Generosity

Mother Teresa once gave an interview to Hello! Magazine. She was asked the question. "Is it only the affluent who give"? She replied "No, even the poorest of the poor give". The other day, a very poor beggar came up to me and said, "Everyone gives to you and I also want to give 20 paisa" (which is about 2p). I thought to myself "what should I do? If I take it he won't have anything to eat, but if I don't take it, it would hurt him so much. So I took it and he was so happy because he had given to Mother Teresa of Calcutta to help the poor . . . Giving cleans the heart and helps you get closer to God. But you also get so much back in return."

Generosity is not just a nice character trait that people have. It is right at the heart of what our faith is about. C S Lewis defined Christianity as 'a kind of giving.' God has poured out his generosity to you in Jesus (John3 v16 God so loved the world that He gave his only son that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but shall have eternal life). You are called to respond in faith and generosity to others. The key to the fullness of the blessing is generosity 'the righteous give generously' Psalm 37 v21

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Church Diary in the Benefice of Trelawny

St. Wyllow Lanteglos; St. Saviour Polruan; St. Ildierna Lansallos; St. Tallanus Talland; St. John Bodinnick; St. Marnarch Lanreath; St. Nun Pelynt

What different styles of service will you find in the seven churches of Trelawny Benefice?

Everyone is welcome, and all our services and teaching are based on the Bible. There's usually tea, coffee and biscuits afterwards, with time to chat.

Please come along and discover what kind of service you like best.

Lansallos (St Ildierna): all services follow the ancient and beautiful words of the 1662 Book of Common Prayer, apart from a monthly contemporary service.

Lanreath (St Marnarch): evangelical services, with some led by the Lanreath Music Group (musical instruments and choir).

Pelunt (St Nun): traditional village church Holy Communion or Service of the Word, in contemporary language, together with a monthly contemporary service, sometimes

Talland (St Tallanus): traditional village church Holy Communion or Holy Communion-by-extension services, in contemporary language.

Lanteglos-by-Fowey parish: has three churches:

Parish Church of St Wyllow: traditional services with organist and Lanteglos Choir. Holy Communion in contemporary language, and occasional Evensong with the 1662 Book of Common Prayer.

Polruan (St Saviour): friendly Café Church once a month, with round tables, prayers, singing, Bible readings and a chance to talk.

Bodinnick (St John): community services every other month, based around major Christian festivals and usually with wine and

Outdoor services: held in the open air on village greens, farms and quaysides — they are family friendly and great fun. 'Church on the Quay' in Polruan runs on six weekends in late July and August. Other services dotted around the Benefice include Plough Sunday, Rogation, Harvest, Tractors, Pets, Equestrian and Lambing.




Our Rector is Staying!

There has been much relief and joy amongst the congregation at Lansallos, and in the Benefice, since hearing the news that the Reverend Richard and Harriet will not after all be leaving us at Easter but plan to remain with Trelawny for another year. Our prayers have been answered!

Funding Our Grade One Listed Churches

We're fortunate in Trelawny Benefice that all our beautiful, Grade I listed parish churches, including St Ildierna, are in a relatively reasonable state of repair. In fact half of all Grade I listed buildings in the country are Anglican places of worship with their wonderful craftsmanship, sculptures and artefacts. This privilege comes at a price though: many of them have a backlog of essential repairs, the cost of which has doubled in the last decade, and which amounts to £1billion in total. With congregations getting older and smaller in number raising this money becomes increasingly difficult. It's for this reason that church treasurers like me dread hearing the result of every quinquennial inspection!

The good news is that the Listed Places of Worship (LPW) grant scheme, which allows VAT to be reclaimed on certain eligible repairs to historic churches, has been extended by parliament. The bad news is that it's for only one year and there's been a 21% reduction in the total amount of money available for VAT relief - and once it's gone, it's gone. So what can be done to prevent more of our fabulous heritage crumbling into disrepair in the future (already there are almost 1,000 churches on Historic England's at risk register)? We have a chilling example of what can happen in the worst case in St Pinnock in our own Deanery, the church having been closed some years ago and converted into a domestic dwelling.



One answer could be for the Church of England to dip into its investment funds, worth a reputed £8.7 billion, and which might be a better use than the plan to put £100 million into reparations for its alleged involvement in the slave trade but which the church was actually instrumental in helping to abolish in British territories as long ago as 1833 – nearly 200 years ago! Another would be to follow the German, French or Italian models where the state either owns and maintains churches or funds their upkeep through taxes. Neither of these ideas seem likely to be adopted any time soon and, unfortunately, at the moment of writing we have a vacuum at the head of our church where the leadership should be. As the ecclesiastical joke goes "would the last archbishop to leave please blow the candles out?"

Church Pathways

The pathway from the gate to the church hall, via the entrance porch, has now had asphalt laid by contractor J T Pearce at a cost of £7,080. It is hoped that some or all of the VAT paid can be reclaimed through the LPW Scheme. No more muddy shoes or paddling through puddles!


Art Trail and Secret Gardens Dates for your diary!

World Day of Prayer

World Day of Prayer (formerly Woman's World Day of Prayer) is a woman-led worldwide prayer initiative traditionally held on the first Friday of March. It was originally for women only, but for some years men have also been invited, hence the change of name. Services are held all round the world and at different times of day and it has been estimated that from the beginning of the earliest service in the countries who first wake up to the first Friday in March to the end of the last service in the counties where it dawns last, there is a wave of prayer around the world lasting about 36 hours! We may have been a small group of 17 in Lanteglos Parish, but we were part of an amazing world-wide wave of prayer which always thrills me.

Each year a group of Christian women from as many denominations as possible in the chosen country write the service. This year it came from the Cook Islands (which most of us had not heard of!) and I am delighted to learn that next year it will come from Nigeria!

Unfortunately I had a senior moment and forgot to announce this in the last edition of the Parish News but by dint of posters, social media, notices in church and word of mouth, and despite several folk who usually attend being away or having appointments, 17 of us gathered in St Saviour on the afternoon of 7 March for the prayer service, after which we enjoyed some delicious refreshments, mainly involving banana and / or coconut which are two of the important crops of the Cook Islands.

I am grateful to the ladies, and the one brave gentleman, who did the various readings;

to Woman's Hour members who helped organise the service; to Chris who served the refreshments, provided some of the items to decorate the table and made us bookmarks to act as a memento; to Phyllis who brought a lovely basket of camellias and heather, enough for us all to take a posy home; and to all who attended and took part.

Elsewhere in the Benefice Sheila Morrell Davies reported that:

"Ladies from the churches in Pelynt, Lanreath and the Methodist ioined our friends from Sclerder Abbey, who organised this year's event, for the World Day of Prayer. We were met at the door with a large display of flowers that helped to set the scene as we followed the service



composed by ladies from the Cook Islands. A packed church joined in enthusiastically with the singing and listened intently to the stories of ladies from the islands. Following the service we were treated to delightful refreshments that were enjoyed by everyone."



Open the Book





John, Trish and I went to Liz and Kim's for Christmas, it was really good and we had a lovely hot lunch. Plum went to his daughter's home in Waggo with Michael. We saw the grankids over Christmas and they are all growing up lovely – they all call me old gat – I don't mind. We had hot cross buns on display in Woolworths on Boxing Day if you can believe it! It always happens every year.

Liz ad Kim have moved back in here as the place they did up for a farmer has rented out now; that's the second time that's happened to them, and it's a shame as Liz had a nice veg garden going. Now this place is full to the rafters and I think we're going to have to have a sale to get rid of some of these things. My golly things pile up don't they – what with this and that and with what the kids give you, momentos and the like, silly to keep it all in a way but difficult to part with. [By Ed. two letters; written January and March] How time has flown since Christmas and as always we were very busy during the festive period having lunch altogether in Church and then returning home when between 30 to 40 children came for their little bags of biscuits and sweets and also a little tract about the meaning of Christmas. The older ones came as well and had a soft drink and biscuits. It's now time to take down the Christmas decorations and cards and get back into normal routine if possible. Thank you so much for your cards and gifts and for your emails and newsletters which we enjoyed reading.

Since then we seem to have had visitors non stop and it's been good to see some folks that we haven't seen for many months.

Our big news is that Manasa has been transferred from RCC Gwoza to a place very near Vom and he is going to live at Vom. The children will be going to schools nearby. He will be a great help to me as he will look after the school fees of the 20 students in higher education, and I will look after the Primary and Secondary School pupils. He will carry on as the Accountant in the new area. At the moment Manasa is taking my Bible Class to help the students learn the laptop as they need to use this for their final exams. Some take the exams in a few weeks time and others next year. It's wonderful that we have Manasa as I couldn't teach them! The Lord knew the need and brought Manasa to us.

Grace and family are constantly busy. Grace had a bad bout of the flu, but seems to be a lot better now

Mark and family returned from the UK and had enjoyed their time with Kumi and Bethany.

Ella is back in Hillcrest but we hope she will be able to come to us for a few days during the half term break.

We had our first rain last week so it will soon be time for planting. Pray for good rain and a good harvest.

Last Saturday over 40 former Nigerian Missionaries met in our house to remember David Carling. It was obviously a sad occasion and yet we rejoiced that he had helped so many people. The testimonies were touching. Rev'd John Audu, the General Secretary of COCIN at the time the Carlings were in Nigeria, spoke and so did Rev'd Daniel Bitrus, another former Secretary.

Sadly, we buried one of Daniel's close relatives recently — he had been involved in an accident in Maiduguri, killing six people. He leaves behind three sons. Pray he will be able to continue to find his fees.

There are still many attacks in Borno State and other areas in the North West. At the moment, however, the Plateau seems to be fairly calm but we need to pray that after Ramadan (Moslem fasting) things will not change. Thank you for your prayers and concern.

The children and teenagers say thank you for sponsoring them at school. They are doing well.

Most of all we thank you for praying for us and our extended family.

Horse Racing for Polruan Regatta - 1926!

In the course of some research, the following newspaper article was discovered in The Guardian (the name of the Cornish Guardian at that time) dated Friday, 25 June 1926

"Polruan Regatta Arrangements

A committee meeting was held on Friday evening last in the Constitutional Club*, to consider the arrangements for the forthcoming Regatta.

It was found impossible to have the usual horse racing due to lack of funds. Having been decided at a public meeting that the races should be held, it was found necessary to call a public meeting in order to rescind that decision.

The public meeting was called for Saturday evening and the sparse attendance of the public testified to their indifference. The committee was keenly disappointed. However, the committee's decision not to hold the horse races was upheld and those present proceeded to formulate a programme for athletic sports as well as varied events.

Particulars will be advertised at the earliest possible moment. The programme of sailing and boat races will be carried out as usual."

There won't be horse racing in 2025 but ninety-nine years on we have a committee and as usual there will be sports, other events and sailing.

News from Polruan Academy

from Jane Wills, Head of School

With warmer days and lighter mornings, energy levels are rising, and the quiet determination of the winter months is replaced with enthusiasm and zest. The daffodils in our flower troughs are blooming and the buds on the apple trees are showing; Spring is here at last.

Our youngest children have been studying which animals are born in spring to learn about the lives of our wild and domestic farm animals. They will celebrate 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar Day' by dressing up and joining in with lots of exciting activities based on the well-loved book by Eric Carle. They will visit Nancarrow Farm to meet the spring-born animals and find out more about which crops are grown to feed both animals and people.

Tregeagle are investigating what it is like to live in the desert. Finding out about the biome weather and climate and what it takes to survive in this inhospitable environment with temperatures ranging from the high 40s to below zero in hot deserts. We are going to focus specifically on the Mojave Desert and investigate land use, human settlements and the generation of renewable energy. As there are no deserts nearby for a field trip, we are adopting an alternative solution by visiting the North coast sand dunes to study the characteristics of sand, vegetation and land

We had a visit from Ofsted in January and we are pleased to share that our school is rated GOOD. It's not just our values of excellence, inclusion, respect and resilience that make Polruan a special place to work and learn. Polruan Primary is a family. Our dedicated and highly skilled staff work tirelessly to provide the children with the best possible start to their lifelong learning journey and it is well deserved to finally have the recognition of this. We are particularly pleased with the section in the report reserved for parental

voice, which showed these as overwhelmingly positive and supportive of the school. We know how important it is to work together to bring about change and ensure sustainability and without our supportive parent base, this would be significantly harder to achieve – THANK YOU!

The school continues to benefit from interactions and activities with the wider community. This past term, we had a lovely St Piran's Day service at St Saviour's with Reverend Richard telling the story of St Piran, the children singing Cornish inspired songs (and Mamma Mia!) and playing ukulele. We finished off with Cornish saffron buns provided by Richard - yum! In addition, we will have a Mother's Day service in St Saviour's at the end of March where our lovely Open the Book Team come in to school prior to the service to support the children making floral posies which are then presented to their Mother at the service. We finish Spring term with an Easter service at St Saviour's, again supported by the Open the Book team holding an Easter craft session after the service.

We have entered the Fowey Festival competition as usual, this year producing poetry and pieces of art to celebrate the theme 'Making Waves'. The children thoroughly enjoy the opportunity to immerse themselves in creative pursuits and generally produce some interesting and entertaining pieces.

Our School Council, which consists of children from across the school, has been busy fulfilling the requests from the children for new and different play equipment for playtimes. As a result, we now have stables full of hobby horses. The children made these personalised hobby horse/creatures using resources provided by parents/carers. There are some spectacular species, and these are certain to bring a fun element to break-times.

News from Nigeria from Kathryn Hill

At the March Former Missionaries Fellowship Zoom meeting, Kefas told us that the exchange rate which was 2,500Naira to the £1 had improved and was now at N1,900 to the £1 plus the price of petrol had gone down with a resultant improvement in the economy. He also said that although there are still problems, things are somewhat more peaceful.


As you know I have been making and selling marmalade to help support two blind students, Nenchin and Saminu, at Gindiri Boys Secondary School (BSS) where I used to teach. Nenchin will be sitting his Senior Secondary Certificate of Education (the equivalent of AS Level and Bachelor Degree courses in Nigeria are 4 years, although some subjects, including Law, are longer).

Nenchin would like to go to the University of Jos to study Law. Kathleen writes that he is bright and expected to get good results in both his SSCE and JAMB (Joint Admissions Matriculation Board) which is needed to access any university course in Nigeria. Nenchin, who was born blind, is an orphan. He has a brother who partially supports him and will continue to do so but he can't manage fees and living expenses and equipment. Kathleen says that about £300 should cover his fees although this will vary with the exchange rate. At School he has the use of a Perkins brailler plus braille paper, a tape recorder and tapes, and so on,

but he will need his own to go to University. The machines are available in Nigeria and Kathleen says a new brailler costs about £700 but that second hand ones are available for about £300, while tape recorders are readily available and would cost about £28 – all prices vary with the exchange rate of course!

In her original email about Nenchin finishing school at the end of next term she asked about the possibility of getting more funding both for the equipment and for the tuition fees as, if there is any chance of going to university, he needs to apply in April. I said to let him apply and I would try to get more funding although I could make no promises. Some of my 'marmalade money' can be used but there is still Saminu to support at BSS plus there are the extra expenses. It is unlikely that the text books he needs will be available in braille so he may need to pay the Gindiri Material Centre for the Handicapped (GMCH, where I also used to work) to braille them for him or get someone to read them onto tape. I have also had an email from a GMCH Coordinator saying that they are in problems both with finance and supplies as the Christoffe Blinden Mission who used to help with both money and supplies, is no longer helping them, so I don't know how much help they will be able to give Nenchin. However, a BSS Resource Teacher and GMCH Coordinator are willing to help with the practicalities of equipment and so on if the funding is available.

I'm hoping to find some folk who are willing to donate regularly and/or give a one-off donation for equipment to enable this talented



youngster to realise his dream of becoming a lawyer. I also plan a fund raiser, but that will probably be in June as there is a lot happening in April and May! If you want to know more feel free to contact me (39 Fore Street, 01726 870953, kathrynehill39@gmail.com)





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Higher Windmill Allotments

The last of the old season's produce has been harvested . . . parsnips, sprouts and purple sprouting broccoli, so we are all looking forward to the new year. Recent temperatures have been low, particularly at night. This encourages us to defer most seed sowing on our plots to allow soil temperatures to rise. The more adventurous among us have planted the first potatoes, others are sowing some of their vegetable and flower seeds in trays at home in the expectation that this will allow them to give the plants an early start when they are planted out.

During the Spring the plots have been prepared for the new season. While some allotment holders are digging over their plots and incorporating manure and compost from their bins, others are trialing a 'no dig' system using bought in green compost. Fruit bushes have also been pruned to maximise the harvest.

We recently had a routine periodic Members' meeting to review the Society's progress, agree grass cutting rotas, set this year's vegetable growing competitions and prepare for the site maintenance working party that will have been held by the time these words are published.

There is nothing that beats the satisfaction of growing your own flowers, fruit and vegetables, so why not join us? A small number of vacant part plots are available. If you are interested in getting started, don't hesitate to contact our Chairman Graham Palmer or Secretary Lis Taylor or perhaps visit the site during our open day which will be advertised in the summer.

Bella and I recently attended the annual Cornwall Children's Hospice South-West conference. Always an informative day with input from the Director of Fundraising, Head of Fundraising, Head of Care and a Mum who has experienced the care at Little Harbour.

Eddie Farwell, who with his late wife Jill, founded CHSW in the 1990's, had previously announced his retirement as CEO, a remarkable man of vision who has ensured that no child with a life limiting condition should have to travel more than 90 minutes to get the special care a children's hospice gives. Taking over the position as CEO as of 17 March, is Phil Morris, who brings with him a wealth of charity leadership experience.

You may have read in the press that the government have promised £100m support funding for hospices. Of the first £25m released, Children's Hospice South-West received £275,000. A welcome amount, however, with the rise in living wage, increased employers share of NI and the lowering of the threshold, the extra costs for this year will be £600,000. That said CHSW maintain a strong financial reserve.

News from Frogmore Farm

Well March came in like a lamb, when you get your Parish News we will know if it went out like a lion — that was the old saying.



Most of our Spring babies have now been born. The ewes lambed in February except one old lady who was expecting a single and kept us waiting until 7 March. We found her sitting proudly in the field with a beautiful baby alongside her. The fields are now full of naughty lambs, racing and leaping around having great fun. The weather has been ideal for them so far. Frosty mornings and cold days don't worry them at all. It's the gales and rain they hate. The Suffolk ewes (with the black faces) gave birth to the cutest little black lambs. Their body wool will get lighter as they get older, but their faces will stay black

As I write this there are eighteen cows left to calve. Some are first time mums so may keep us waiting for another month or so. The cattle are still in the sheds at the moment. The calves wait for their mothers to line up to eat before they begin to race around madly, their tails curled in the air. It's such a time waster watching them every day.

Ben looks on the yard cameras every night to check the animals, he had a lovely surprise one night to see a tawny owl sitting on a beam watching for a mouse. It makes us wonder what else comes through the yards at night!



Simon, Matthew and Ben have been helping Southern Buildings to build a new shed for the bull beef. Rearing bull beef animals is a new venture for Frogmore. Twenty five bull calves were chosen from last years' babies, they were not castrated. A special diet was recommended for them. They have access to feed twenty four hours a day. To be sure the diet is correct for them they are weighed every couple of weeks. On average they gain approximately 1.6 kilos a day. They are looking really well. Being bulls they can get a bit awkward at times so hence the new cattle shed. The bulls can be shut in the



bedded area while the feed passage can be cleaned. Two ponds have been dug to collect the rainwater from the roof. When the water filters from one pond to the other it's cleaned



before it joins a small stream. The bulls must be sold before they mature at sixteen months old to get the best price for them.

The fields are full of mole hills at the moment. I'm going to collect some piles of soil from these for my flowerpots. It's ideal as it's so fine because the moles drag it up from deep underground and it has lots of goodness in it. Springtime is tilling time. The oats are drilled and rolled in and hopefully in the next week or so the ploughing can be finished and the barley planted, then we have the long wait for the harvest.

For the first time since we have been at Carne a nuthatch has been coming to the bird feeder. It is quite greedy, visiting every few minutes and taking a peanut away. It always hangs upside down as it helps itself to a nut. I have been reading about them and it seems that they hide food under the bark of a tree. We have also seen a newly fledged robin. It still had its fluffy baby feathers. We only saw one and hope it has survived the gales and rain.

Ben tagged and registered the birth of nine calves this morning. This brings the cattle total on Frogmore to two hundred and one. The first time we have passed two hundred. We don't feel guilty about global warming however. After looking at a live aeroplane App of Heathrow airport at 7.10pm to see how many planes were in the sky at that moment, we were amazed. We did more research and found that 1,300 take off or land each day at Heathrow. In 2024 eighty three point nine million passengers passed through the airport. Two hundred thousand vehicles use the M25 each day. Then consider how many trains travel into London each day. On average one million, one hundred and thirty seven thousand, eight hundred passengers arrive into the city each day by rail. Bearing in mind these figures are for one city only think of the whole country. I don't think our cows have anything to worry about.

At the station AGM on 28 February Ray Rigg stood down as Station Manager and passed the baton to his successor Grant Sharpe, a retired Lieutenant Commander RN who lives in Polperro. Ray will continue to be a member and keep watches, he will also be the Deputy Station Manager and Technical Officer in the short term, supporting Grant in his transition into his new role.

Ray has been a member since 2001 and has been the Station Manager for a total of nine years. Grant joined the NCI in 2019 and has been one of the station training team and the Deputy Station Manager.

The station is eagerly awaiting the commencement of the sailing season and a substantial increase in activity; the winter months have been very quiet and the team have used the time for maintenance and improving their skills. The team is still quite small, 32 people, so watches will continue to be 0900-1300 and 1300-1700. We do have a few trainees but are always keen to hear from people who would be interested in joining the team, no previous marine experience is required. Do feel free to pop into the station and chat to the duty watch-keeper.

Some of you may have noticed that our windsock got shredded during the winter gales; we do have a new one in the cupboard and it should be fitted by time that you are reading the magazine. We also have been donated some white paint, so the station should be gleaming white before too long.



The station is as ever short of funds and so we will be holding a number of fundraising activities throughout the year. Our next event is a coffee morning at the RFYC, on Saturday, 19 April, please do come along if you can, it's a very nice venue and the cakes are brilliant. Later in the year, we hope to hold a quiz night and an event on the quay.

We look forward to seeing everyone out on the water in 2025, do have a great time and be assured that we will be looking out for you. You can see the current weather conditions on our website, www.nci.org.uk/station/polruan or by using the Davis Weather App on your phone. Most NCI stations have a Davis weather station and the information is uploaded to the website and the Davis Cloud in real time, thus giving good coverage along the coast.

You can also call us on Channel 65 VHF for current weather conditions or a radio check.



'Be Prepared' for the boating season

Follow these tips to help keep you safe on the water:

- Check the weather forecast before embarking on any sea related activities
- Check the tide-times of high and low water
- Plan your activity and keep within your ability and experience
- Ensure you have suitable safety equipment and / or personal protective equipment for your chosen activity (life jackets, flares, life-raft, wetsuit, sunglasses, first aid kit, VHF radio, navigational aids)
- Wear suitable clothing (have warm clothing and waterproofs to hand, the weather at sea can change quickly)
- Tell someone your destination (advise family or friends of what you plan to do, where you are departing from, travelling to, number of persons and expected time of arrival)
- Log a traffic report via RYA SafeTrx
- Check your equipment to ensure it is in good working order (service the engine, check the expiry date of your flares)
- Ensure all crew members and / or people in the group are aware of safety procedures and know what to do in an emergency


All of which is a roundabout way of saying we have a vacancy and if you put your name

OBJECTION: The proposed development contravenes NDP Policy 1 Design and Character (specifically Policy 1.1.1.2,1.3) Policy 3 Important and special views in Bodinnick and from river Fowey; Policy (detriment of amenity of neighbouring properties) Contravenes CLP Policy 12 and 27. The addition of an extra storey on the newer part of an already extended building will not enhance the surrounding area and will be out of character in terms of mass and bulk and design; the modern extension will be clearly visible compared to the older adjoining cottage and surrounding properties and from the road and the river view. The garden of property behind Pink Cottage will lose amenity due to the additional height. The PC also is concerned that access to the property to enable building work will cause significant

issues blocking the road and block access for neighbours; and it is unclear where building materials could be stored.



Summary of draft Minutes

Meeting 21 January

Attendance by 7 Councillors. Chairman - Cllr P Seaman, Vice-Chairman -Cllr D Heard, Clerk Mrs R Warren.

Two Parishioners raised concerns about what had been perceived as a Parish Council plan to impose parking restrictions in Lanreath. The Chairman confirmed that there was no plan; Councillors had been considering parking after a complaint about restricted access, and there could be no double yellow lines without full engagement and consultation with the Community, a source of funding identified, and the matter being debated in a full Parish Council meeting – which members of the public could attend.

PCSO Cocks and his colleague Tri-Services Safety Officer Kate Bourn attended in person. PCSO Cocks reported that there had been one criminal damage in December, and in January a theft of sheep. Officer Bourn explained her role working as Fire, Police, and Ambulance contact. Non-emergency reports can be made via telephone on 101, or online: www.safelincs.co.uk/hfsc/

Cty Cllr Colin Martin attended and gave a full report of his recent activities, and confirmed that he would be moving out of the County and thus not standing for re-election in May.

Matters arising were considered, including EN23/00589 where a decision on the appeal validity was still awaited. A decision was yet to be made regarding the application for outline planning on the football pitch field in Lanreath. Councillors discussed parking restrictions in the village and decided that the matter would not be pursued further, but that the Clerk should keep a record of complaints regarding access problems for future consideration.

Correspondence was dealt with, whereafter Councillors considered a request from the Community Garden owner for assistance in a matter unrelated to permission for access improvement. A response was agreed. The meeting then considered, amongst other things: flooding on the B3359, Cornwall Scrapstore, Cybercrime awareness talks, Telecommunications Resilience Planning, and a request from another Parish Council for



agreement with their motion of no confidence in Cornwall Council Planning Department. The May elections were considered, and transition to a new Chairman thereafter. Reports on Bank provider, Parish Assets, Village Hall, the Community Area Partnership (SECCAP), Climate Change, and finances were considered.

There was a brief discussion regarding a Parish problem, and with all agenda items having been considered the meeting closed.

Meeting 18 February

Attendance by 8 Councillors, and one Parishioner. Chairman – Cllr P Seaman, Vice-Chairman – Cllr D Heard, Clerk – Mrs R Warren.

After consideration of matters arising and correspondence, the meeting dealt with the appeal against enforcement notice on EN23/00589. A full response was agreed after the Chairman had taken the meeting through the relevant aspects of planning regulations. Thereafter the meeting went through reports regarding Cornwall Council Planning Training Event, Councillor and Clerk training, Assets, SECCAP, the Village Hall, Climate Change, and finances. A change of energy supplier was agreed.

After consideration of one Parish problem the meeting closed.

Lanreath Parish Council meetings take place on the 3rd Tuesday of the month (except in August and December) at Lanreath Village Hall starting 7.30pm (except in November through to March when meetings start at 6.30pm).

We all hoped for nice weather over the Easter. It was usually when the men began their gardening in earnest and lots of local customs were observed. Good



I think he used to pay 3d for each dozen or so ordered and delivered early Good Friday morning while still hot and I can remember doing this and we got to know where windows or doors would be left open plus of course the money for the buns. Mr Parsons would give us a nice hot X bun for ourselves when we finished the deliveries and that bun tasted like Nectar.

Easter Sunday was for Church and Chapel and all three services were well attended. Almost all local people – we saw very few visitors at that time, but as always the singing was beautiful.

I can't remember having much in the way of bought Easter eggs but we did have faces drawn on our Easter Sunday boiled eggs and the shells dyed in different shades. We didn't buy Easter cards either. In fact, I don't think such cards for just Easter were in the shops at that time. We drew our Easter chicks and bunnies on bits of card and of course we were delighted to pick our first little posies of Spring flowers for our Mums.

Our Easter holiday from school was just the long week-end. That was from the Thursday at closing time till 9 o'clock the Tuesday morning. We felt then that Spring had really come and so Summer was not so very far away.

The yard is preparing Kaley and Lady Di, our two larger ferries, ready for the Maritime and Coastguard Agency (MCA) pass out, they will be back on the river soon, joining the many pleasure boats. The shed roof is now complete, and all four berths are in occupancy.

RNLI Lifeboats 2CO

In the first 'shout' of 2025, Fowey lifeboat volunteers were recovering the D-class lifeboat after their regular Sunday morning training session on 19 January, when a canoeist came alongside under the davit. The paddler requested help for a fellow canoeist who was stuck between the local tug and a tug barge opposite Jetties 5 and 6, west of Penmarlam. With a strong ebb tide running, this was potentially a very dangerous

situation. The lifeboat was immediately relaunched and Falmouth Coastguard notified. The lifeboat crew arrived on scene to find the canoeist had managed to extricate herself from the situation and was safely on a nearby beach. The crew checked that all was well: the canoeist was part of a group from Golant and would be returning there. Safety advice was given.

Three days later, Fowey's lifeboat volunteers were tasked to launch the D-class inflatable lifeboat again after a member of the public reported seeing an apparently unmanned blue inflatable kayak near the cliffs in the

Carlyon Bay area. An extensive shoreline and inshore search was conducted together with St Austell Coastguard, with no sign of the kayak. The incident was considered to be a false alarm with good intent. On return from their second shout of the week, the crew were lucky enough to be accompanied by dolphins.

In the early hours of Sunday, 16 February, Falmouth Coastguard received a Mayday call from a vessel reporting that it was four miles from St Austell and taking on water. The All-weather lifeboat, the Maurice and Joyce Hardy, was launched. Despite communication difficulties with the yacht, the crew ascertained that there was one

person on a 27-foot sailing yacht, about 1.5 miles southwest of Gribbin Head. The crew located the yacht and put two crew in dry suits on board to find there was about a foot of water above the cabin sole. A salvage pump was transferred to the yacht and the crew managed to stabilise the situation. They found that the leak had been caused by the head sail furling line becoming wrapped around the propeller and ripping the hull P-bracket. It was decided that the safest solution was to tow the vessel into Fowey leaving the crew and pump on board. The local Coastguard team met the boat and took the casualty off to get warm and to be checked over. The crew maintained the water level, while the Launch Authority

arranged for the boat to be lifted out by Toms Boatyard. This was a complicated shout, but a great team response from the lifeboat crew, the Coastguard, Toms Boatyard and Fowey Harbour Commissioners [By Ed. more on page 23].

Unfortunately, our publication deadline meant missing the life-jacket clinic scheduled to be held on Saturday, 29 March at the lifeboat station. Should you have missed it, it's not too late to carry out essential safety checks yourself. There are a number of guides on the internet. To show how important this is, at a recent clinic, nearly half the life-jackets

checked required replacement of a critical safety part, meaning that had they been used in an emergency, they may not have worked and could potentially have caused loss of life. No fewer than 11 life-jackets were condemned outright as being unfit for use.

A familiar sight in the harbour will soon be no more. The All-weather Trent-class lifeboat, the Maurice and Joyce Hardy, will be retired: after serving the community of Fowey so well for over 30 years, she has come to the end of her working life. In her place a new Atlantic 85 semi-rigid inflatable will be taken on station.

This will ensure the lifeboat station has the most appropriate vessel for the types of

service it now provides. In particular, much of the former commercial traffic has disappeared, to be replaced by leisure craft, as more and more small motorboats, sailing vessels, anglers, inflatables, kayakers and paddle-boarders take to our local waters.

For example, in the over 500 launches of the Maurice and Joyce Hardy while on station in Fowey, the average distance from station to incident was less than five nautical miles, while 99% were within 20 nautical miles of the station and in conditions suitable for the smaller craft.

Over the years of service by the local station, the type

and capabilities of the craft has advanced significantly, with modern craft equipped with the latest navigational, communications and lifesaving equipment. In contrast, the photo shows the launch of the one of the first lifeboats, the Arthur Hill, at the original Fowey lifeboat station at Polkerris, over 100 years ago. No engine nor navigational equipment is provided and the crew is wearing kapok life-jackets.

After completing our busiest year for some time in 2024, we move into 2025 and as I write this report not a single shout in 2025 so far — perhaps everyone is playing it safe and taking all the right precautions — I'm sure it won't last and the team will be called into action soon!

So in the meantime, on these cold, dark winter evenings our dedicated team continue their training on the second and fourth Thursday of the month, with the CERCC (Coastguard Emergency Response Casualty Care) three yearly team re-qualification taking place in January. The team spent their training nights practising the skills needed to pass the re-qualification, which included some online work and a four-hour practical session with a FTO (full time officer) where various exercises were set up for them to undertake both as a team and individually. I'm glad to report the



team passed with flying colours and are now set to tackle the challenges they may face in the months ahead.

How a simple thing like walking the dog can turn into a frightening experience. I recently witnessed first-hand such a scenario when a family were walking their dog along a local estuary and the dog entered the water chasing a large stick. The dog, being a dog, wouldn't let go of the stick and got dragged further out by the current and it was rescued by the owner who also entered the water.

There are a few learning points here:

- Don't put yourself in danger to rescue a dog from the water or cliff top.
- Keep your dog on a lead especially near cliff edges and fast flowing water
- Call your dog from a place of safety
- Don't encourage your dog into flood water as it may contain contaminants harmful to your dog

In an emergency call 999 and ask for the Coastguard





The Polruan Town Trust seeks your help

from Vicky Halls, on behalf of all the Trustees of the Polruan Town Trust

Polruan is a wonderful village, I think those like me who are lucky enough to live here enjoy a community of kind and generous people. Do you have any time to spare to support the work of the Polruan Town Trust? What the Trust desperately needs is at least one more Trustee and a surge of goodwill from people to offer their voluntary services, for example, painting or minor repairs. Any expertise in building, law, accountancy and business would also be gratefully received. It might be helpful if I told you about the Trust and its role within the community.

It has now been nearly three years since I became a Trustee of the Polruan Town Trust. It has been a period of great challenge, upheaval and change. What my involvement has taught me more than anything is how little I knew about the role of the Trust before I applied to be a Trustee and, also, how this lack of understanding continues to exist throughout the village in general. What does the Trust do? Some think it is a version of the Parish Council, there to support residents. Others believe it is a wealthy and secretive form of exclusive club. It is neither, so in the spirit of complete transparency, here is what we do

The Polruan Town Trust has existed for almost 100 years in its current form, since 1927, for the sole purpose of managing and maintaining



land and property within the 'ancient township of Polruan', applying the net income for the benefit of all the residents. The Trust was registered as a charity in 1964 and gains revenue to fund its work via leasing and renting various assets, and via donations and bequests. The Trust oversees the following properties/land:

- St Saviour's Hill, Car Park and Bound, including the garages, NCI look-out, Hearse House and the playground
- The Block House
- The Old Coal Wharf
- The Quay, including the Winkle Picker, toilets (maintained by the Parish Council), the Linney and a few frapes
- The Reading Room and Doctor's Surgery
- Vevery Car Park, disused Reservoir and adjoining land

As mentioned previously, the income for the Trust comes predominantly from rentals and leases of property and car parks. From that income the Trust is responsible for maintenance, repairs, insurances, legal fees and everything else involved in the governance of a charity. The Trust also needs to have a certain amount of funds set aside for those assets that are uninsurable, such as the Ouay, to meet any immediate needs should an emergency arise. Over the last couple of years, we have had an unprecedented drain on our reserves to complete costly repairs on old buildings, leaving us currently unable to complete, for example, the necessary work on the flat above the Winkle Picker. Once the flat is completed, we intend for this to be offered as affordable housing for a local family. Other key projects pending are the Quay toilet refurbishment and a replacement roof on the Reading Room

The Trust has a good working relationship with the Lanteglos-by-Fowey Parish Council,



collaborating with them on projects such as the recent installation of a CCTV system, for additional security for the village, and the provision of toilet maintenance on the Quay.

The administration of the Trust becomes increasingly complicated, and we still have a great deal of work to do to create efficient operational procedures that enable a small group of five voluntary Trustees and our amazing Clerk, Zena, to do all the work necessary to keep the properties and land safe and presentable for all the residents and visitors to enjoy.

We now have only one Trustee remaining from the original team when I joined the Trust in 2022 and a new Clerk. The current Trustees Beth, Brian, Graham, Mel, Zena (our Clerk) and I meet monthly and correspond almost daily to do our very best to increase our reserves, explore grants and funding and maintain the properties to the very best of our abilities.
