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# **Church Diary** in the Benefice of Trelawny

St. Wyllow Lanteglos; St. Saviour Polruan; St. Ildierna Lansallos; St. Tallanus Talland;

What different styles of service will you find in the seven churches of Trelawny Benefice?

Everyone is welcome, and all our services and teaching are based on the Bible. There's usually tea, coffee and biscuits afterwards, with time to chat.

Please come along and discover what kind of service you like best.

Lansallos (St Ildierna): all services follow the ancient and beautiful words of the 1662 Book of Common Prayer, apart from a monthly contemporary service.

Lanreath (St Marnarch): evangelical services, with some led by the Lanreath Music Group (musical instruments and choir).

Pelunt (St Nun): traditional village church Holy Communion or Service of the Word, in contemporary language, together with a monthly contemporary service, sometimes

Talland (St Tallanus): traditional village church Holy Communion or Holy Communion-by-extension services, in contemporary language.

Lanteglos-by-Fowey parish: has three churches:

Parish Church of St Wyllow: traditional services with organist and Lanteglos Choir. Holy Communion in contemporary language, and occasional Evensong with the 1662 Book of Common Prayer.

Polruan (St Saviour): friendly Café Church once a month, with round tables, prayers, singing, Bible readings and a chance to talk.

Bodinnick (St John): community services every other month, based around major Christian festivals and usually with wine and

Outdoor services: held in the open air on village greens, farms and quaysides — they are family friendly and great fun. 'Church on the Quay' in Polruan runs on six weekends in late July and August. Other services dotted around the Benefice include Plough Sunday, Rogation, Harvest, Tractors, Pets, Equestrian and Lambing.



# **New Electoral Roll**

## from Janet Downes, Church Electoral Officer

Every year at this time, the Church Electoral Roll for the three churches in our Parish is updated, but this year a completely new roll has to be prepared. This means that everybody who wishes to be on it, must complete and submit a form, whether or not they've been on it in the past. Notices about this will be posted in the porches of each Church in the Parish by 6 February and paper copies of the application forms will be available at each Church. If I have your email

address, I will send you a form. Please return your completed forms to me before 8 March.

Now you may be wondering 'What is the Church Electoral Roll and why would you want to be on it'?

It is the Parish Churches' Register of lay electors and no Clergy may be on it. In the same way that being on the Civic Electoral Roll allows you to vote in Parliamentary and Local Elections and Referenda, joining the Church Electoral Roll means that you can vote on Church matters, attend the Annual Parochial Church Meeting and ask questions and stand for election to the Parochial Church Council or the Deanery Synod.

Being on the Electoral Roll does not make you a 'member' of the Church; simply regarding one of the Churches in Lanteglos Parish as your spiritual home does that. You can, of course, be a full and active member of one or all of the Churches in Lanteglos Parish without joining the Roll. Being on the Electoral Roll does not involve any additional commitments, and costs nothing.

So why be on the Electoral Roll? Joining the Electoral Roll indicates your commitment to the Lanteglos Parish Churches' community and to the vision of the Church. The Electoral Roll is one indicator of the strength of the Church in our local area, and more widely.

# Covenant Service from Kathryn Hill

John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, started an annual Covenant Service to be held annually at the beginning of the year in Methodist Churches. Some years ago, Lanteglos-by-Fowey Parish decided to hold this service annually. As we celebrate Epiphany on the first Sunday of the New Year, the Covenant Service is usually held on the second Sunday of January, as it was this year.

As a teenager, newly 'received into church membership' (the Methodist equivalent of confirmation), I remember being very challenged by the Covenant Promise and I still find it challenging today! In the service we pray:

"I am no longer my own but yours. Your will, not mine, be done in all things, wherever you may place me, in all that I do and in all that I may endure; when there is work for me and when there is none; when I am troubled and when I am at Peace. Your will be done when I am valued and when I am disregarded; when I find fulfilment and when it is lacking; when I have all things, and when I have nothing. I willingly offer all I have and am to serve you, as and where you choose.

Glorious and blessed God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, you are mine and I am yours. May it be so for ever. Let this covenant now made on earth be fulfilled in heaven."

# **News from Lansallos** from John Feesey, Lansallos PCC

### **Church Improvements**

Recent visitors to the Church of St Ildierna may have noticed a few changes. The first is the laying of new carpets around the two altars and on the platform and steps leading up to the vestry. Due to rising damp in the walls the old carpets, which were made of wool and easily absorbed moisture, were not only very stained in places but had also started to smell unpleasantly. After taking advice from local carpet fitter, Mr Matt Rollings, it was decided to replace them with new, polystyrene carpeting in the same colour but which it is hoped will be more moisture resistant; time will tell!

The second change is the replacement of the previous, hand-drawn, churchyard map with an updated digital version, a useful by-product of the National Burial Grounds Survey (NBGS), sponsored by the Church of England in conjunction with English Heritage and which is nearing completion. This national project aims to record photographically all visible churchyard memorials and digitise current and archived Parish Registers at no cost to PCCs. Anyone interested in this survey can obtain more information online at www.agintl.org.

Lastly, churchyard visitors may notice the absence of a large ash tree which was growing on the wall marking the boundary with the Old Rectory next door. The tree had to be taken down as it was in a potentially dangerous state having sadly succumbed to "ash die back", a fungal disease that can be lethal to trees of the Fraxinus species like this example. The work was skilfully done by local tree surgeon, Mr Callum Dack.

# **Church Bench Ends**

Artist Gabby Schooling and historian Jenny Wallis related in the last edition of the Parish News how they had explored the history behind the 500 year old images carved into the bench ends of the pews at Lansallos Church, many of them depicting people in profile. Using her imagination Gabby has produced these six wonderful portraits showing frontal views of some of these carvings in full colour. Jenny has meanwhile continued her research into Margery Buttoxhead's (nee Smith) slab portrait mounted on the inside south wall of the church. Both ladies are expected to return for a few days at Easter for further research and to hold an exhibition in the church of their findings.

- The Feast of St Ildierna (Patronal Sunday) will be celebrated at Evensong at 6.30pm on Sunday, 9 February, followed by a slice of birthday cake and a glass of wine to mark the 704th anniversary since the dedication of the present building (there were at least two earlier places of worship on the same site).
- At 3pm on Sunday, 23 February, a service to mark Plough Sunday will be held when it's hoped that local farmers will bring their tractors and ploughs for a blessing.
- A Mothering Sunday service will take place at 4pm on Sunday, 30 March, when all ladies will be given a posy of spring flowers.

In October we were visited by Eve Hall, Port Welfare Officer for the Mission to Seafarers, Fowey. Eve gave an interesting talk about the history and work of this charity. She described how she meets crew on board and on shore to offer support. This ranges from providing company at the mission in Fowey and helping with shopping trips, to more serious situations such as injury and repatriation assistance.

In the run-up to Christmas there was a letter in the Daily Mail asking: 'Is there anyone in the Church of England who is not linked to historical child abuse'? In the light of recent news about both child abuse in the Church and the failure of those who knew about it to take the appropriate action to bring the perpetrators to justice, I wrote saying that I could understand the reason for the letter. I also wrote:

"As a Christian who has been involved in Church Children's work all my adult life in several denominations including Anglican, I am broken hearted both by the abuse done by people who claimed to be Christians and by the failures of Church authorities of all denominations when dealing with it. What is more I know that the Jesus I love and serve and who welcomed children, will deal very severely with those who have harmed children".

I was pleased that my letter was published as I hope it might reassure people that most of us in the Anglican (and in all other churches) care very much about the harm that has been done both by perpetrators and by those who failed to deal with the issue. So, please don't tar us all with the same brush.

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# **News from Polruan Academy**

The building is bursting with learning and it is a real pleasure to see how the children are embracing this with enthusiasm and positive attitudes. Teachers have planned exciting irresistible learning which is varied, broad and all encompassing. We are fortunate enough to have the excellent Mrs Butlin back with us for this term and the children are absolutely delighted with learning how to read musical notation to play ukulele and flute. It makes for a bustling afternoon with excitement, dedication and noise, which cannot always be classed as musical, however all children are learning new skills, applying prior knowledge and they are thoroughly enjoying the opportunity to play an instrument.

In Tregeagle class, the children will be studying the National Census from archives and finding out what this can tell us about our local area. They will focus on Victorian times, building on their learning from earlier this year about how children's lives have changed from Tudor to modern times. In science, they will explore skeletons and muscles and use this learning to write a scientific report about an animal of their choice.

Our youngest children in Canute class are studying 'Who can be Royal?' They will look at our monarchy, find out about coronations, and study the ascent of William the Conqueror to the English throne. They will study how castles were built to defend territory and become engineers when they design and build their own fortified castle in Design Technology. They will study chronology and support their understanding of change by looking at how toys have changed over time. In English, they are learning the story George and the Dragon and will use this to write their own royal quest story.

Casting a look back to Autumn term and the Christmas performances, we were delighted to celebrate another resounding success. Having the opportunity to perform their plays in the Village Hall adds a sense of occasion with the stage, sound and lighting. The

children were amazing as always and I can safely claim that we have quite a few very accomplished performers in school. Standing on a stage in front of lots of people can be scary and exhilarating in equal measure, however it is a very valuable experience for the children to have. What a group of confident children we have in our school!

Thank you for supporting our Christmas events, any money raised will be spent on resources to enhance learning experiences for all the children in school. A huge thank you to parent volunteers for helping with refreshments and the gift room, to staff for organising and delegating and to the many of you who donated gifts. Thank you to the organisers of Poly Swish clothes swap, who again this year donated part of their fundraising to the school. A special thank you to Suzanne, our Governor, who devotes many hours to supporting the school by helping out with fundraising, listening to children read weekly, supporting staff with her kindness and perceptive observations and always championing our school.

Last year, we were invited to the Aladdin musical at Theatre Royal, courtesy of the Regatta Committee, which was a fantastic experience for our children. This year, we decided to take the children to the cinema to watch the quintessentially British institution that is Paddington. The children enjoyed the film and were mesmerised and absorbed in equal measure — the popcorn and drink helped too. A really lovely experience for all the staff to share with the children.

We continue to develop the children's digital skills and all the children now use a digital platform to record their maths and wider curriculum learning, even our very youngest pupils can navigate the iPads and record their learning. This has supported the children's independence in learning and significantly enhanced their understanding of the benefits of technology as learning tools.

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# News from Nigeria from Kathryn Hill

Although there has been some improvement in the security situation with the military and the police being more effective in arresting bandits and terrorists, Nigeria is still a dangerous place to live and especially to travel. This is made worse by the fact that the economy is getting worse. The exchange rate is very high, so the cost of imported goods is prohibitive. People struggle to afford basic necessities and school fees are very difficult for people to afford. As a result, many people are suffering from stress and high blood pressure with a number of deaths attributed to this.

Despite these problems COCIN (Church of Christ in Nations, formerly Church of Christ in Nigeria) the church I worked for and which Daniel and Kathleen still work for, has started an outreach programme to a number of *unreached people groups* on the Nigeria/Cameroon and Nigeria/Niger borders.



However, supporting the church workers sent to these remote areas is quite costly, so it is a real step of faith in times of severe economic hardship.

An *unreached people group* is a community or tribe who have not yet heard the good news about Jesus. This can be because their country as a whole has not heard the Christian message or, as in this case, despite there being many churches in their country, there are none in the remote area where they live.

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# **Higher Windmill Allotments**

A recent tour around the allotments demonstrates the gardeners' efforts to prepare for the new season. Most plots are well tilled and waiting for planting and seed sowing . . . another exciting season is expected and we are all assessing what seeds to buy in readiness.

During the winter we have been weeding, tilling the ground and spreading manures. This year a number of gardeners have bought in green manure, others are continuing to rely on traditional farmyard manure to improve their soil. Most gardeners have a compost heap on which they have disposed of weeds through last season. Now is the time to assess whether the compost is ready to spread on the plot. Another winter activity is pruning fruit bushes to maximise next season's fruit crop.

We are still harvesting the last of last season's crops. There have been good crops of Brussels sprouts which still continue as well as of kale, cabbage and other brassicas. There are parsnips to find and dig up and we are waiting for purple sprouting broccoli to flower over the next month or so. The broccoli is probably the final crop of the last season.

They identify a mining village in deepest Wales and set off in a minibus to make their donation in person. And so begins the extraordinary story of two seemingly alien communities who form a surprising and ultimately triumphant partnership. Rated:15


# **Polruan Open Gardens** 2025

In the meantime, Dave will be bringing a lovely selection of **local cheeses** to fill the gap.

Outside in the Jubilee Shelter, Richard and Aileen will be frying up their addictive **rare breed bacon** as always, but this spring they'll also be selling mutton for the first time, from pasture-fed **Greyface Dartmoor** sheep (along with their regular hogget, brisket burgers and potatoes from their regenerative farm). Ask them about sheepskins too. Curry fans will know that mutton makes an amazing curry, and so too does **goat meat** – which luckily is also on sale at Whitecross, raised by Helen on her Coppergon Farm near Tywardreath.

What else will you usually find at Whitecross? Cakes, bakes, breads and quiches, Dexter beef, Ukranian treats, milk, butter and cream, sausages, ham, preserves, seasonal veg, ciders, beers and spirits, honeys, flowers (from March onwards), soaps, skincare and candles, cards, wood turning, bonsai, willow basketry, local charcoal and much more...

# **News from Frogmore Farm**

A rather late thank you to everyone who came to the Frogmore Nativity service. I hope everyone enjoyed it as much as we all did.

What weather over the New Year — rain, gales and more rain. I spent some time looking back into the old farm diaries; it was very surprising to learn how many years in the last thirty or so were exactly the same. I think looking back, our memories are usually focused on the good days, for instance I can only remember sunny days in my childhood!

The farm is always busy whatever the weather and each season brings its challenges. Just now it's baby animal time — lambs and calves. Lorna and Sophie were busy stocking the medicine cabinet ready for any emergency, including delivery gel for difficult births, iodine for umbilical cords and colostrum (to make sure each baby has enough early immunity from the many challenges they will face in the first few days of life).



Ben and his friend Adam sheared the rear ends of each ewe, as this helps to keep the area clean for Lorna and Sophie, should the ewe need help and also helps the lambs find its Mum's udder more easily to get that vital first drink of her rich milk that they need.

The little boys have had a lovely time helping to build a den by the lambing shed. They have a little table and chairs, a toy kitchen and lots of pretend features. This a safe area where the boys can play while Lorna and Sophie are busy with lambs. They can help feed any tame lambs too.

In the cow shed, I am pleased to report that the cow whose test for TB had been inconclusive sixty days ago, was retested and thankfully declared clear this time — such a relief.





While the vet was on the farm she removed some pregnant heifers' horns. We can never predict how a new mother will behave. Some are quite calm when you approach their calves but some, who are normally calm animals, can be very protective of their baby. So, for everyone's safety the horns had to come off.

Ben has been catching up with trimming some of our hedges. I know this is a controversial subject. The roads need to be done for all our safety, but not until the little birds have left their nests. The field hedges need to be stock proof and hedges left uncut for many years, grow straggly. That is not good for farm animals nor is it good for the wildlife either. Trimming hedges helps them to thicken up (like shrubs in the garden). The birds have more shelter and safer places to nest; more fruit and berries are produced in the following year and so, by selective cutting, wildlife has a safe home and plenty of food.



Sprout the turkey has grown his new feathers at last and he is now a very handsome bird. I wonder if we will have some turkey chicks in the Spring . . .?

Our porch has been taken over again by wrens. As dusk is falling, we can hear them arguing over the best swallow's nest. They all pile in. If we put the light on and peep out lots of cross little birds bob up to see what's going on. We can't open the door, trying to catch twelve tiny birds and put them outside again is very difficult. One lucky little bird managed to spend the night in the kitchen. It must have hidden behind the curtain. As a thank you, we were left lots of little presents to clean up.

# Lanteglos-by-Fowey Parish Council February 2024

from Rob Rooney, Chair Lanteglos-by-Fowey Parish Council

A disturbing incident occurred in Polruan on January 5 which exposed a worrying gap in NHS provision for the village.

Charles Clare-Dunbavand, a member of Lanteglos-by-Fowey Parish Council, came across an elderly man who had fallen and suffered a head injury. It was a freezing cold evening and the casualty was clearly in need of medical attention. With help, Charles managed to get the person home and a 999 call was made. Aware that Polruan's isolation made a long wait for an ambulance likely, Charles asked for a 'first responder', of which there are least two in the village. The on-call responder was able and willing to attend but needed the go-ahead from the 999 dispatcher. Charles made another call. The reply was "that it would be for the dispatcher to decide and maybe they were being held back in case there was a more serious need".

What, you may ask, is the point of a first responder system if they are not allowed to respond? On further investigation it appears

that cost appears to be a factor. The first responders are attached to the fire and rescue service, which charges the ambulance service for callouts. It would appear, casualties reduced to items on a balance sheet.

This distressing experience is due to be discussed at Lanteglos-by-Fowey's January meeting on 14 January (after the deadline for this article). Also on the agenda is the future (or not) of Fowey Hospital which was the subject of a presentation by the relevant NHS Health Trust on 7 December.

I was present at this meeting and read about various innovations which render a resource like Fowey Hospital redundant – or so those responsible would have us believe. A system of first responders was among the innovations listed.

Hopefully, by the time you read this, your Parish Council will have a new Clerk about to take up position. Our current Clerk, Gillian Thompson, gave notice back in November and her final meeting will be in February.

As Chair for the last two years or so, I have had many dealings with Gillian and have realised how important it is to have a competent Clerk who is able to get on with different personalities. Gillian has been a pleasure to work with and I hope she can now forget about emails on her day off and late Planning Applications and enjoy her retirement.

PA24/09272, 1 Moss Terrace East Street
Polruan – single storey extension to the front
elevation of the dwelling to accommodate
larger living space to ground floor,
replacement of existing balcony. Members
made no objection.

PA24/09117, 11 Meadow Close Polruan – renovation of the exterior of the dwelling including new render and cladding, replacement of windows, terrace and raised balustrade, new sedum roof, air source heat pump and solar panels. Members made no objection.

*PA24/09677, Ring A Bell Lanteglos* – conversion and extension of existing traditional stone barns to a singe dwelling

with associated parking without compliance with Condition 2 in respect of decision PA18/09637 dated 14.01.2019. Members made no objection.

PA24/098299, 9 Ocean View Polruan – nonmaterial amendment in relation to decision notice PA21/07433 dated 15 November 2021 to replace part high level render and glazing with zinc cladding. Members felt the use of zinc as a roofing material was a contentious element of the original planning application PA21/07433 but at the time members agreed that as the proposed dwelling was not on main village street view it was on the margin of being out of character with the surrounding area and did not object. As the building of this property has progressed it is clear it is over sized for the plot and the large gable end fascias of zinc already have an industrial and dominating effect. Adding further zinc to the elevations will make the building look like

an industrial unit or supermarket and will appear over dominant and out of character with the surrounding area. Members feel that there is design creep going on as part of this application which is in danger of obfuscating the planning process. Members objected.

# **Summary of draft Minutes**

### **Meeting 19 November**

Attendance by 8 Councillors. Chairman — Cllr P Seaman, Vice-Chairman — Cllr D Heard, Clerk — Mrs R Warren.

PCSO Cocks' emailed report had been circulated to Councillors. There had been two crimes reported in the Parish in October.

Matters arising were considered, including Planning Enforcement report EN23/00589 which had resulted in an Enforcement Notice. An appeal had been lodged. In the Parish works had been completed at the sharp bend on the lane to Stonerush Lakes; the landowner's consent was to be requested for work to improve the access to the Community Garden; the defibrillator box at the Millennium Building had been re-painted by a Parishioner; a new paper towel dispenser had been fitted in the Public Toilet; road closure information for work on the Looe landslip had been promulgated by Cllr Gundry; members of the community had tended to the overgrown Cornish hedge by the church; the Chairman confirmed that he had replaced the rotten board above the Public Toilet door. He will obtain quotes for replacement windows.

Correspondence was then dealt with, after which the Chairman reported to the meeting following his attendance at Cornwall Council (CC) Budget Update Briefing on 7 November. An increase in Council Tax of 5% has been approved.

The Clerk confirmed that she had circulated the slide pack from the CC planning training event she had attended on 7 November. The Clerk and Chairman had attended separate training events presented by the Central Digital and Data Office regarding a possible change of domain name to gov.uk. The Clerk was tasked with signing up to a helper event and report further.

The meeting went on to consider, amongst other things: Telecommunications Resilience Planning and a request from another Parish Council in Cornwall for assistance in lobbying CC regarding housing allocation policies – Councillors declined. Reports on Parish Assets, Lanreath Village Hall, the Community Area Partnership (SECCAP), and Climate Change were considered.



A draft Budget for 2025/26 had been circulated for consideration by Councillors, and after discussion, was approved. The Clerk was tasked with submitting the Precept request.

There was a brief discussion regarding a Parish Problem and with all agenda items having been considered, the meeting closed.

# **Extraordinary Meeting 10 December**

Attendance by 8 Councillors, and one Parishioner. Chairman — Cllr P Seaman, Vice-Chairman – Cllr D Heard, Clerk – Mrs R Warren.

The Meeting considered Cornwall Council's proposed implementation of 20mph speed limits in Lanreath and other parishes on which consultation closes on 20 December. After discussion, a submission was agreed in terms that it was approved, subject to some alterations to the proposed 20mph and 30mph zones in Lanreath Village.


The meeting then considered the Government consultation closing on 19 December regarding remote meetings and proxy voting. The Meeting agreed that the Clerk should submit comments supporting the ability to hold remote meetings but indicating concern about possible predetermination if proxy voting is permitted.

All agenda items having been considered, the meeting closed.

At the end of the year, our Supervisory Officer (SO) carried out a Review of the number of call outs the Team here in Polruan have been involved in and made a comparison to previous years.

Year 2024 call outs — 31

Year 2023 call outs — 27

Year 2022 call outs — 10

Year 2021 call outs — 24

Year 2020 call outs — 22

The Team's busiest month in 2024 was July and then surprisingly January and equally surprisingly, October. 2024 was the busiest year on record and the SO thanked the Team for their hard work and commitment. He continued by saying that after reading the post incident reports and with commendations from the rest of the Area Management Team (AMT) and a good reputation locally, it is clear that the Team continue to be an important, valued and positive force within Polruan and the wider community. Well done.

In November we welcomed our latest recruit to the Team, Robin Smith from Penpol. Over a number of weekends Robin completed the necessary qualifications, including rope rescue and water rescue at awareness level, plus search, first aid and much more. It wasn't long before he was tasked to his first shout with another more experienced CRO taking him under his wing. The Team were tasked to assist Looe Fire Brigade with the extraction of a person from an upstairs flat in Looe. Welcome to the team Robin.

The Team enjoyed their now regular Christmas social in December, this time held at the Jubilee Inn, Pelynt, where they were served up some excellent food, played some silly games and had a chance to socialise with the Team and their partners — a great evening.

### From the Station Record

10 November 1608: Report of a person on rock, east of Vevery. The Team soon became aware it was simply a fisherman who made his own way to the footpath but thanked the first informant as its better to be safe than sorry.



26 November 0921: Report of person on foreshore in local area. No further details available.

31 December 1035: Tasked to assist Looe Fire Brigade and Southwest Ambulance Service (SWAS) to extract a person in difficulties from an upstairs flat in Looe.

# **RNLI Lifeboats**

As I write this report, there are flurries of snow outside the window. We've got off lightly so far this winter compared with those further north, but the cold fronts have reminded most of us, who don't earn our living from the sea, of the wisdom of staying off the water. The upside of this, the reduced activity by sailors, rowers, paddle-boarders, swimmers, and so on, was that the last two months of 2024 passed without anyone in distress calling for help from the volunteers of the Fowey Lifeboat Station.

Time then, to view the year as a whole. In 2024, Fowey lifeboats launched 43 times, aiding 32 people. In addition, a total of 99 exercises were carried out afloat, to ensure preparedness for when the worst happens. National statistics are not yet available, as it naturally takes some time to collate the figures from the 238 lifeboat stations and more than 240 beach units around our coasts. On average, over 200 lives are saved annually, while a further 10,000 are aided, having been at risk of death or injury if not assisted.

Since the RNLI was founded 200 years ago, over 146,000 lives have been saved. This has been achieved entirely without Government funding and depends on voluntary donations and legacies. All the personnel in the Fowey Station, as elsewhere, work on a voluntary basis to maintain the round-the-clock service.

Our congratulations are due to Fowey Lifeboat Operations Manager, Chris Ogg, who has been awarded an RNLI 'Excellence in Volunteering Award' by the Council of the RNLI. The award was presented to Chris 'in recognition of his exemplary commitment to the RNLI through his role as Lifeboat

Operations Manager at Fowey Lifeboat Station'. The award certificate states:

"Chris' outstanding leadership, dedication and experience has been pivotal in both supporting the crew and maintaining a functioning lifeboat station during a difficult period. Chris has continuously displayed the RNLI values of being trustworthy, courageous, selfless and dependable. His contribution has helped the RNLI to save lives at sea."

Chris, who has been volunteering as the Lifeboat Operations Manager and Launch Authority for the past eight and a half years said:

"I am honoured to have received the award from the RNLI. We have a great team of volunteers here at Fowey lifeboat station, with a core of 32 crew, supported by dozens of people fundraising, running the shop and lifeboat tours, PR, launch authorities and support staff. Everyone gives up their time for free and it is a pleasure to work with and manage such a dedicated team of people, so that we can provide a 24/7 lifesaving service to our local community."

The RNLI is the charity that saves lives at sea.

# **Boatyard and Ferry News**

As we settle into the New Year it's a great opportunity to reflect on 2024.

The Boatyard has seen quite a few changes over the year; the hoist has been upgraded and now has the facility to take 260 tonnes, the slipway winch has been updated and can now haul 400 tonnes and our main shed has had a new roof which enables us to work on four vessels under cover at any one time.

During the year we had the pleasure of working alongside many familiar and new customers from the fishing fleets based throughout Cornwall, Devon and further afield. This work generally consists of annual maintenance or a more in-depth refit to upgrade and repair various aspects of the vessel. We also had a visit from the Cornwall Inshore Fisheries vessel 'St Piran', it was a great working alongside the crew during their general maintenance visit.

As part of Fowey Lifeboats' 200-year celebration, we were proud to not only sponsor the main event but also provide the pontoon for the fabulous firework display. Well done to all the lifeboat crew for keeping our coastline safe.

2024 was also an exciting year on the Ferries; Emily Nash became our first female Ferry Master. In May, both Emily and Jack Page achieved their MCA Boat Masters Licence, enabling them to drive our car ferries and the larger passenger ferries. In September, Tom Bawden joined us as our first apprentice on the ferries; working alongside SeaRegs training in Plymouth, he will undertake a variety of maritime courses whilst building his practical skills on the ferries.

During the summer we sponsored Polruan Academy, providing transport to enable pupils to attend a series of water sports sessions in Fowey. It was great to see them enjoying riverbased activities.

In 2023 Bodinnick Ferry supported Kate Jones with her 'March for Bomber'. She set up a fundraising group to raise money for Cornwall Hospice Care, following her husbands battle with cancer. In 2024 she organised another 'March for Bomber', this time using the Polruan Ferry; in total, £25,000 has been raised for the hospice, well done Kate and the team.

Amongst other fund raising events supported by the ferries, were Anthony and Sally who raised £17,000 for the RNLI and Cornwall Air Ambulance on an epic 6,000 mile walk around the British Coastline; and also the Cornwall Section Vintage Motorcycle Club who were raising money for the Cornwall Air Ambulance; it was a fantastic sight to have the 50 strong group on board the ferry. Well done to all involved.

December saw the Annual Carol Service on the Bodinnick Ferry, hosted by the Rev'd Richard Allen. A joyous event enjoyed by all who participated, including the Ferry Crew!

Looking forward to this year, as part of the Fowey Food Week which runs from the 15 to 22 March, Polruan Ferry will be offering a delivery service throughout the week to get takeaway orders from local businesses to and from one side of the river to the other.
