry out rescues not only from around our coastline but also being able to assist further inland on our many rivers. First Aid, or as it is now called 'Casualty Care', is another skill that the Team have and practice regularly with the ever growing list of equipment, including a defibrillator, which is now available to the Team to work with in some remote areas that they could find themselves in.

Recruiting is ongoing and with two members of the Team on long term sick, we need more people to step forward, so if you would like to join a great Team and give something back by helping other people in their hour of need, then the Coastguards could be for you. Contact any member of the Team for more details, visit our facebook page or call into the

station on a training night which is the second and fourth Thursday of the month.

Please take care when going to the beaches or coastline:

- Know your limitations and don't take risks
- Have a means of communication and know where you are
- Check the tide timetable and local weather forecast
- Keep a close eye on children, especially those with inflatables
- Do not enter the water after drinking or a large meal.

From Station Record

Team tasked to assist person ill on coastline path near Blackbottle, person quickly found and given casualty care before being handed over to family member for transport to next level of care.

10th July, 1258; Team tasked again to join in search for missing person, Looe area. Stood down 2211.

12th July, 0911; Team tasked for the third time to assist with search for same missing person. Stood down 1856.

Well done to the Team for their efforts in the major search for a missing person from Looe Valley Holiday Park, putting in many hours



and working with many other CRT's and other agencies over a four day period and covering a large area of difficult terrain, as yet without a satisfactory outcome.

Remember if you see anybody in difficulty along the coastline call 999 and ask for the Coastguard
